The interests noted did not pay the city tax and only a little more than 400 receipts were issued today. It is presumed from this that there will be a contest of the right of the city to collect the tax. Altogether there are about 6,000 qualified voters in Harris county.



WHOLESALE DISMISSAL OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC TICKET PUNCHERS MONDAY

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 31.-The Southern Pacific has announced a wholesale discharge of passenger conductors on the trains running between San Antonio and New Orleans. Ten conductors have received letters from Manager Van Vleck requesting their esignations on Feb. 1.

The conductors affected refuse to resign on the ground that they have done nothing for which they should resign. They propose to appeal to the Order of Railway Conductors and Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen to protect them.

The story leading up to the aforesaid action on the part of the Southern Pacific is to the effect that the conductors whose resignations have een asked are charged with failure to properly report the cash fares collected by them on their respective trains from passengers who boarded their trains without tickets.

The company claims to have affidavits from passengers who paid their fares to certain conductors, which the records in the office fail to show up as having been reported by the conductors collecting the same. 

THE SIZE OF CABINET

THE CHANCES OF THE DE-PARTMENT OF COMMERCE ARE DECIDEDLY WANING

Washington, Jan. 29. - [Special.] -The chances are waning for the bill for a new department of commerce. This does not mean that it will not pass finally, but simply that every delay means that the probability of it becoming a law grows less as time goes on. The fact that it was not sent to conference directly after it passed the house was a tendency in the direction of defeat. It looks as if there was to be considerable discussion after the commerce committee of the senate reports it back, and such discussion is likely to be postponed as the business of the session becomes more and more congested. While the new department is considered of very great importance, it is not so necessary that it cannot wait for another congress, and if the difference between the houses continues or the opposition to the bill decides that it shall go over, then there is little hope for it. Being one of the measures not absolutely necessary for the government, it may be allowed to wait.

A flutter of talk was caused by the appearance at the White House of a few colored persons of both sexes. The reception was official, and, though it was considered social to a certain extent, yet the invitation was mostly to persons in official life, and the colored men were now or had been holding official positions in Washington. In giving them invitations the president. whatever might have been his motive. emphasized to a great extent that in official life he sees no distinction in color. He has made appointments on that basis and has made it plain to men who have talked with him on the subject that no color line shall be drawn in his administration.

Cushman's Language. When Representative Cushman of Washington talks, he is sure to give a demonstration of what the English language can do. Recently in supporting

a bill for a delegate in Alaska he came quite up to expectations and made a speech that ought to make Alaska famous. In closing the panegyric upon the territory he said: "Alaska, with 100,000 population, com-

posed of the cream of the Anglo-Saxon race, has no delegate on this floor, and the only legal tie that binds them to the stars and stripes is a federal tax collector in the midst of their domain."

Sad Fate of "Icicle Ike." Then he told the story of an Alaskan

prospector who was returning to the States, saying:

"He started for New York city. He had got along very well with the weather in Alaska, but when he started across the northern end of the United States in January then he discovered, in a climatic sense, that he was getting next to the business end of the real thing. He was cold when he got to St. Paul, be was colder still when the breeze from the lake struck him at Chicago, and at Buffalo they found him frozen to death, stiff as an alpenstock, by the stove in the smoking car. [Great laughter.] That, Mr. Chairman, is a truthful recital of the sad and shocking end of 'Icicle Ike, the Coldfoot of Alaska." [Renewed laughter.]





THE MISSES WAY TOURING THE STATE IN THE INTEREST OF CHILDREN.

They Represent the Juvenile Record of Chicago whose Mission is to Encourage the Reform of Youthful Criminals by Separating Them From Older Law Breakers and Interesting

If the efforts of Misses Catherine and Anna Way are successful juvenile courts will be established in Texas similar to those already organized in twelve other states of the union. The object of the Misses Way is to get a bill creating such courts before the legislature at this session and have it

The purpose of the juvenile courts is to care for homeless delinquent children who are now in many states taken into the courts and the jails with older, more hardened criminals.

The Misses Way are now in Fort Worth and will spend the next two weeks trying to interest the people of the city in their cause. They represent the Juvenile Record, a paper published in Chicago by the Visitation and Aid society aided by all other charitable organizations in Chicago.

Illinois was the first state to pass a law establishing juvenile courts de voted exclusively to the interests of children. Under this law when a child is arrested for any offense he is taken into the juvenile court and his par ents are sent for. They are asked to take charge of him and see that he commits no further offense, in some cases being required under bond to properly care for the child.

in no case is a child placed in jail with older prisoners who only help him develop his criminal tendencies.

The Illinois courts proved a success and the Juvenile Record was then started at the suggestion of the charitable organizations of Chicago to urge the institution of similar courts in other states. As a result twelve states now have such courts, including Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, New York, Indiana and Colorado. Fifteen other state now have bills pending in their

Yet, though it is impossible to change the external structure of the teeth, so long as their nerves are unimpaired they can be supplied with the lime-salts which strengthen and harden the dentine.

To sweeten the breath, as well as to strengthen the teeth, a tablespoonful of lime clous. Should the teeth be soft and sensi-tive from deficiency of mineral salts or from the action of acids, either from the food, dose can be taken to advantage. Even two or three tablespoonfuls are not unpleasant: the addition of lime water to milk will make it a pleasant and easily digested beverage for many who cannot drink milk in its nat-

The presence of acids is detected through the sudden constituences of the through the sudden sensitiveness of the teeth when they are brushed. An infallible test is to touch the tip of the nail to the tooth's neck at the line of contact with the gum. If this causes pain, apply the chalk With only an average strength of original

structure, these precautions, providing nutriment for the dentine and counteracting the perils of acids, if reinforced with absolute cleanliness, would insure the teeth against decay; and the only other menace to their integrity comes from diseases of the gum, which attack the periosteum, the lining membrane of the socket. This is the most insidious trouble, and is caused by ulcers, abscesses and the encroachments of tartar. Therefore, the health of the gums is of equal importance with cleanliness.

Too great care cannot be exercised in selecting the cleansing agents. The dentifices which whiten the teeth in a magic fashion often ruin the enamel. The following formula contains nothing injurious:

THERAPEUTIC DENTIFRICE. Carbonate of magnesia.... 300 grams Carbonate of lime (calcine)... 600 grams Chlorate of potash. 600 grams
Essence of rose. 2 grams
Essence of anise. 2 grams

Carmine, sufficient to color.

The night brushing of the teeth is almost more important than that of the morning All brushing should be up and down on the teeth, so that the bristles of the brush (for most effective service there should be pointed infts) can pass between the teeth. But brushing is not sufficient, especially when the teeth are set loosely in the jaw.

To dislodge the food which is held in such

crevices would require a brush so stiff as to brushing, and its use after every meal, folmatic antiseptic lotion, insures an agreeable state of purity. Dental floss is safer to use than a toothplek, which has been known to laffet serious injury.

Extremes of temperature in food and drink are a menace to tooth enamel. Ice Adult care cannot atone for early neglect. cream should not be followed by hot coffee, nor scalding soup by iced water.

Open-mouthed breathing, especially during sleep, is another source of danger, for the oxygen of the air decomposes the ptyaline of the saliva, rendering it corrosive and slightly acid.

The following lotion has valuable antiseptic properties, will purify the breath and even will arrest the progress of caries: SALICYLATED MOUTH TINCTURE.

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


