

In addition to 1500 head to be taken by the Cranley, the steamship Anglo-Saxon is due to arrive here on May 20 and as soon as she can be fitted for the voyage she will leave this port for Delagoa bay with 1,000 head of heifers. The Atlantean will return to this port as soon as she can discharge MYSTERIOUSLY HURT will carry approximately the same number of head of cattle on her next voyage that she took on her first trip. The Cranley will also make another trip to this port for a cargo of heifers and the probabilities are that other ships will be used in the trade later on in the season.





CIVIC FEDERATION MEETS IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, May 13 .- In line with the work started last winter, the executive committee of the National Civic Federaand capital. This is the committee of which Senator Hanna is chairman, and of the American Federation of Labor, former President Grover Cleveland, Cornelius N. Bliss, Archbishop Ireland, President Eliot of Harvard, Bisnop Potter and other men of note.

The special purpose of the present meeting, it is understood, is to agree upon some satisfactory plan by which strike may be averted. It is said that sugges tions will be made by the members to appoint arbitration boards in the various districts. These arbitration boards will be composed of representatives of all interested parties. Any trouble that arises between employer and employe will be referred to the board for settlement. If! the board fails to reach an agreement satisfactory to both sides, then the matter will be placed in the hands of a higher arbitration board. The Civic Federation, it is understood, will suggest that it act as the higher board. It is further suggested that while the dispute is in the hands of either of the boards no strike can be declared.
