



The storm created much alarm, many citizens fearing that Fort Worth was about to be effaced by a tornado. The wind was stiff enough to set all but the strongest ouses to shaking on their foundations. while the play of lightning and the terrific peals of thunder added terror to the prospect. According to the local veather bureau the wind reached a relocity of 36 miles an hour, but in gusts it attained ever a higher rate. rees were blown down, chairs swept off porches, and, in the downtown secon, awnings and signboards wells yanked loose from their moorings and sent scudding into the street.

NEW PHASE OF STRIKES

· Charge of Conspiracy

NEW YORK, June 22.-There has een made public the text of the deision of the local steamboat inspectors in the case of Joseph Cornell, one of the marine engineers of this port who struck for higher wages and shorter hours. It showed that the chief reason for the revocation of his license was his connection with an organization, the Marine Engineers' association, whose by-laws, according to the decision, violate the spirit, if not the letter, of the provision of the United


States revised statutes. Cornell was charged with having conspired with certain other United States licensed engineers in hindering ommerce. The inspectors decided that all charges against Cornell had been sustained, and said that in arriving at this conclusion they had not felt it their duty to entertain the question whether the demand for ap increase in

It is understood that the masters and pilots, as well as the engineers, of all Atlantic seaports were awaiting the outcome of the strike at this port before striking themselves.
