ROME, August 4.—Cardinal Sarto, Patriarch of Venice, was elected Pope.

Cardinal Macchi, secretary of the apostillic briefs, announced to the crowd assembled before St. Peter's that Cardinal Sarto has been elected pope and he has taken the name of Pius X. Troops on duty immediately lined up on the piazza and presented arms.

At ten minutes after 12 this afternoon Pope Pius X appeared inside the balcony basilica and blessed the populace, amid the acclamations of the enormous crowd assembled upon the piazza.

As the new pontiff stepped from behind the altar, the only touch of color about him being his red and gold shoes, he really seemed to be the embodiment of his holy office.

His face was pale and clearly softened by emotion. He paused a moment as he came before the expectant cardinals and seated himself on the throne with a hurried movement, as though he had suddenly grown weak. His back was to the altar and he was enthroned to serve the socalled "first obedience" of the cardinals.

They came forward one by one, some calm and smiling, others sober and non-committal, while others found considerable difficulty, even at this hour, of concealing their too obvious

Test Thus Far Shows That the Supply Is Well Over Three Million Gallons Per Day

system is not completed and will not be ompleted until I am assured that there a supply of 3,000,000 gallons a day said City Engineer John B. Hawley this morning in reply to a Telegram reporter's question. Mr. Hawley continued:

The test has now extended continuous over a period of about twenty days. It has demonstrated, thus far, that the supply is over 3,000 gallons, but just how much over that figure, I am at present unable to say. With the pumps running at 2 100 000 gallons continuously we have found that the water in the wells drops to point about fourteen or fifteen feet say just how much over 3,500,000 gallons per day the Mead system will be able to urnish to the city, nor can I venture a forecast of the premanency of the flow, a the test has not proceeded far enough for that. Tests on the 3.540.000 basis show that the water in the well reaches a stand little above the tunnels.

CITY USES 3,000,000

"The city at present uses about 2,000,000 gallons of water a day, and with the constant extension of the meter system waste, it will be several years before the city will use more than 3,000,000 a day so that if Mr. Mead's confident expecta
