VIOLENT TORNADO CARRIES DEATH

NEWS FROM BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA, TELLS OF AWFUL DESTRUCTION EARLY THIS MORNING NEAR HANCEVILLE

THEY ARE CAUGHT IN THEIR BEDS

Sleeping Families the Victim of the Cloud's Fury and They Are Caught in the Wreckage of Their Own Homes—List of Known Dead Already Reaches Thirteen and the Injured Will Number a Score

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 8.—Information has just reached here of a destructive tornado which passed about a mile north of Hanceville on the county line of Blount and Cullman counties about 2 o'clock this morning.

LINES CRIPPLED Owing to the crippled condition of the wires full information can not be obtained.

THIRTEEN DEAD Parties arriving here from Decatur and passing through Hanceville say that already thirteen bodies have been found and that more than a score of persons were injured.

ENTIRE FAMILY KILLED Coming at so early an hour of the morning, the tornado caught the sleeping farmers in their beds and many were killed in the twisted and shattered wreckage the storm left behind.

TWO CASES ARE SETTLED

Potter and Winebrenner Contentions Are Disposed Of, the First Winning His Case While the Second Loses—Arguments Date Back to Time of Cherokee Rush

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The Federal Supreme court has passed upon three cases growing out of the attempts of alleged "sooners" to secure title to property in the Cherokee strip during the rush for the settlement of those lands in 1889.

THE POTTER CASE Thomas Potter was a special policeman, employed in ejecting "sooners" from the land to be opened. He staked out a homestead for himself and filed upon it when the rush came.

It is the first time either congressman has been in Fort Worth, and this trip marks Mr. Payne's first dip into Texas.

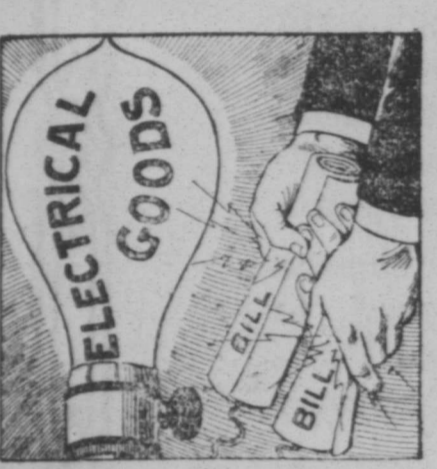
Mr. Williams, in speaking of the relation of the medical college to the city, said that \$220,000 a year was expended by the students of the college, or approximately \$178 a day in this city.

**LIVELY ELECTION ON NORTH SIDE**

Although the election in Fort Worth yesterday attracted little attention because of the fact that W. J. Gilvin and W. M. Rea were without opponents for the offices of city assessor and collector and city marshal, respectively, the election in North Fort Worth was lively enough to make up for the absence of excitement in Fort Worth proper.

**NEW ORPHAN HOME PLANS MATURING**

The receipts of the Fort Worth Benevolent Home for the two months ending March 31 were \$1,785.31. The expenditures during the same period were \$1,187.04, leaving a balance on hand of \$598.27, of which \$124.65 belongs to the auxiliary board and goes to the building fund.

The above statement was submitted by Secretary A. W. Samuels at the meeting of the directors of the institution yesterday afternoon. The matter of erecting a new building was again discussed at this time. The building will cost \$5,000, and will be located on the thirty-four acre tract just beyond Polytechnic College, donated to the home by the county commissioners. It will cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000.

The city council at its next meeting will be asked to renew its contract with the home, whereby the latter is to receive monthly from the city \$50. There are forty-two children in the home at present. The next meeting of the board will be held on the first Tuesday in May.

IOWA EDITORS ARE THE CITY'S GUESTS

"I don't believe there is any brighter sunshine in the world than in Texas," was the observation of one of the Iowa editors in the city today.

The special train bearing the members of the Iowa Press Association, which is touring the state of Texas, arrived at the Texas and Pacific station from Waco shortly after noon and from that time forward the visitors from the north began the inspection of what all are free to admit is one of the best cities included in the itinerary.

The Katy special from Waco was in charge of Conductor J. Yelton. The excursion party since starting has been conducted over the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad. T. R. Cookerly of Des Moines, division passenger agent; T. L. Posler, industrial agent, and E. P. York, excursion agent, both of Dallas, are with the party, which was joined here by the

local city passenger and ticket agent, T. T. McDonald. With the exception of the Katy officials and the physician in the party, the remainder of the excursionists are either newspaper men or members of newspaper families.

OVER THE SAME OLD TRAIL
The Iowa Press Association was organized away back in the sixties. It is one of the oldest organizations of the kind in the country. It has long been the custom of the Iowa editors to take an annual excursion of this nature, and one incident in this wise may be of interest.

C. M. Junkin, editor of the Ledger at Fairfield, is president of the association. His father, W. W. Junkin, who edited the Ledger fifty years ago and who died only last February, was president of the Iowa Press Association in 1876. In that year a southern excursion was planned and, singularly, the same trip was taken, the party being in charge of the elder Junkin, at which the present generation kin is now enjoying under the direction of the son of one of the pioneers of journalism in Iowa.

PLEASSED WITH TEXAS
The members of the association travel in their own chartered cars, and all they ask is that the people in the cities where they visit give them an opportunity to see what is to be seen. "And I want to say right here, for the entire party," said Mr. Junkin, "that the people in Texas seem to be onto their job in that respect. In San Antonio, Galveston, Houston and Waco, wherever we have been, it has been the same. The members of our party, many of whom have never been south before, will return with an entirely different idea of your great state, to what they had when they left home. The general advantage of the state in various directions, together with the push and energy manifested by the people everywhere, has given all of us an inspiration and affords a source of education from which all will profit.

"I have been in Texas a number of times before and therefore can appreciate fully the rapid strides which the state has been making, in recent years, especially. I was first here in 1873, then again in 1888, and also in 1898. We are impressed with the vast amount of Iowa capital which is being invested in Texas. Prominent among the investors are ex-Governor Shaw and Hon. Hiram Wheeler. Some of our best farmers are also moving to Texas, and we can now see the same thing regarding Iowa and Texas which recently existed between Iowa and Illinois, when the progressive farmers from Illinois went westward and made of Iowa what it is today. The same is true of all new agricultural country, but the feature with which we have been impressed is the amount of Iowa capital which is coming to Texas."

ARE BEING ENTERTAINED
A committee of ladies and gentlemen met the visitors at the depot, escorted them to The Worth Hotel where luncheon was served at 1:30. Mayor Powell extended a formal welcome to the city's guests, when the specially chartered street cars were boarded for the ride to the stock yards and a visit to the packinghouses. Here an address was made by O. W. Mathews, secretary of the Stock Yards Co. Capt. B. B. Paddock also addressed the visitors,
