





HENDERSON ON

ALDERMAN ON FAILURE TO BUILD EXTENSIONS

Says President Bishop Explained to Him That Neither Cars nor Rails Can Be Obtained, Although Orders Are Months Behind-Other Complaints

Alderman J. F. Henderson of the Seventh ward discussed the street car service of Fort Worth with a Telegram reporter today:

"Several anonymous communications have appeared in The Telegram recently in regard to the street car service," said Mr. Henderson, "When a man is writing an anonymous communication to a newspaper he is likely to let his fancy dictate what he says. It is not so when he signs. his name, so I would prefer to have the writers sign their names.

"One writer, I noticed, said that the traction company had dumped two loads of gravel on Evans avenue. He forgot the rails for this line from the Arlington Heights road. This is in my ward, and the only kick the people of the Seventh have. I believe, is that the cars do not run frequently enough. From the junction with the Glenwood line south we have only a half hour service. WHAT BISHOP SAID
