

INSURANCE COMPANIES QUALIFY FOR BUSINESS

Austin, Jan. 9.—The insurance companies doing business in Texas have commenced to qualify for the current year by filing their annual statements and paying tax. In addition to paying office fees and \$1 for each agent's certificate, fire companies pay a tax of one-half of 1 per cent on gross premium receipts, while marine companies pay 1 per cent and life companies 2 per cent.

### FINE NEEDLEWORK ON REINDEER SKIN.



A striking collection of objects gathered by the Jessup North Pacific Expedition sent to Northeastern Asia has just been received at the Museum of Natural History.

Among the many curious and interesting

objects brought back were a reindeer saddle and a cradle hollowed out of a birch log and covered with reindeer skin. The main feature, aside from their novel shapes, is the decorative work.

They belong to the Lamut, a hunting tribe. Though primitive and living in an almost barbarous state, the women are capable of doing exquisite beadwork and originate some fine designs, which are sewn on their

dles, the thread used being sinew, and the needle a sharp piece of bone. Reindeer herding and the pursuit of game are the sole occupations of this tribe.

Transportation is mostly by reindeer. The saddle for the reindeer is shaped to fit a certain portion of the deer near the shoulder. 





Next take a thin piece of wire, which must be somewhat longer than the longer portion of the ruler, and twist each of its two ends into a little ring. After this is done nail the rings to the two ends of the longer portion of the ruler and then place the smaller portion under the wire in the same position that a string of a violin is

placed on a bridge.

Now, if you strike the wire it will give forth a sound, and this sound will change according to the pressure of your finger. Next cut, out of cork, a few little figures. They must resemble dancers, and you can make them more picturesque by giving them a coat of oil paint. Moreover, under each there must be three supports, which are to be stuck into the cork, and can be made | furnish them with music.

### HIEROGLYPHIC STAIRWAY.

ancient America.

Noteworthy among the surprising discoveries made by the Peabody Museum recent expedition in Central America was that of a magnificent hieroglyphic stairway at Copan, unearthed by Mr. George B. Gordon.


From its design and workmanship the stairway is considered the greatest architectural feature that has yet been brought to light in this celebrated prehistoric city. This new find has revealed two important facts. The antiquity of Copan is pushed back to a greater period than was supposed, as the stairway bears an inscription over 700 years earlier than any inscription yet found on any existing monument.

Also the inscription with which the stairway was decorated is the longest hieroglyphic one that has been met with among the Maya ruins. Fragments of sculpture mingling with the ruins show that the stairway belonged to a temple undoubtedly the most imposing building in Copan or in all

The stairway extended from a plaza terrace to the top of the mound, a distance of 125 feet, and was 26 feet wide. Every foot of it was covered with elaborate sculptures and hieroglyphic inscriptions. These are being deciphered, and, it is thought, will yield valuable new information in regard to this prehistoric city and people.
