THE LIFE OF THE POPE

LEO SO DESIGNATES IT ON OCCASION OF JUBILEE -DALLAS BISHOP IS PRESENT

(By Associated Press.)

ROME, Feb. 20 .- The pope completed the functions of his jubilee today without fatigue. On returning to his apartments he exclaimed, "This is really the happiest day of my life.

"It seems impossible that it is twentyfive years since I have been there," said the pope this morning, referring to his vatican, during which he has never gone beyond the palace grounds.

The Hall of Beatification, where the pontiff holds the jubilee celebration, presented a brilliant scene. The struggle to get into the hall was terrific. People were fairly swept off their feet and women were overcome, but no one was seri-

Many Americans were present, includinging Bishops Dunne of Dallas and Burke of St. Joseph. The pope was in gorgeous red and bestowed benedictions right and left as he passed through the cheering

Early this morning letters and telegrams began arriving at the vatican, congratulating his holiness upon the anniversary. A majority of the foreign tributes came from France, Spain, Austria and Bavaria, but among hundreds of others were many from Great Britain. Ireland and the United States. Autograph letters were received from the czar. Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria and King Alfonso of Spain. The pontiff insisted upon reading them perothers to the translators. At noon the pope received in audience a number of representatives of Catholic associations and Italian and foreign representatives of religious order. In the afternoon a Te Deum was sung in the vatican. 

An ordinance prohibiting persons from loitering and idling in and around the depots of the city of Fort Worth, Texas, and prohibiting the use of water closets and urinaries connected with the depots of the city of Fort Worth, Texas, and imposing a penalty for the violation of said

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Fort Worth as follows:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to loiter around and about any passenger depot or railroad station in the city of Fort Worth, Texas. and all persons shall be considered as loiterers and idlers who may be around and upon the premises and who are not there as passengers or intending to beome passengers, or upon business connected with such railroad companies, or with some passenger or employe of said

Section 2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to use the privies, wacharge thereof. Provided, however, that sons who may be at such depot intending to become passengers or to those who may be at such depot on any matter of such persons who are at such depot awaiting the arrival or departure of

Section 3. Any person or persons violating the provisions of the foregoing ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shail be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

Section 4. That, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and ten days publication, as required by law. Filed Feb. 6, 1903.

# WILL OPEN KIOWA LITTLE ADS THAT BRING BIG RESULTS

washington, Feb. 20.-(Special.)-Congress has authority, under a recent supreme court decision, to dispose of Indian lands by legislation without treaty. In nearly every instance where ands were purchased from the Indians in the last dozen years a treaty was first made with them stipulating the price per acre and the manner of payment. Finally congress decided that it had the right to say what should be done with Indian lands, and in the future all legislation disposing of these lands will be executed without treating with the tribes. Of course it is intended to consult their best interests and do for them as a man would deal with his ward. This method has been found necessary because the Indians. even after they take their lands in severalty; do not want to break up the large tribal tracts which are so detrimental to the advancement of Indian civilization. One of the latest bills proposed for disposing of Indian lands will open about 500,000 acres of the Kiowa and Comanche reservation to settlement.

Another Innovation.

There is another change made in the bill proposing to open these new lands in Oklahoma. They are to be sold to the highest bidder for homestead purposes in tracts of 160 acres, instead of being opened at a fixed price for all lands, good and bad. This will prevent such scenes as have been witnessed when other reservations were thrown open to settlement, and instead of an "Oklahoma rush" there will be spirited bidding for good farm | WANTED-White woman for general lands. Probably some tracts will bring a high price, while other sections of the reservation will be sold at a cheap rate. The probabilities are that Indians will get the best of the bargain in the auction system of sales.

The Democratic Candidate. Efforts to make Judge Parker of New York the candidate of the Democrats in congress for the presidency are not very successful. While some leading Democrats have declared for Parker, a great many say that Parker, Olney or Gorman would be satisfactory to them. Very few have been forced to make an absolute declaration for the New York jurist, although he is highly spoken of as a man who would apparently make a first class candidate. "This is not the time to make pledges or announcements as to candidates," said one man who is a shrewd observer. "We shall know a great deal more about the situation a year from now, and at that time we shall not have begun the election of delegates to the national convention." No one seems to know definitely why there is such an intense deaire among certain men to bring out a candidate in the east, although we hear it intimated that the real reason is to head off any western candidates. It is claimed that if prominent southern MRS. JENNIE M. RYAN-Spiritual memen could be pledged to an eastern man it might mean his nomination.

Not to Be Conspicuous. Every day President and Mrs. Roosevelt ride out in a carriage somewhere in the suburbs, when they alight from the carriage and mount the horses that have been brought to the place agreed upon and then take a brisk gallop for miles over the country roads. They return to the White House in the same way. They do this because mounting the horses at the White House and riding through the streets of the capital became too conspicuous. The president does not care on his own account, but Mrs. Roosevelt did not like being stared at so much, for a crowd regularly gathered every aftersoon to see the president and his wife start out.

President Roosevelt has a walking route through the rough paths of Rock Creek park, where a number of small boys who go to the park often see him. Some of the trails over the hills and along the rocky banks of the streams are designated the "Roosevelt routes." That Old Speech.

"Are you going to read my tariff speech?" asked Senator Quay of Senafor Nelson one day when the Pennsylvania senator saw a lot of books stacked up on the desk of the Minnesota senator. The celebrated Quay tariff speech is pointed out as a wonder in the way of filibustering. Quay used it with great effect on the Wilson bill to get what he wanted, and it has been threatened as a weapon against the statehood bill. But the opponents of the territories will never have to resort to it.

Look After Alaska. Representatives Cushman and Jones of Washington make a specialty of looking after the interests of Alaska. and the Washington senators second their efforts. It was only a few weeks ago that Cushman had a bill passe giving the big territory a delegate in congress. What is more, in spite of opposition he passed it as he introduced and reported it. Jones was up in arms against the British encroachments upon Alaska territory and proposed one of those redhot resolutions which cause discussion, but he has also done something practical in securing a recommendation from the interior depart ment for an increase of \$75,000 for the survey of lands in Alaska.
