#### BLANKS PRINTED FOR RAILROADERS

Men Protest They Have Done Being Made to Ascertain to What Extent the Authority Has Been Used by Others

What the police believe to be a conspiracy against railroads and others to defraud by means of forgery, and other means, was unearthed this morning by Detective Steve Potts, after several

days of hard work As a result of Detective Potts' inves tigation, A. D. Allan, proprietor of the Fort Worth Stamp Company, 709 Lain street, and his employe. David C. Gowdey, were placed under arrest at 10 o'clock and taken to the court house where they were questioned by County Attorney Lattimore.

According to Detective Potts, the men admitted their guilt, in part, but claimed that they had violated no law. When the men were arrested, Detecive Potts took possession of a large stack of printed matter, which is said to be of fraudulent origin, and of a number of stamps, purporting on their aces to be the office stamps of railvay superintendents, master mechancs, yard masters and others. There were thirty-five of these stamps in an

#### "CLEARANCES"

The value of a clearance therefore s considerable, and it is charged by the police that Allan did a big business, inasmuch as he fixed a price well within the reach of any one. The police say that he charged \$1 a piece for them.

VALUE OF A CLEARANCE Worth the value of a clearance here would be immeasurable, as it is much more difficult for a discharged railroad man to obtain a position than it is for Henry Combs Had Wealth But Lived In one possessing a clearance.

It is understood that fraudulent clearances have become so numerous in Texas hat the attention of the railroads has for ome time been directed toward unearthng those issuing them. Roads having eadquarters in Fort Worth have recently turned down many applicants for transportation who presnted clearances, simply because it appeared that the clearances were forgeries.

A young Fort Worth man some days ago applied to the stamp company for clearance. He gave his name as J. H. McDuff, and it is claimed he never had worked as a railroad man. He paid his dollar, however, and received the fol-

lowing clearance: "Fort Worth and Denver City Railway: This is to certify that J. H. McDuff has been employed in the capacity of brakeman at Fort Worth, in the transportation department of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway from Oct. 10, 1902, to July 18, 1903.

"Resigned, services satisfactory, "W. R. SCOTT, "General Superintendent." SCOTT NOT HERE
