Seven Men Badly Slashed at Weide, But None Thought Likely to Die-Trouble Followed a Night's Dancing

Fuller details of the bloody affair have come to light today. It seems that the row started at a ball given at the residence of William Heffermeyer, four miles east of this city, and everything passed off pleasantly until about 1 o'clock Sunday morning, when a disagreement took place between Henry Zeismer and his friends on one side and the two Wellmann boys on the other, resulting in a general free fight that lasted several minutes. At its conclusion it was ascertained that both of the Wellmanns had received serious stabs with knives, a man named Bominghaur had received a gash across the fore, head, Fritz Zeisemeyer had been stab; bed twice in the back, Hermann Zeisemeyer had received seven stabs in the back, stomach and head, and two other men, names unknown, had received slight cuts. Hermann Zeisemeyer's condition is thought to be the most serious of any of the wounded men.

# AT BELGRADE

New King of Servia Greeted By Soldiers and People. Russian and Austrian Ministers the Only Foreigners

BELGRADE, June 24 .- King Peter arrived here at 10 o'clock this morning. He was received with great enthusiasm. The ministers and government officials, judges, municipal and military authorities and leading citizens were assembled on the platform of the railroad station, which was profusely decorated. The only foreign representatives who participated in the reception to the king were the Russian Minister M. Ticharykoff and the Austrian Minister Kerr-Rumba, with the members of their respective legations. A guard of honor, with a band, saluted as King Peter descended from his car and greeted the cabinet ministers.

Russian minister presented the Austrian minister. The Austrian minister has not had any intercourse with the provisional government. The procession formed and the king proceeded to the cathedral. The streets were lined with troops and crowded with people, who had been pouring into Belgrade from the provinces during the last day or two. After the celebration of mass, which was attended with
