SUGAR REFINING IN JAPAN

In discussing the sugar refining industry in Japan, Consul General E. C. Bellows writes from Yokohama that, owing to climatic conditions, the annual production of sugar cane is less than 4000 tons, against the importation of 152,000 tons of raw sugar and Mr. Bellows says: "There are many sugar refining companies in Japan, most of them situated in the southern part of the islands, the total capital invested in this industry being about 10.000,000 yen (\$5.000,000). Except in Formosa-which, although now a part of the Japanese empire, has separate officers and laws-the industry receives no direct aid from the government, and has been very unfavorably affected by the bounty system in vogue in Europe. The capital invested has yielded a rate of about 5 per cent profit, which is very low as compared with current interest rates in this empire; but the outlook for the business is much more hopeful now, in consequence of the agreement by the representatives of the sugar producing countries to the Brussels convention of last summer.



When the Union Pacific railroad was building, there was always a town at its terminus which moved on with the finishing of the road. One of these towns was Julesburg, and a very hard place it was. I was connected with the road and occupied the same cabin with my young friend Ike Stevenson, a disbursing officer. One night on my return from up the road I found Stevenson engaged at poker with some miners from Clear Creek, in the mountains. I saw at a glance from the magnitude of the stakes that Ike was playing with the company's money, for he had nothing but his salary, and that was always fully drawn as soon as due. This was not the worst of it. He had lost some \$3,000.

He was to me a sort of younger brother. He was the loveliest fellow in the world, and all the "loveliest fellows" I have ever known have had a weak spot in them.
