STORM CURVES FROM THE TEXAS GULF COAST

WEATHER BUREAU ADVISES THAT WEST INDIAN HURRICANE DOES NOT THREATEN GALVESTON, BUT IS DUE OFF SOUTH ATLANTIC COAST THURSDAY—MUCH DAMAGE IN ISLAND OF JAMAICA

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 12.—The weather bureau this morning issued the following: The West Indian storm is apparently recurring northward toward the south coast of Western Cuba. Gales will set in over the southwest Gulf...

"The storm evidently did not enter the Gulf, but recurved northeast. There are no indications at Galveston or any of the Gulf ports which would show that the storm was pointing that way."

MUCH DAMAGE IS DONE IN JAMAICA

KINGSTON, Jamaica, August 11.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The hurricane, a fringe only of which struck the western end of Jamaica yesterday, and which it was thought, passed inland, proceeding to the northwest, veered to the south early this morning and struck Jamaica with full force, inflicting damage which will take years to repair.

IT TURNS FROM THE TEXAS GULF COAST

Official Observer George Reeder of the Fort Worth weather office said this morning in regard to the hurricane which was reported as bearing on Galveston last night: "From the indications on the weather map this morning it looks as though the storm had turned off eastward and gone up the Atlantic coast. It must be about 200 miles out in the Atlantic ocean off the coast of Florida. There it was at the time observations were taken this morning at 7 o'clock, or 8 o'clock Florida time. From the direction of the wind at Jacksonville it looks as though it is possible that the storm might have been as far north as Hatteras. The wind at Jacksonville is southwest this morning and ought to be pointing straight into the storm."

LOCOMOTIVE RUN AWAY AND KILLED ANIMALS ON PRIVATE LAND

NEW YORK, August 12.—A runaway locomotive on the Erie has caused no end of excitement near Caldwell, N. J., on a branch line. The engine was a big six-wheeler. Its driver and fireman had dismounted to assist a brakeman. Suddenly it steamed away. The road ahead was down grade and the ponderous machine gathered speed rapidly. Passing Caldwell, it was running forty miles an hour.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 12.—A special from Memphis, Tenn., says: The stomach of a goat is to be analyzed by expert chemists in an effort to account for the disappearance of a number of United States revenue stamps, involving several hundred dollars.

TO MAKE CLEAN ALL COACHES

State Health Officer Tabor Is Investigating Merits of the Disinfectants Presented for His Inspection

HOW THE LAW IS TO PROTECT HEALTH

Some of the Provisions of the Act Which Is Designed to Make More Safe Public Buildings and Cars of Railway Companies in This State

AUSTIN, Texas, August 11.—As a result of the discussion during the meeting of the railway surgeons of Texas, held last week in the state health department, on the subject of the importance of disinfecting passenger coaches, the health officer has received samples of disinfectants which the proprietors claim have been used with success.

Every person having control of a public building, railway company, sleeping car company or other corporation, company or individual engaged in carrying passengers shall at their own expense within a prescribed time after receiving notice from the state health officer of the promulgation of the rules and regulations, carry the same into effect.

WEEKLY REPORT OF THE CROPS IN TEXAS

GALVESTON, Tex., August 12.—Section Director Murdock of the United States weather bureau has issued the following climate and crop service bulletin for the week ending yesterday, in Texas:

Weather Conditions.—Temperature conditions were quite uniform throughout the week, the average for the state being just about the normal. Brownwood recorded temperatures ranging from 100 to 104 degrees on the 6th, 7th and 8th; Greenville, 101 degrees on the 10th and 11th; Henrietta, 102 to 104 degrees between the 5th and 8th; Paris, 102 degrees on the 7th and 101 degrees on the 9th; and Weatherford, 101 degrees on the 8th. There was considerable cloudiness, but the only rainfall of any consequence occurred over the extreme northern portion, the east Gulf district and a few of the northern counties of the southwestern portion.

GUNBOATS ARE SEIZED BY WRIT

Mexico Appeals to Civil Authority to Have Fighting Ship Released by Officers of the Law

ALL INSTALLMENTS BUT ONE ARE PAID

Vessels Are Practically Complete and Lewis Nixon Had Bound Himself to See That the Contract for Delivery Was Carried Out

NEW YORK, August 12.—On behalf of the republic of Mexico an official protest has been made to Sheriff Corbett of Union county, at Elizabeth, N. J., against the holding of the Mexican gunboats Tampico and Vera Cruz under a writ of seizure granted by Supreme Commissioner Pinard at the request of a lumber firm for material furnished in the construction of the gunboats at the Crescent shipyard. The Tampico and Vera Cruz were seized on August 5.

The protest was made by Acting Consul General Antonio Leon Greco, in company with Lewis Nixon and Captain Manuel Ayuda, chief of the Mexican commission of inspection at Elizabeth. Previously Grajeda and Captain Ayuda appeared before a notary public in New York and declared that the Tampico and Vera Cruz were the property of the republic of Mexico.

TO PROTECT PAINTINGS

NEW YORK, August 12.—Justice McCall of the supreme court has granted a temporary injunction restraining a New York studio from altering the paintings made by William Dodge as decorations for a new hotel in Toronto, Canada. The injunction stands until the Justice shall have passed upon the right of Mr. Dodge to have his paintings remain as he finished them. Recently the artist filed a long petition with the court setting forth his work had been accepted by the architect, as originally agreed upon, and that changes are now to be made which will mutilate the paintings, such as removing the hats from the heads of a party of French settlers depicted in one scene.

NEW YORK, August 12.—The impressive and beautiful ceremonies incident to the conferring of the sacred pallium upon Archbishop Farley by Monsignor Falcoio, the papal delegate, took place in St. Patrick's cathedral this forenoon. The massive and spacious edifice was crowded with persons of prominence in all walks of life.

HELENA, Mont., August 11.—Joseph Jarvis and William Stewart, suspected of having blown up the Northern Pacific bridge at Livingston and a Northern Pacific engine near Bozeman, were given sixty days in jail today on a charge of vagrancy. The police so far have been unable to fasten the crime on them.

NEGRO DEPARTMENT STORE

NEW YORK, August 12.—At a meeting of Newark, N. J., colored men, it has been decided to establish a department store for negroes. A tent was opened at 119 or each subscriber who agreed to bring in five others. In this manner \$5,000 will be raised.

THE INSURRECTION IS IMPOSSIBLE TO HOLD IT IN CHECK AND MANY ARE REPORTED KILLED—NEW RUSSIAN CONSUL HAS NOT BEEN HEARD FROM AND DANGER MAY THREATEN HIM—MASSACRE IMPENDING

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 12.—One hundred and fifty revolutionists were killed in a fight at Sorvich August 9, according to the official Turkish reports.

CHRISTIAN MASSACRE IS NOW IMPENDING

SOFIA, August 12.—The Bulgarian foreign office received very disturbing news from its agent at Uskub. The Mussulmans there are daily gathering in the mosques and it is feared that a massacre of Christians is impending. The officials expressed the belief that the intervention of the powers alone can prevent the disaster.

LIFE OF CONSUL IS IN GREAT DANGER

SALONICA, August 12.—Dr. Mandelstam, the acting Russian consul at Uskub, who has been appointed to succeed Mr. Roetkovski, the murdered consul at Manastir, reached that town today. Some anxiety has been felt for his safety, as nothing has been heard of him since he left his post at Uskub, a month or so ago. The muteness of the Club district refused to give Dr. Mandelstam escort. The consul insisted on proceeding to his new post and having obtained an escort from Himl Pasha he started on his own responsibility across the country for Manastir.

INSTRUCTED FOR ROOSEVELT

WILKESBARRE, Pa., August 12.—The two national delegates who were elected yesterday at the republican convention at Philadelphia were the first in the country to be instructed for President Roosevelt. They were directed to use all means to procure his nomination.

THE JOHNSON MONUMENT

NEWTON, Ill., August 12.—The Hale Johnson monument will be unveiled today near Peoria, by insurgents. Striking men in the city and county are active in parish school affairs and in the work of the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

RETURNS FROM UNITED AMERICA

SARASOTA, Fla., August 12.—Captain Charles E. Meenon, who for twenty years connected with the Cuban and Central American revolutionary expeditions, has arrived here from Central America. He was arrested in Honduras for participation in the rebellion, but was released through the interposition of the American consul.

ASSESSMENT IS RAISED

James J. Hill Must Pay on Higher Property Values. ST. PAUL, Minn., August 12.—James J. Hill's personal property assessment has been raised from \$188,000 to \$290,000 by the board of equalization. Mayor Smith was the only one who did not care to act hastily in raising the assessment.

FIRE IN GRAND RAPIDS

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., August 12.—Fire this morning destroyed Radcliffe & Co.'s four-story brick warehouse here, entailing a loss of over \$100,000. The building was filled with valuable furniture owned by local dealers.

MANY FORGERIES OF FIRM'S NAME

Eight Cases Reported This Summer in Which Name of The J. J. Langever Co. Has Been Illegally Signed

LAST CASE GIVEN TO COUNTY ATTORNEY

Manager of the Firm Warns Merchants—Give Description of The J. J. Langever Co. Checks All Employees Are Paid in Cash

The J. J. Langever company has been experiencing more trouble from forgeries during the past summer than all other firms in Fort Worth combined. Eight different checks with forged signatures have been cashed in the city during that time, and in neither event has the perpetrator been detected. This week a check for \$3 was placed in the hands of the county attorney by J. F. Luther, a grocer, of 209 West Weatherford street. The paper was cashed nearly two months ago. Mr. Luther said this morning that the party presenting it came into his store one Saturday evening, and after making a small purchase of groceries, presented a check for \$3 on the Fort Worth National bank. Mr. Luther said he was very busy at the time and did not stop to examine the check very closely. He noticed that the paper bore the signature of the J. J. Langever company and was also under the impression that the man who presented it had been trading at the store regularly, consequently he did not hesitate to accept it in payment of the bill.

A closer inspection of the note, however, has revealed the fact that the indorsement is in the same handwriting as the note is signed. The name of Langever is also misspelled.

A WARNING TO MERCHANTS J. J. Langever stated this morning that this is the eighth time this summer that his firm's name has been forged to checks. In one instance the check passed through several hands and got to the Farmers and Mechanics' National bank, the institution with which the J. J. Langever company conducts its banking business, before the forgery was detected.

Mr. Langever further stated, and requests The Telegram to announce for the benefit of all who may be concerned, that the J. J. Langever company does not issue checks in payment for services rendered by its employees. For the past eight years the policy of the firm has been to pay in cash.

Furthermore, the checks issued by the J. J. Langever company are on the Farmers and Mechanics' National bank. The check is one peculiarly characteristic and when described may be easily detected from any substitution which may be attempted.

The J. J. Langever company's checks are printed in red ink, one end of the paper bearing an advertisement of the firm. The signature of the firm, The J. J. Langever Co., is printed in red at the lower right hand corner of the check, and below this is a line, also in red, "Per Manager." Between the firm name and the "Manager" line is a place for the signature of J. J. Langever, which must be attached to make the check valid.

This information is given for the benefit of those who are accustomed to cashing all manner of checks.

Heavy rain fell in Clay county, Texas, at Henrietta, 2.28 inches falling. Moderate showers fell in Parker, Erath, Brown and Tarrant and Dallas counties, but not yet reported. The storm has apparently returned to the northeast and is off the east coast of Florida.

The weather in Fort Worth and vicinity will continue unsettled, with occasional showers.

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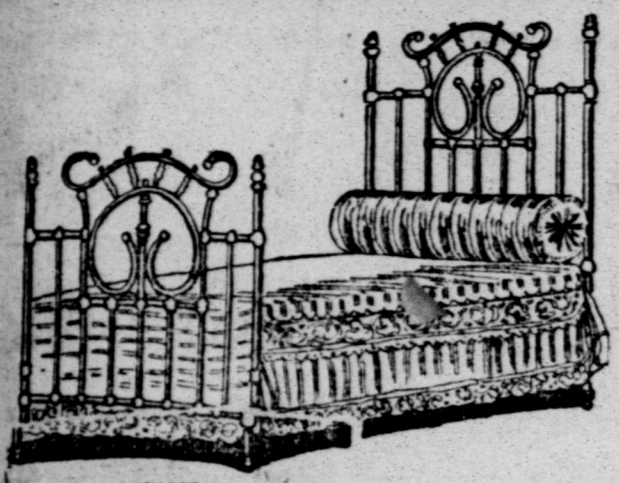

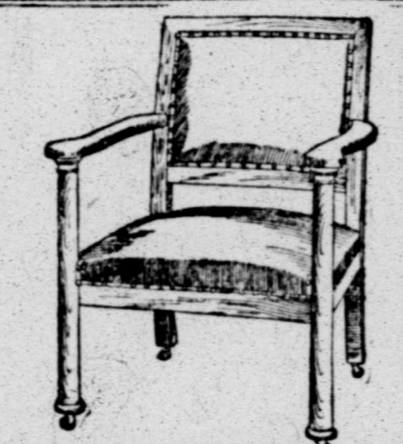

The quality of the offering averaged fair, but there was more trashy stuff in than has been seen at the yards in a week. Quotations are about steady. The best steers sold during the morning for feeders and brought \$2.75. Top calves again reached \$4, but only eight head brought that figure.

TOP HOGS \$5.90
Monday, July 13, top hogs sold at \$5.90, and that figure was again equalled today for the first time in the interval of a month. Today's top hogs were shipped by E. J. Coyle of Skedee, Ok. They were smooth and well graded Poland Chinas and averaged 196 pounds, and were bought by the Houston Packing Company. The hog market was stronger this morning, but prices are still about 20 cents above the normal, owing to the presence of outside buyers who want hogs for butcher trade. Besides Armour and Swift, the following firms have been represented at the hog yards this week: Houston Packing Company of Houston, Alamo Dressed Beef and Packing Company of San Antonio, Elliott & Bell of Waxahatchie, Brazos Packing Company of Waco, Myers & Tinkle of Corsicana. A New Orleans buyer has also been looking over the offering, but has bought nothing.

It begins to look as if the predicted \$4 per hundred for hogs would be reached at Fort Worth before anywhere else in the country. Chicago today quotes best light hogs at \$5.75; Kansas City the same quality at \$5.65. St. Louis quotes the best at \$5.80, but two out of today's three loads sold here today above that figure. The market here, however, is likely to drop back to normal figures if the outside buyers leave.

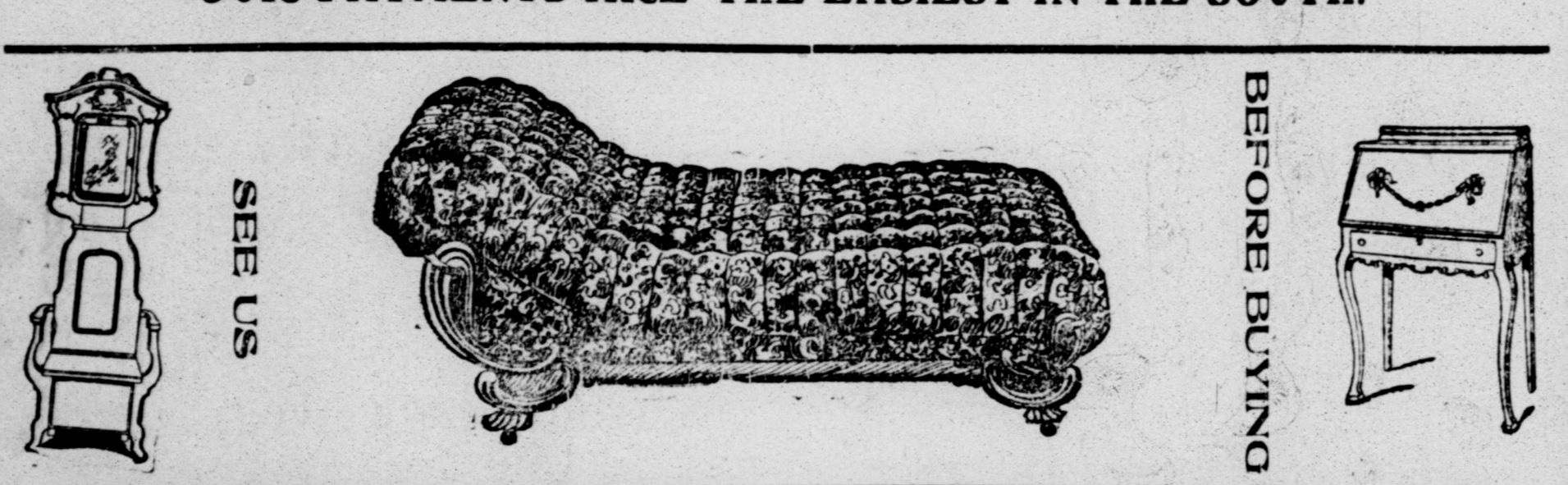

BRICKBATS FOR THE PANTHER NINE

Dallas "Sports" Hurl Them From Bleachers—Did Conover Try to Disable Disch?

Dallas ball patrons found the game yesterday up to the highest standards of sport as viewed through Dallas spectacles.

From the time the Fort Worth players went to the field for the preliminary practice and received from the bleachers a shower of broken bricks to the moment when the last of Conover's vicious and murderous balls landed on Disch with paralyzing effect, the Dallasites howled with frenzied fervor.

It was the Dallas idea of sport. Conover with the assistance of Umpire Hamilton did not stint their enjoyment. The volley of bricks that ushered in the game, while doing no physical damage, was evidence to the Panthers of what was before them.

The rank decisions of the umpire that "made good" Dallas men who were so plainly out that the grandstand acknowledged it, was nothing more than the system of umpiring Fort Worth has seen before. The calling strikes when the ball almost raised the dust under the batter's feet was also of the kind of umpiring that has been handed the Panthers all season.

But the system reached a climax when Hamilton refused Disch his base after a ball from Conover had gone three feet wide of the plate, hitting the batter with such terrific force as to almost disable him.

Umpiring of this sort passes from the domain of local loyalty and partiality and perches aloft as the guardian spirit of professional slugging.

But it suited the Dallas patrons in the grand stand, scorer's box and the bleachers.

In the previous inning, when Lockhead had been disabled by a pitched ball that almost left him with a broken arm, the enthusiasm had been unbounded and the pitcher was hilariously commended.

Such is the Dallas idea of sport. The Panthers made a poor showing. They would have been more than human if, under the circumstances, they had done better.

Lockhead pitched only a fair game. He gave one base on balls, breaking even in strike outs. The Steers found him with en-

WOULD BENEFIT TEXAS MILLERS

Movement Started at Meeting of Texas Millers Yesterday to Secure More Advantageous Freight Rates

MEMPHIS IS GREAT GRAIN GATEWAY

What the Present Conditions Mean—Change Millers Ask, and General Results Which Would Follow a Conformity to Their Request

A movement was inaugurated at the meeting of the Texas Millers' Association in Fort Worth yesterday, which may result in a greater stimulation to that industry than any other one thing which has been attained in recent years. The purpose of the association is to secure more favorable freight rates for the southeastern markets, which, at present, are reached by Texas millers with their products at a great disadvantage in competition with mills of that part of the country.

The present freight rate on wheat from Texas common points to Memphis, Tenn., is 20 cents. Memphis is the great gateway. The southeastern millers buy their wheat from the Memphis mill, which is shipped and milled at Nashville, Chattanooga and Atlanta and the flour forwarded to its final destination at points beyond without any penalty for milling in transit, thus making a through rate from points of origin of the wheat to the final destination of the flour at 40 cents per hundred, while the Texas miller pays 22 1/2 cents for his flour and 25 cents for his bran when shipped in straight car load lots up to Memphis, and then is charged 20 cents per hundred additional for the haul beyond Memphis. The through rate for the Texas product thus reaches 42 1/2 cents for the flour and 45 cents for the bran.

The Texas Millers' Association is desirous that interstate lines protect the same rate on flour and bran up to Memphis that is now and hereafter may be protected on wheat for the same haul.

COMET BRIGHTEST ON AUGUST 27

Borelli's Monster Will Reach the Point in Its Orbit Nearest the Earth on That Date

Upon August 27 Borelli's comet, which has been creating so much interest lately, will appear brighter than at any other time to the people of the world. At present it is considerably brighter than the smallest star which is visible to the human eye.

The comet is moving through the northern heavens at a rate of 8,000,000 miles a day, or 6,000 miles a minute, and is constantly nearing the sun. The comet from its nose to the end of its tail is 200,000,000 miles in length.

It is, as everyone probably knows, situated in the constellation Cygnus, about six degrees southwest of the bright star Alpha Cygni—the brightest and most northern star of the constellation. This constellation, popularly known as the Swan, lies not far to the east of Vega, the star of the first magnitude, and is about twice as far away from the well-known polar star and almost directly south of it.

Professor C. A. Young of Princeton university, known as "Twinkle" Young to the students, has the following definition of a comet: "A comet is nothing but a 'sand bank'—that is, it is a swarm of solid particles of unknown size and widely separated, say, pinheads, several hundred feet apart, each particle carrying with it an envelope of gas, largely hydrocarbon, in which light is produced, either by electrical discharges between the particles or by some other light, the evolving action being due to the sun's influence."

200,000,000 MILES LONG
Scientists have attempted to figure out what would happen if a comet were to hit the earth. This comet is 200,000,000 miles long at present. The earth is only 25,000 miles in circumference. What chance the earth would have with its paltry 8,000 miles of diameter against a monster which counts its length by the millions of miles is too much for the imagination to figure.

Astronomers say that if Borelli's comet were to hit us it would coil about the earth like a big boa constrictor about its victim. It would keep on coiling about the earth until its hundreds of millions of miles of length were coiled.

Other astronomers claim that in 1861 a comet several times larger than the one now heading this way hit the earth while traveling at the rate of 10,000,000 miles a day, and nobody knew it. The earth has more than once passed through the train of meteors that attend comets, and it also passed through the tenuous tail of the famous comet of 1861 without injury. The mean density of a comet's tail is far lower than that of the best air pump vacuum, so that it is not a hard thing to hit. Even near the nucleus the density is not great.

In speaking of the probably effect of a collision between the comet and the earth, Garrett P. Serviss, the well-known astronomer, said:

"I will say that it is my belief that if this comet should meet the earth in a square end-on collision the only result would be a marvellously beautiful spectacle in the heavens caused by the instantaneous ignition and dissipation of the meteoric particles composing the body of the comet."

Some astronomers claim that a comet only hits the earth once in fifteen hundred million years. In that case the earth may be spared the sensation until the year 1500001912.

IT GOES ABROAD TO BE MATURED

Kentucky Whisky Will Grow Old in Warehouses in Hamburg and Bremen

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 12.—Kentucky distillers are making preparations for the exportation of 20,000 barrels of whiskey to Hamburg and Bremen for storage purposes. It is principally of the crop of 1903.

This is the first time in the history of Kentucky that any large amount of young whiskey was exported and matured in Europe. Heretofore whiskey has only been exported when about to be forced out of bond. This will be the largest exportation since 1857, when an immense amount of whiskey was about to be forced out of bond. At that time the distillers, rather than pay the tax when prices were depressed, sent shipment after shipment to the warehouses in Hamburg and Bremen.

At this time there is no depression in the market and the exportation is to be made largely on account of the lower storage charges in Europe. The whiskey to be sent abroad is intended largely for the trade in California and other western states. Distillers have found it costs less to send whiskey to Bremen and Hamburg and ship it from there to San Francisco by way of Cape Horn, than it costs to ship it from Louisville to San Francisco by rail.

The annual report of Chief Deputy Collector Edmiston, issued today, showed that there are 53,083,619 gallons of whiskey in bond in this district.

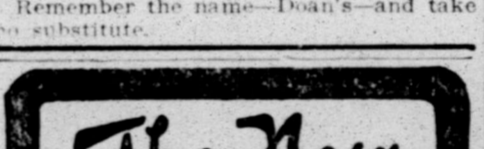
