





A steel bridge across the Tiger river at Arlington, several miles above here, has been washed away, and the trestle at Duncan's is gone. Several houses and a barn were destroyed and many damaged at Greer's. Southern railway trains are at a standstill. A special train is being made up here to take the place of No. 39, now on the other side of the trestle near Duncan's. No. 36 from Atlanta was stopped by a bridge being down at Greer's. River at this place is higher than it has been in years.



That Many More School Children in Tarrant County Between the Ages of 8 and 17 Years This Year Than There Were One Year Ago-Count in Fort Worth

The school census of Tarrant county, which will have been completed before the close of the present week, will, it is predicted, show a gain of 1,000 children in the county between the ages of 8 and 17 years during the past year.

The estimated gain is based on the result of the census in Fort Worth and Marine district, waich, completed, represents a total increase over last year, of 861. The total in the city of Fort Worth was 5,528, a gain over last year of 601. The gain in Marine district was 260, thirty-four of whom were colored. The total number of colored children in the city between 8 and 17 years is 948.

THE CENSUS BY WARDS

The largest gain in any one ward in Fort Worth is recorded in the Fifth, in which the increase was 114, the present total being 735. In this ward is also registered the largest number of any ward in the city. The second largest is the Sixth, in which the total is 704, the gain in this ward during the past year amounting to only fifty-one. The Second, ward gained fifty-two, the Eighth eightyfour and the Ninth forty.
