

Hanners to head industrial search

The new Castro County Economic Development Commission Friday night hired Gerald Hanners, former owner and manager of KDHN Radio, as its full-time developer to search for new industry for the area.

At the same time, commission members reported that private business contributions have hiked the first-year "starter fund" to \$36,000, and that reception of the industrial development plan has been good in the business community. The EDC has a first-year budget goal of \$49,000, and started its business fund drive with \$14,000 already pledged by the Dimmitt Independent School District and \$10,000 by the City of Dimmitt.

Hanners, whose radio name was Jerry Marvin (his first two given names) agreed to a salary of \$27,000 for his first year's work, and requested the commission to delay starting his salary "at least until Sept. 1, to give me time to study the field and the procedures, and maybe develop a plan for you to consider."

A former president of the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, Hanners said he is "delighted to be part of this effort."

He added, "The work that has already been done by the Economic Development Commission is commendable. I am looking forward to working with the commission, along with officials of our school district and city and county leaders. The spirit of cooperation

that has been exhibited by these entities and by private business and individuals is encouraging. If we are to achieve success, it will most likely require a concerted community effort.

"The task ahead may not be easy," Hanners said, "but I am looking forward to the challenge and I invite others to join us in this endeavor."

The board offered to pay Hanners' travel expenses until Sept. 1 while he researches the field at area universities, governmental agencies and other sources, but he declined the offer.

Members of the commission also elected a three-man executive committee to work with Hanners and speed up the work at times when overnight decisions might be necessary. Named to the executive committee were Commission Chairman Randy Holme, Dimmitt Mayor Wayne Collins and Dimmitt School Board Vice-President Fred Bruegel Jr. Holme, who is the new general manager of the Dimmitt Amstar Plant, represents the Chamber of Commerce on the commission. Collins, a commodities broker and farmer, represents the city, and Bruegel, a grain and feed dealer, represents the school board.

The commission also asked each government entity contributing tax funds to the industrial search

project to name a five-person development board to oversee the expenditure of that entity's funds.

(The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Monday night established a City Board of Development and named Collins, Don Gregory, David Hays, Calvin Marsh and Jeff Robertson. All are city residents and already members of the commission.)

Those conducting the fund drive to finance the commission's work reported that private businesses and individuals had either donated or committed \$12,050 as of Friday, with another \$3,500 indicated.

"We haven't had a single person say they were against it," Marsh reported. "In fact, some said this is something that should have been done years ago. A lot of people told us they want to help, that they recognize the need, but they couldn't set a dollar amount yet. Others gave some and said they'd be willing to give more later if they could, and some wondered what would be an appropriate amount."

Commission members decided against requesting specific amounts, in favor of letting businesses and individuals give what they feel they can afford. Contributions have ranged from \$100 to \$2,400, with many in the \$500 and \$1,000 range, they noted.

County may help fund, attorney general rules

The County Commissioners' Court learned Monday that it may legally allocate funds to the new Castro County Economic Development Commission within specific restrictions.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis reported that he had received "a very quick response" from the attorney general's office on the question, adding, "They apparently have had a lot of inquiries lately from local government groups" on the same basic issue.

The county had asked the attorney general's office two questions regarding the new commission's request for \$14,000 to help establish its first-year budget:

1. "Can the Castro County Commissioners Court contribute money to a Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee which intends to hire an outside consultant and to pay his salary and expenses?"

2. "Could this contribution be considered legal if it were contributed through a County Industrial Commission . . . as 'necessary expenses' of the County Industrial Commission?"

Attorney General Jim Mattox's office answered:

"The Castro County Commissioners Court may not DONATE county funds to the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, a private, non-profit corporation . . . The county may, however, CONTRACT with the Chamber of Commerce to provide the services of promoting growth and development that the county is authorized to provide . . ."

"The Commissioners' Court has the discretionary authority to determine terms and conditions for such a contract that provide for adequate consideration to the county and do not contravene (constitutional) limits."

"It must be noted that the county must maintain control over the expenditure of the county funds in order to ensure that the county receives the benefits of the services under the contract."

"As an alternative, the Commissioners' Court may expend the

money by creating a County Industrial Commission . . . and paying its 'necessary expenses,' which may include the \$14,000 requested to hire a consultant. The county may NOT use the County Industrial Commission as a means of funding the Chamber of Commerce, which is strictly prohibited by the Texas Constitution."

Since it was first proposed by the Chamber of Commerce earlier this year, the County Economic Development Commission has developed into a quasi-public cooperative venture of the City of Dimmitt, the Dimmitt Independent School District and the Chamber of Commerce—its three main funding organizations to date.

Those promoting the new commission asked the county government to help fund it, but the Commissioners' Court withheld a decision pending answers to its questions on the legality of such a contribution.

Meanwhile, the City of Dimmitt has allocated \$10,000 and has established a Board of City Development to oversee the expenditure of the city's funds; and the Dimmitt Independent School District has allocated \$14,000 and has been asked to name a five-person economic development subcommittee to oversee the commission's use of school district funds.

The commission is now conducting a public fund drive, which has yielded another \$12,000 from private businesses and individuals. The campaign for funds has been successful enough that the commission this week hired Gerald Hanners to serve as a full-time economic development officer.

Commission members said they also plan to approach the city commissions, school districts and businesses at Hart and Nazareth for further funding, and to have all taxing entities represented on the commission, Chairman Randy Holme said.

In the only action item of the day, the commissioners adopted a resolution setting a higher fee schedule for services provided by county offices and courts. (See separate story.)

County Tax Assessor Billy Hackleman reported that while the county receives none of the new increase in state auto registration fees, it has the authority under the new tax law to add a \$5 vehicle registration fee to benefit the County Roads and Bridges Fund. He estimated the increase would bring in an additional \$48,000 per year for the road fund, and said every adjoining county already has adopted the \$5 fee. He added that if the county does not adopt the fee by Sept. 1, it will not be authorized to do so for another five years.

Chief Appraiser Jerry Heller told the commissioners that the value of the county's property-tax base had dropped \$4 million, and now stands at \$337 million. He said the county's present tax rate of 13.95 cents per \$100 valuation would need to be increased to slightly more than 14 cents to raise the same amount of tax dollars. He also explained that the county can hike its tax rate by as much as 3% without having to post public notice or hold a hearing.

Heller's report was to help the commissioners with their work session on the next county budget,

Saturday. The celebration will include the Great Southwest Shows carnival tonight through Saturday, the Miss Hart and Little Miss Hart pageant Friday night, Lionburgers and bingo both days, and a parade, music festival, game booths, craft show, barbecue and other festivities Saturday.

Paving hearing postponed

Postponements and appointments highlighted Monday night's meeting of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen.

The city governing board postponed its scheduled public hearing on the 1984 paving assessment program and suspended action 90 days on Energas' proposal for a 7.7% rate increase. And the aldermen appointed a five-man City Board of Development and filled two vacancies—those of mayor and member of the City Board of Adjustment.

Mayor Wayne Collins said the paving hearing had to be postponed because the assessment company's attorney had not completed the assessment roll for the project.

The public hearing "will probably be at the next meeting" on Aug. 6, Collins said.

The board suspended action on

the Energas rate proposal at the request of Bob Caddell, local Energas manager, who explained that the 63 cities and towns affected are banding together to hire outside consultants to study the utility's rate structure and profit margin, and make a recommendation. The suspension would give them time to do this, he explained.

Energas originally requested city approval of its rate increase by Aug. 10, but at Caddell's request the board moved the effective date back to Nov. 10.

The aldermen voted to appoint Collins mayor for the remainder of the current term (until April), and appointed Ann Armstrong as mayor pro tem. Collins, former mayor pro tem, had been serving in the city's top post since the resignation of Mayor R. L. Fleming in May.

The board also appointed Weldon Bradley to the City Board of Adjustment, to fill a vacancy created when George Lamberth moved.

The aldermen established a City Board of Development to work with the new Castro County Economic Development Commission, and appointed five men to the board for two-year terms.

The five appointees are Collins, David Hays, Don Gregory, Calvin Marsh and Jeff Robertson. All five are city residents and already are serving on the Economic Development Commission.

City Attorney Jack Edwards explained that the law requires such a board to be formed when a city allocates money for business or industrial development. He said the new board would not have the

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Heath wins scholarship

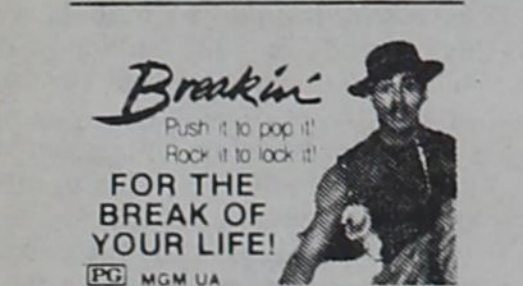
Rhonda Heath of Dimmitt has been named a Smallwood Scholar for the 1984-85 school year at South Plains College.

"I really don't miss French food, and I haven't had time to get homesick, since I'll only be gone a month," Agathe commented.

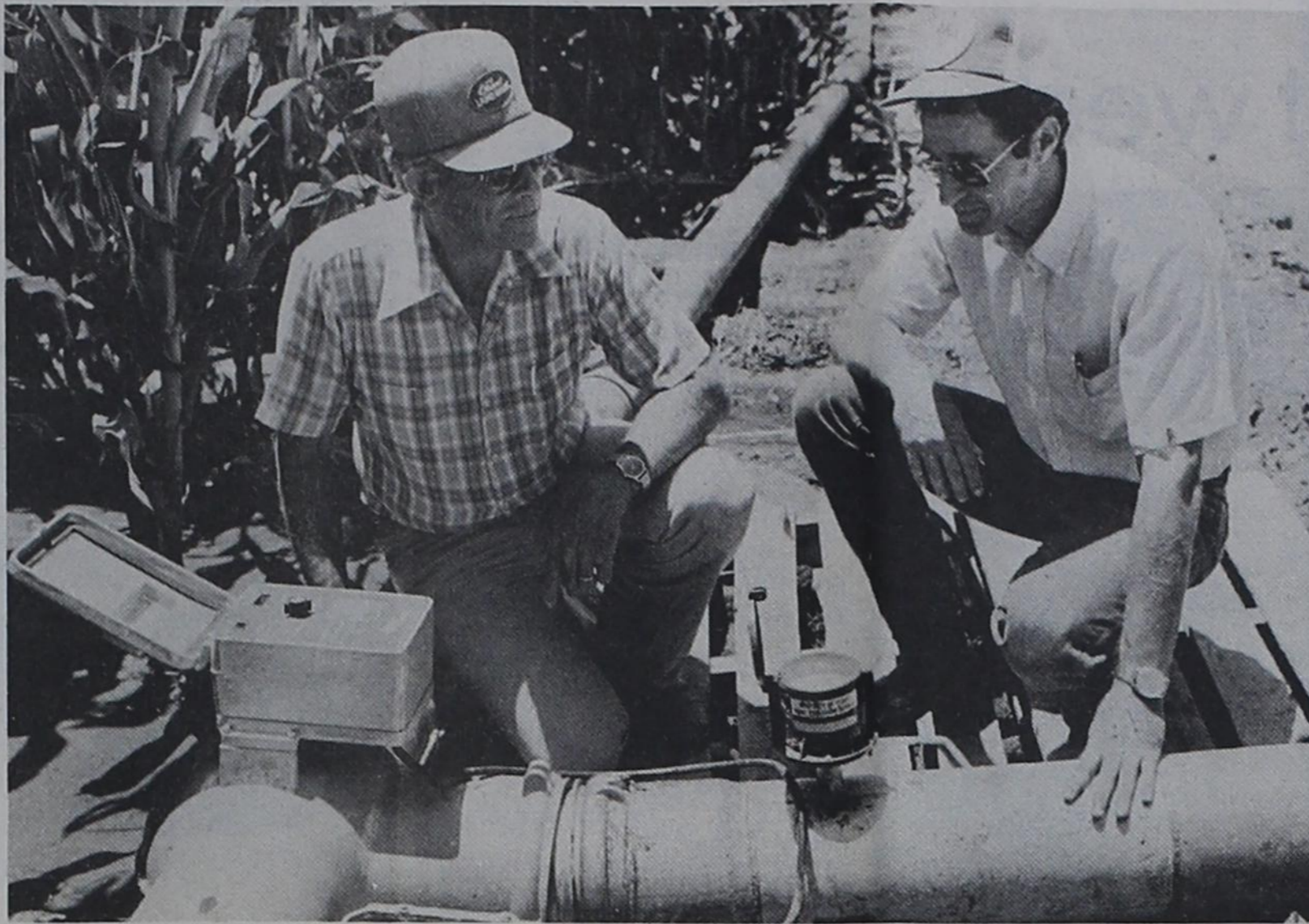

Lecture series set for today

The Don L. Jones Memorial Lecture Series will be held in connection with the observance of the 75th anniversary of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock today (Thursday).

The event is scheduled to begin at 1:15 p.m. at the Lubbock center in the auditorium. Jones was superintendent of the Lubbock center from 1925 until his retirement in 1957.

The lectures, which will begin with "Seventy-Five Years of Agricultural Progress," will commemorate the significant agricultural developments and challenges in

which the experiment station has been involved.

Established in 1909, the center was originally located east of Lubbock. It moved to its present site north of Lubbock International airport on FM 1294 in 1959.

A distinguished group of speakers including Graddy Tunnell, special counsel to the High Plains Research Foundation; Dr. Neville P. Clarke, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station; Duncan Ellison, executive director of Water Incorporated; Roy Quinby, professor emeritus of plant breeding; Dr. Delbert Hess, manager of cotton research for Cargill, Inc.; Elmer Hudspeth, retired director of the USDA Southern Plains Cotton Research Laboratory; Kenneth Gray, president of the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council; James Mitchell, president of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District; Dr. Perry Adkisson, deputy chancellor of Texas A&M University; and Dr. John R. Abernathy, associate professor of weed research with the experiment station.

"We cordially invite anyone interested in the development of agriculture and agricultural technology in the High Plains area," said Dr. R. D. Brigham, associate professor and chairman of the lecture series.

FARM EQUIPMENT SAFETY

Farm safety training should be an annual activity because it can help prevent serious injury or even death, emphasizes a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

New workers should be instructed on farm safety as soon as they are employed. Safety training should include the safe operation and servicing of all equipment with which a worker is or will be involved.

Special attention should be given to these practices: keep all guards in place, permit no riders, stop the engine before working on equipment, and disconnect electrical power before servicing equipment.

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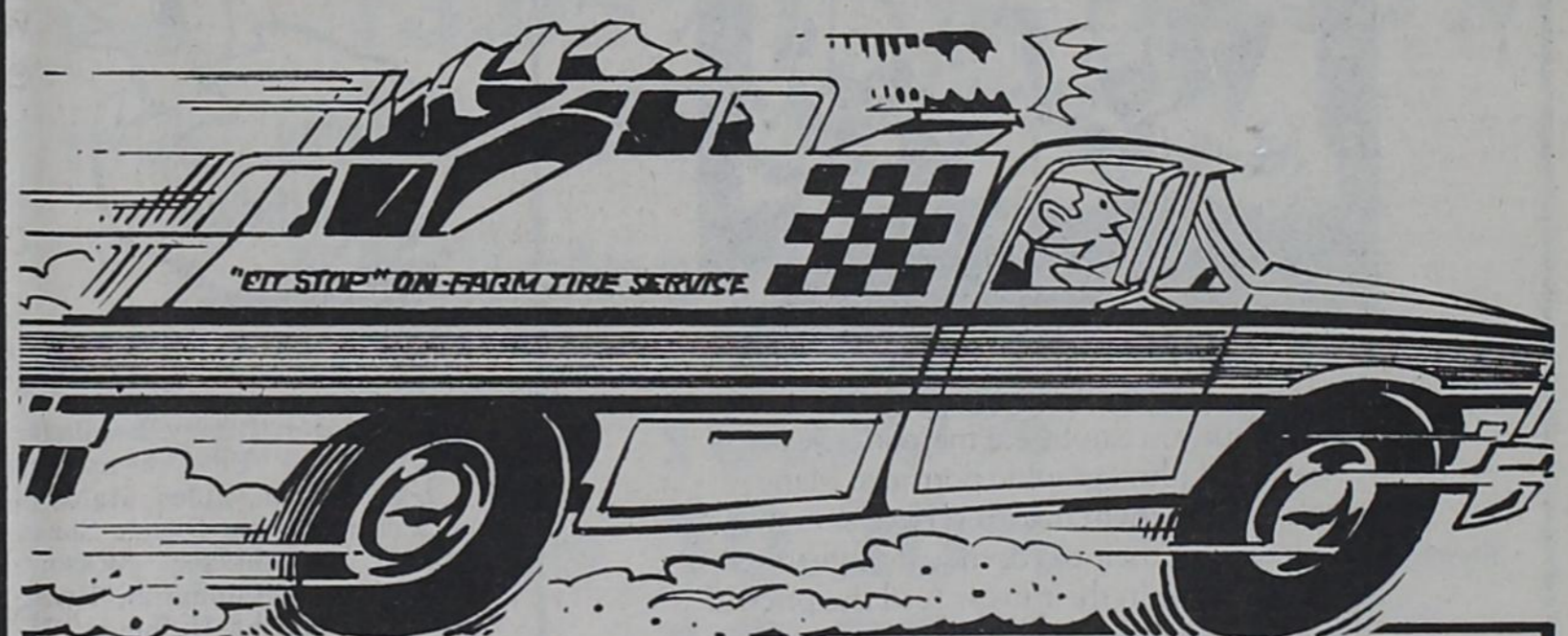

Standlee also thanked the Kiwanis for their support in the construction of the steer barn.

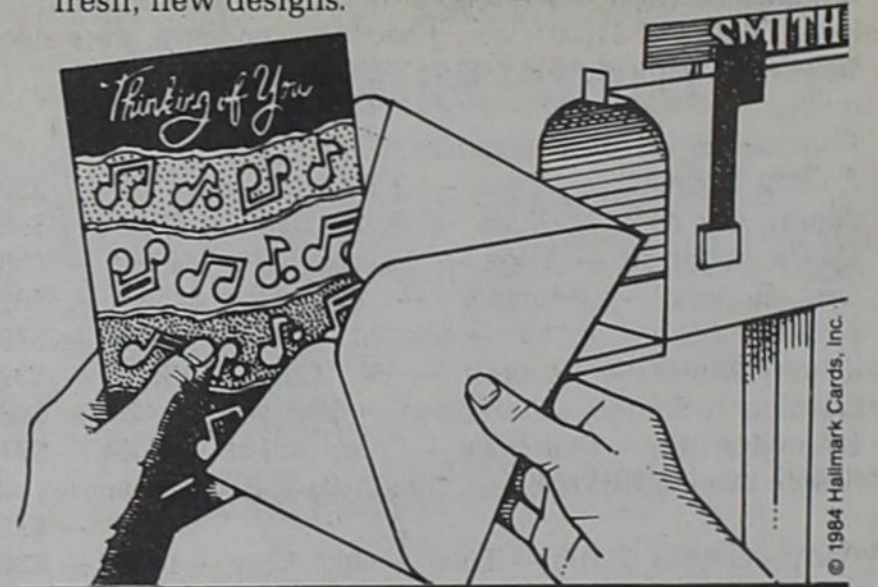
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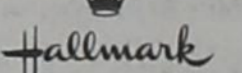

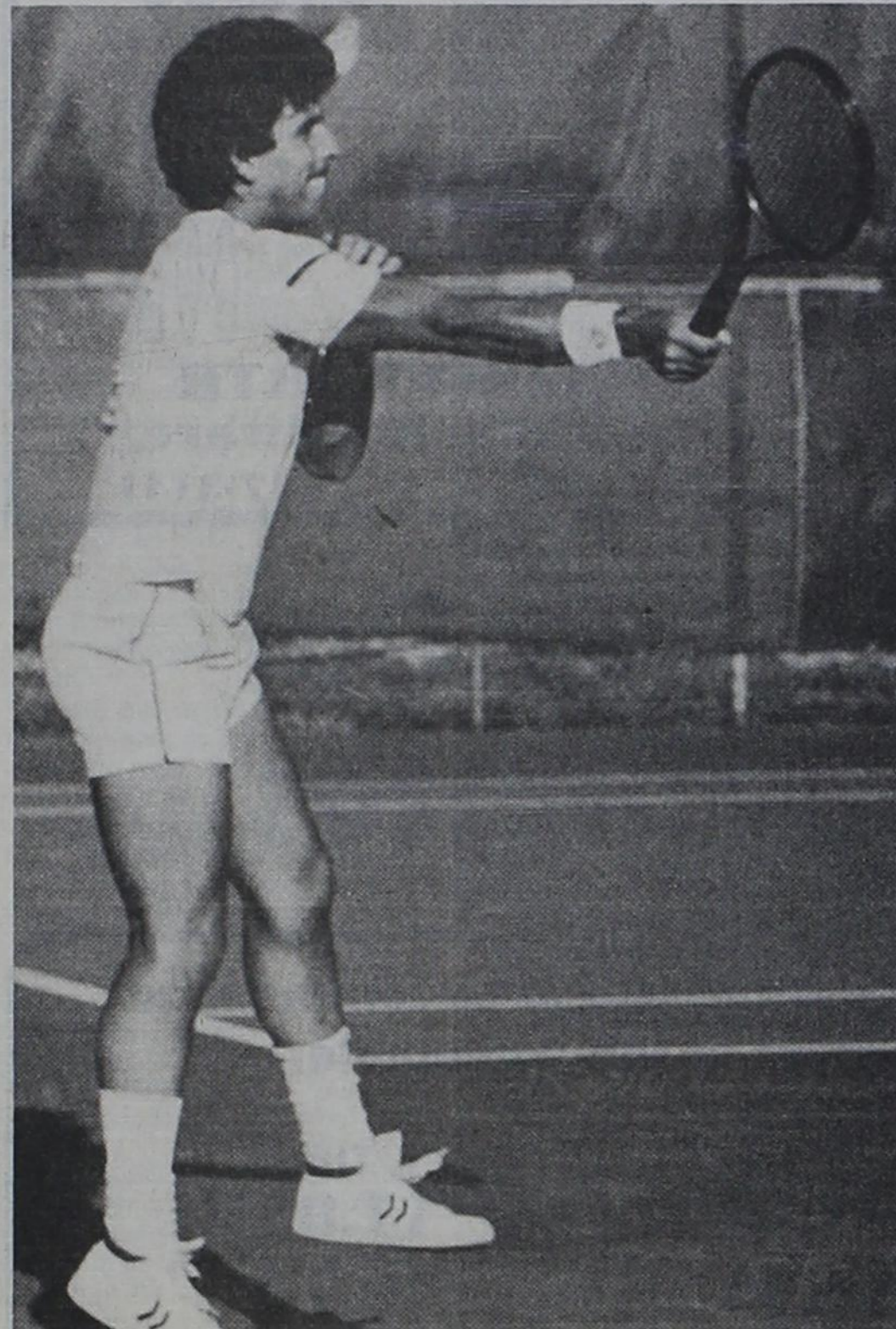

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Conference on game birds set

More and more Texans are raising game birds according to Menzies McWilliams, County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Texas Game Bird Conference will be held July 28, in response to the increased interest in game bird production. This all-day conference kicks off with an 8 a.m. registration, with the program getting under way promptly at 9. It will be held in the Kleberg Center on the Campus of Texas A&M University in College Station. The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Department of Poultry Science, all of the Texas A&M University System.

This year's list of speakers reads like a game bird "Who's Who." They include Mickey Ollson, Glendale Arizona. His all-around bird collection is reported to be the best and largest in the US. Ollson will be leading the ornamental game bird workshop, McWilliams said.

Long time Director of Conservation for Winchester/Western, Alton, Ill., Dr. Edward L. Kozicky will outline a program for developing strong flying quail.

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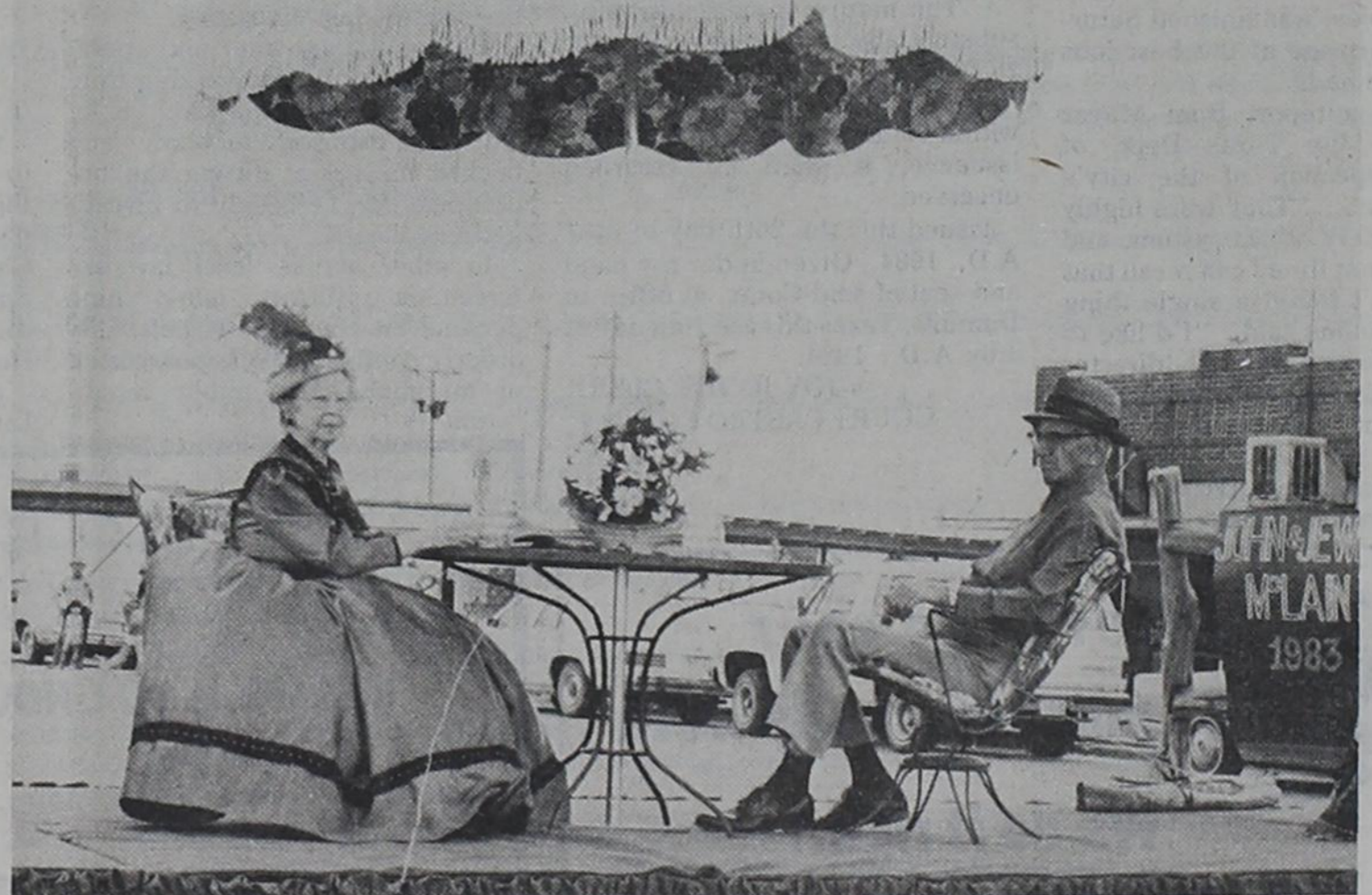
