Consul General Mason at Berlin Writes of a Treatment That Has Proven of Great Success in Germany

H. Mason, writing from Berlin, says: At the last meeting of the medical lety of Berlin, at which were prestists of Germany, there was presented by Dr. Danelius and Prof. Theodor Sommerfeld an elaborate thesis deease by inhalation, or rather fumigation, with the combined fumes of sucalyptus, sulphur and charcoal. These experiments have been a subject of keen and sustained interest among the foremost medical men of the results reported, and the fact that these results may constitute an immastery of a disease which has become one of the most widespread and fatal scourges of the human race, give ordinary limits of pathological discussion.
