The doctor's theory was that a clot of blood had formed which ested against the brain, and he request ed permission of the father of the deceased to make an autopsy of the brain in order to ascertain if his theory was correct. Such permission was refused by the father who, a few days after the funeral. noticing that the mound of earth over the grave appeared to have been recently disturbed, opened the grave and the coffin and discovered that the head of the corpse had been cut off and taken away The doctor was indicted and convicted under the statute forbidding the removal of any dead body without due authority. The case was carried to the court of The vast interests here involved are criminal appeals, and an able brief was filed therein by Senator Sebastian and Messes. Calhoun and Webb of Albany, Texas. In addition, Senator Sebastian went up to Dallas and orally argued the case, and on last Wednesday the court rendered its judgment, reversing and dismissing the case on the ground that the indictment was fatally defective in not alleging the name of the deceased person, and because of grave doubts that an offense had been committed under the statute, since only the head and not the body had been removed. The court suggests in the opinion the advisability of an amendment so as to meet such character of cases, and Senator Sebastian's bill is offered in accordance with that suggestion. 
