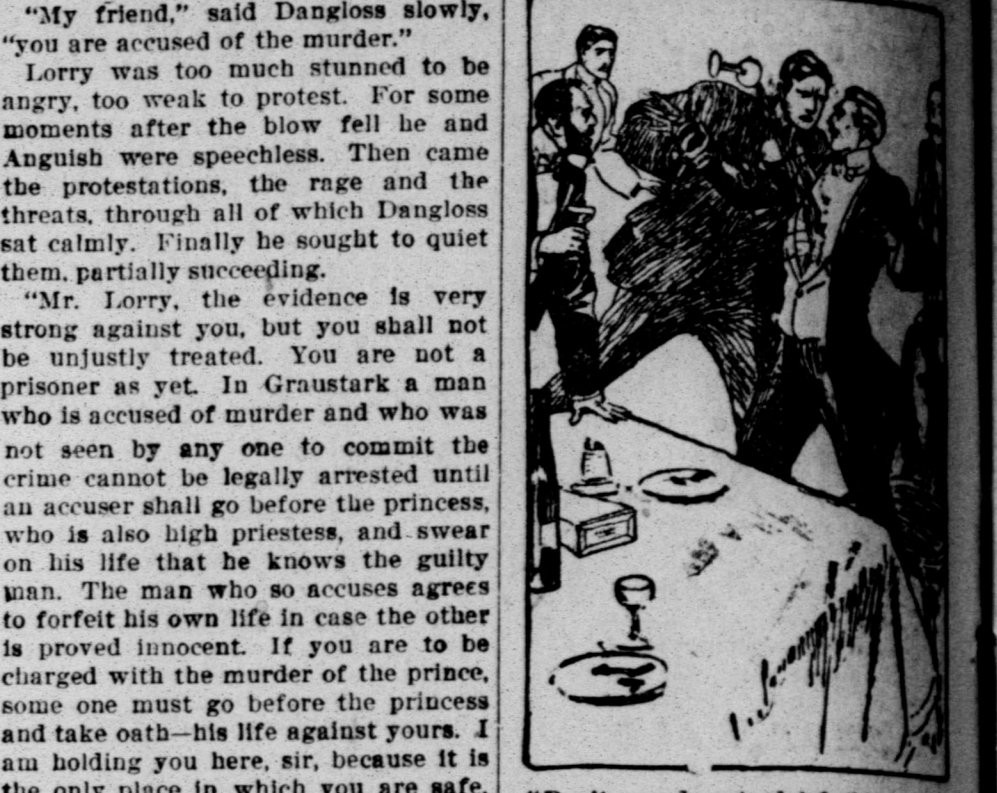

DALHART BOASTS OF ITS HOLDINGS

Extensive Improvements Are Being Made by Rock Island Railroad in That Section of the West

GENERAL MANAGER IS POPULAR MAN

All State Line Points Think He Carries the Shops in His Pocket and Is Looking for a Location—What Other Lines Are Doing Now

DALHART, Tex., July 29.—The Rock Island is completing arrangements for extensive improvements at Dalhart and it is expected that early in August the Golden States Limited and a fast freight schedule will go into effect between Chicago and the coast. The above move will add several crews to this division.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe surveyors, who have been employed for some time running preliminary lines from Dodge City, Kan., to Santa Rosa, N. M., paralleling the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, recently abandoned their work and transferred to San Francisco, where a line will be run to Portland, Ore.

The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railway is sinking several ten-inch wells at pumping stations on this division, doubling coal chutes and making general arrangements for increased traffic.

The Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf, with the abandonment of its Tucumcari cutoff, has decided to use the Denver tracks from Amarillo to Dalhart for its excursion business, transferring its through cars to the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific at Dalhart. It is probable a general transfer of freight and passenger equipment between these two companies will be inaugurated soon between Amarillo and Dalhart.

Captain J. H. Hawley, city engineer and general manager of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific at Dalhart, stands high as an official and railroad builder, having constructed all the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific lines west of the Missouri river. Mr. Conlen is one of the young progressive men of the system. He is true to and held in the highest esteem by each employe and the public in general. The Dalhart private car is a dream of beauty, with every improvement, and his residence the most commodious and costly in the city. Dalhart is proud of such men and attempts to possess as meritworthy a citizen. Mr. Conlen is absent this week attending the convolve of officials at Chicago.

One of the amusing features connected with the superintendent's office of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific at Dalhart, is that on his arrival at either Texhoma, Okla., or Tucumcari, N. M., a state occasion is made of it, each general employe, the captain has the general offices, roundhouse, shops and division headquarters in his side pocket. This is not the case and never will be. They are permanently located at Dalhart, Dallam county, Texas, a junction point with the Rock Island and Denver City, Colorado Southern, Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf and Frisco lines, the railroad center of Northwest Texas and the gateway to New Mexico and the Southwest.

The Southwestern Emigration company of St. Louis had representatives here this week and held public meetings at the corner of the Grand for the purpose of inducing emigration to Dalhart and county, where the cheapest and best lands are to be had in the Panhandle.

A tribe of Red Men was organized here last night, to the number of 42 charter members. They are an active, progressive secret order for Dalhart, with the Eastern Star chapter and commandery under application.

George Few and C. H. Summers, the Dallas, Cleburne and Southwestern Railway Conductors, are back from Chicago and report all work satisfactory.

TO BUILD TO GLEN ROSE Manager Myers Says the Town Will Be on the Route

CLEBURNE, Texas, July 29.—President and General Manager W. J. Myers of the Dallas, Cleburne and Southwestern was here today on his way to the sale of town lots at Egan, and thence north. President Myers stated that work would begin about Sept. 1 on the southwest extension of the road that they wished to make Glen Rose and would do so regardless of the extra expense if a practical route in and out of the place could be found. Mr. Myers will go north to perfect plans for the southern extension, which work they propose to do the coming winter.

The city council held its regular meeting yesterday. County Judge Goldsmith spoke to the council, giving notice that the county would in future expect the city to take care of her own paupers, living and dead, and of contagious diseases within the city limits. A board of arbitration or committee from the council will meet the commissioners and try to settle the matter.

CAPITAL CITY NEWS AUSTIN, Texas, July 29.—Congressman John Garner of Uvalde was in the city yesterday. He called to see the governor and railroad commission on some private matters. Mr. Garner says his part of the state is in fine feather.

Judge Winchester Kelso, from Eagle Pass, arrived in Austin yesterday to look after some private matters in the land office. Judge Kelso reports the Rio Grande court Mississippi rapids, eight miles long, is being built.

Judge Storey received a stalk of cotton by express yesterday raised on his farm near Lockhart. The stalk was three and a half feet high, very vigorous growth and had forty-eight matured bolls on it. There were also squares enough to increase this number to seventy-five. Only a few boll weevils were found after a very close examination. This stalk grew on land that produced one bale to sixty acres last year on account of the ravages of the weevil and flood.

The railroad commission issued an order yesterday refusing to grant the application of sundry citizens of McLennan county to compel the Texas Central and Houston and Texas Central railroads to establish a depot and maintain a station agent at Ross, the intersection of the above named lines. This matter was the subject of an interesting hearing before the commissioners in June.

The board of summer normal examiners has finished grading the examination papers from twenty-six of the eighty normals held during the past summer. At this rate the board will complete its labors and adjourn in about three weeks.

From the effect of the electric storm that played around the capital yesterday the great elevator was rendered hors du combat and for some time stood between the second and third floors quivering and emitting a grinding, groaning sound like some mighty thing possessed of real life.

There was plenty doing in the state purchasing agent's department today. bids were opened for furnishing the various state institutions with supplies for the ensuing year. Governor Latham, Comptroller Stevens and State Purchasing Agent Anderson were present and the office was full of anxious merchants.

The bids were numerous, a good many of which were thrown out because not accompanied by bond or check. Groceries will be considered first, but no awards will be made for several days.

ENGINEER CETTI THERE AUSTIN, Texas, July 30.—Engineer Cetti of the engineering department of Fort Worth came to Austin today and will commence the work of making a survey of Congress avenue for the storm sewer. John H. Hawley, city engineer of Fort Worth, has been contracted with to make the specifications and this work is being done as a part of his contract.

HE SHOOTS HIS WIFE Tom Jones Wounds His Better Half in a Domestic Row

BONHAM, Texas, July 28.—Tom Jones, colored, shot his wife, Nancy Jones, yesterday morning and was arrested and lodged in jail on a charge of attempt to murder.

Nancy was shot with a thirty-eight-caliber revolver just above the right breast, the ball ranking downward and came out near the hip.

The couple had not been getting along very well for some time. He came in and raised a row with his wife and struck her with a crutch. She in turn knocked him down on the bed and jumped on him. Her daughter ran in and Tom drew his pistol and fired at his wife with the above result.

CROPS AT GRANGER GRANGER, Texas, July 29.—A heavy rain fell here last night and this morning and still continues, which is feared will be a great injury to the cotton crops, owing to the preceding rains. It will have a tendency to cause the boll weevil to begin earlier than usual, and as a matter of course the cotton will grow up and make a large weed without bearing fruit. The only way to overcome this great obstacle is for the farmer to get to work as soon as they can get into the fields, and top the cotton about a foot from the top, which will insure its spreading. Hence will stop the growth unless they do this crops will not be as large as heretofore reported.
