


#### CHARLES SMITH SUICIDES

#### **NEARLY MADE A BREACH**

Powers' Note to Bowen Yesterday Looked Ominous

Washington, Jan. 30 .- There was a pause in the Venezuela negotiations that approached perilously near breach, and the end is not yet in sight. It all grows out of the attitude of the allies in insisting upon preferential treatment for themselves in the settlement of their claims. As foreshadowed in the London dispatches, Mr. Bowen has been informed of the decision of the allies to insist in his work for the moment. Possibly fresh and enlarged powers will be necessary to enable him to meet the

demands of the allies. Two courses are open now to Mr. Bowen, and it probably will be for President Castro to elect which he to the other claimant nations, than form the world that Venezuela yields to overpowering force and that if she cannot meet their claims they must reckon with the allies themselves.

The other course is for him to de clare that his mission has failed that he cannot come to a reasonable understanding with the allies because of their uncompromising attitude and therefore the case must go to the Hague tribunal for adjustment.







TEXAS AND PACIFIC IS HAULING MUCH STEEL WESTWARD

Present Shared by Both Southern Pacific and Texas and Pacific, but the Latter Road May Construct Its

From the number of cars of construction steel that are being rushed through Fort Worth to the west every day it is evident that there may be some foundation for the story that the Texas and Pacific is going to sever its joint-track relations with the Southern Pacific from Sierra Blanca to El Paso and construct a line of its own between those two points. The distance is ninety-two miles, and both roads use what is known as the short track by an arrangement similar to that existing between the Katy and Texas and Pacific here. The short track is controlled by the Southern Pacific and while the reason for the rumored breaking off on the part of the Texas and Pacific is not given, it is believed that it will soon be announced.

The Texas and Pacific has been relaying track west of here with seventy-five pound rails for some time, and the construction gangs have been working west of Abilene for several weeks. It is currently reported among railroad men that by the time the construction gangs reach the end of the ine replacing the present rails with heavier steel they will start building track from Sierra Blanca to El Paso.


