QUAY MAY FORCE LITTLE ADS THAT BRING BIG RESULTS

Washington, Feb. 23.-Special .-Duite an interesting phase of the statehood fight is the method of Senator Quay in attaching the bill to appropriation bills. If there should be votes enough in the senate to indorse what has been done in committee, then a most interesting situation would be presented. The Republicans who have been in the minority upon this proposition have declared that they will never consent to this method of legislation. They have made it plain that they would be willing to force an extra sesdon of congress before they would let the omnibus bill pass, and, should the bill become a part of an appropriation bill that bill with its rider would be defeated, even at the risk of an extra session. It is quite likely that in case the rider was declared in order the method would be to not allow a vote to be taken on the question of putting the amendment on the bill. Then they would leave the statehood advocates the option of withdrawing the amendment or allowing the bill to fail. The interest of the majority favoring the statehood bill has not yet been so great that they would be willing to force an extra session, and the opponents expect they will "weaken" when it comes down to an actual test. Rich Indian Lands.

The Indian appropriation bill is always a bone of contention in congress. It runs rather smoothly in the house, but in the senate there is always trouble. It is generally "loaded" in the senate with legislation which a great many men oppose. There are always some treaties added to it, besides matters affecting the Ute, Uintah and other Indians of the Rocky mountains. On some of these reservations there are rich mines, on others valuable minerals, and there is a desire on the part of white men to obtain them. The Indians do not engage in mining, and the rich deposits remain untouched. As mining is a good deal of a gamble, no one wants to pay big money for the mines on speculation, so the Indians cannot realize much from them. This year, as formerly, the Indlan bill carries senate amendments to open these properties, but no one can guarantee that they will remain in the bill until it becomes a law.


