POPE PIUS X IS IN FAILING HEALTH

BERLIN, Aug. 29.—The most extraordinary reports have sprung into circulation during the last few days respecting not only the physical, but the mental health of the new pope, Pius X. In Cologne, one of the most important Catholic centers in Northern Europe, the people do not conceal their fears that the successor of Leo XIII will not be able to support very long the fatigues and confinement of the great position so suddenly thrust upon him.

When the pope gave communion to the Venetian pilgrims, who overcrowded the small Pauline chapel, the heat and the vitiated air caused the pontiff to faint, while kneeling after mass. SENATOR CLARK WILL BUILD A RAILROAD

"I want no concessions, and while I have authorized an issue of stock, I don't intend to place it on the market, at least at present. Corporations have disgusted the public with the stock they throw on the market. The people have plenty of money, but they don't like to be gulfed with the stock of these gigantic corporations, especially by such trusts as confer no benefits whatever upon the public. Morgan and others thought the public would buy anything. It's a bad thing to make the worm turn. What you say about the nation taking the ownership of railways does not frighten me. Should it do so, it would amply recompense the present owners. Government ownership won't come in our time. I see one great objection to national ownership of railways, if accomplished, could never be turned out. All the railway employees of the country would work for that party. What an army they constitute. It is difficult enough now to supplant an administration. The postoffice frauds are a blight upon our civilization."

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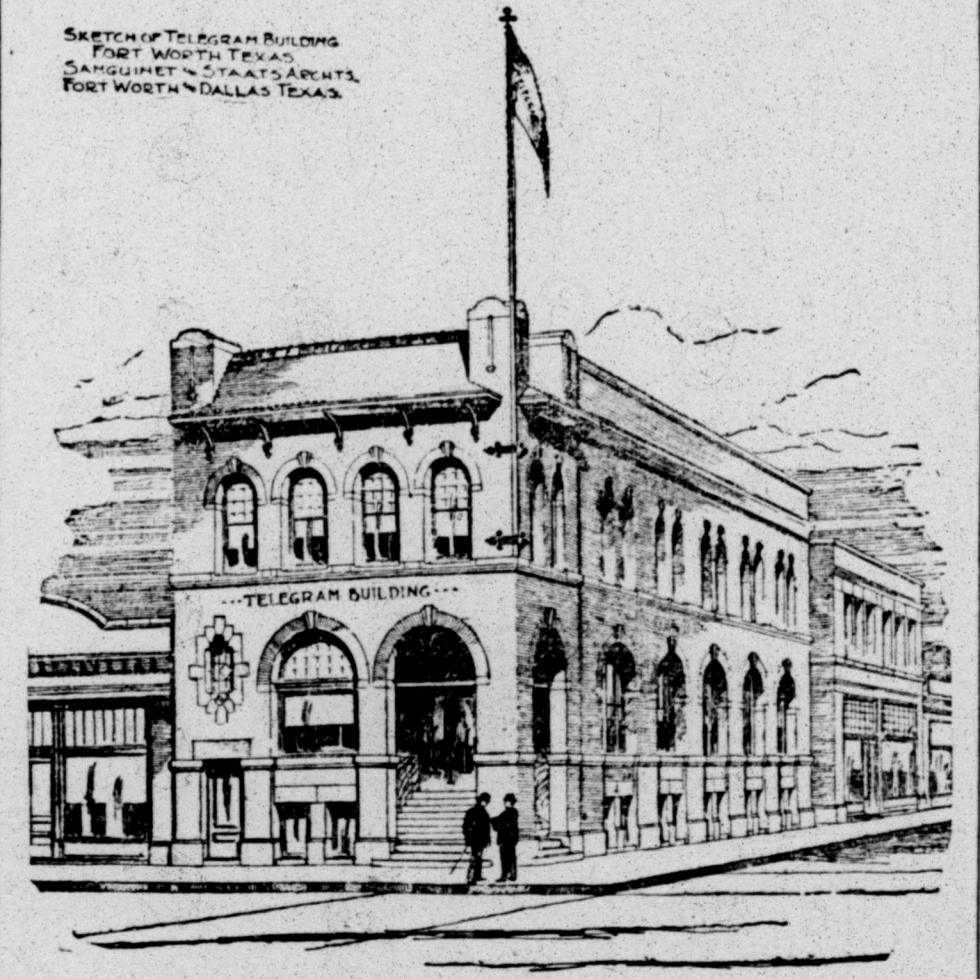
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The above is a picture of the building which is now in course of construction at the corner of Eighth and a Throckmorton streets, which will be owned and occupied by The Telegram.

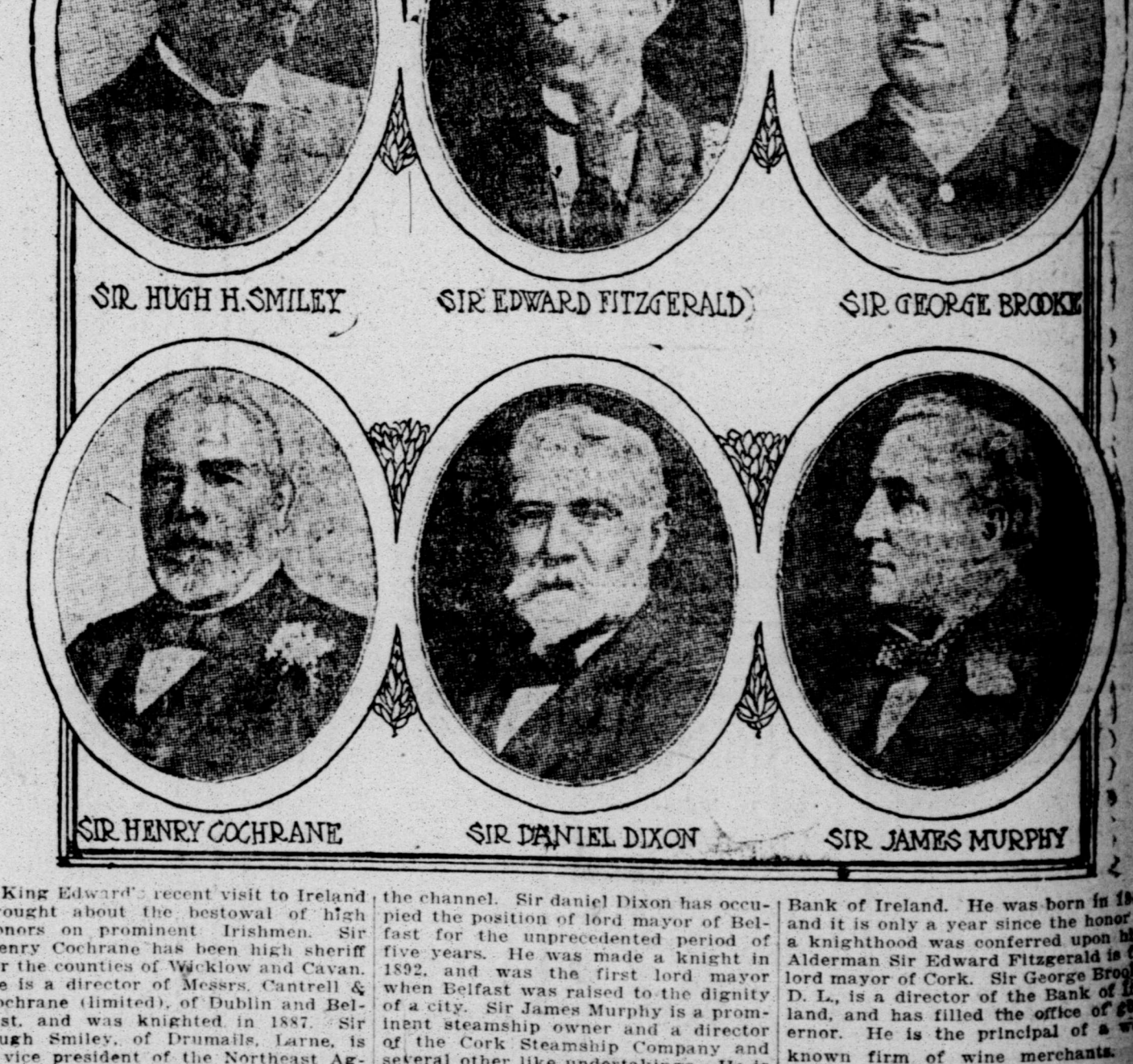

"Well, young man," said the crone, "you've been here for three weeks with my daughter. I dare say you've been trying to rob me of her."

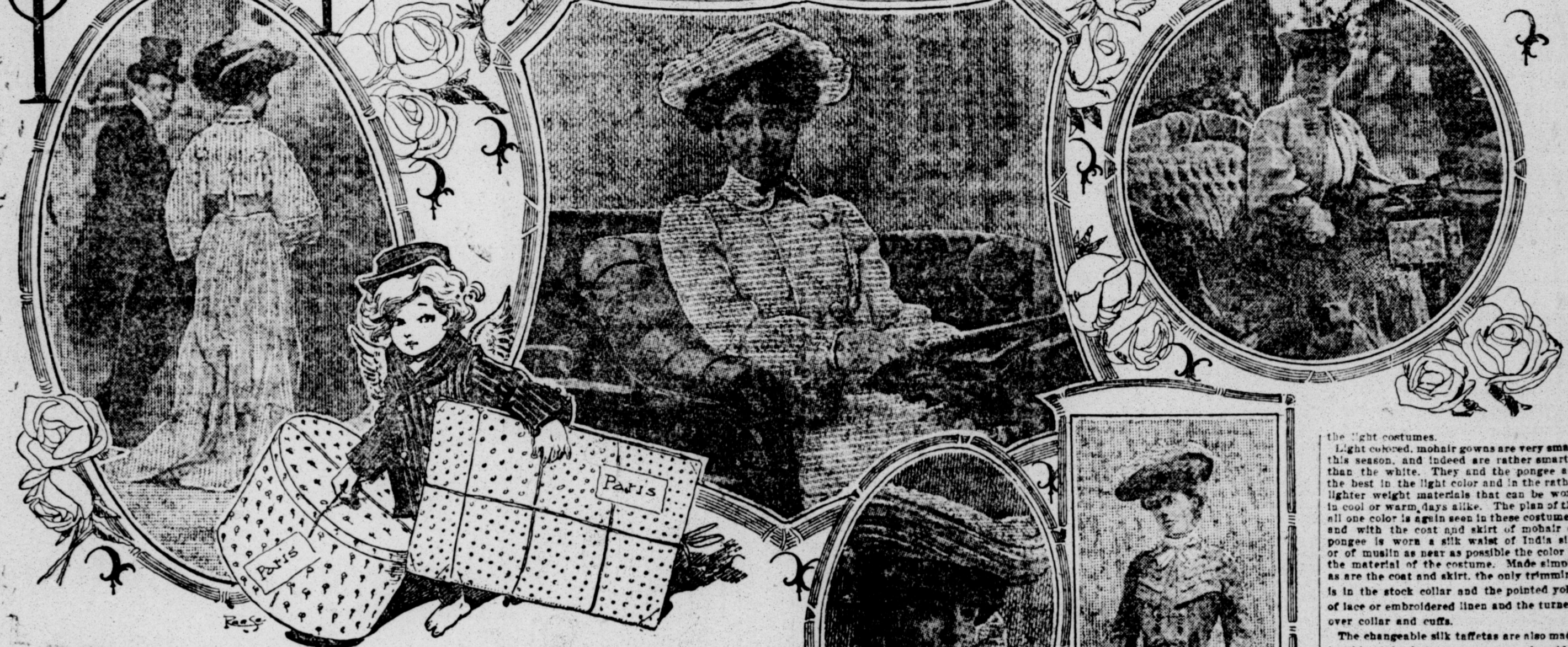
"My dear aunt, I would not rob you of her for the world. But I beg of you not to separate me from one I love. Together we will—"

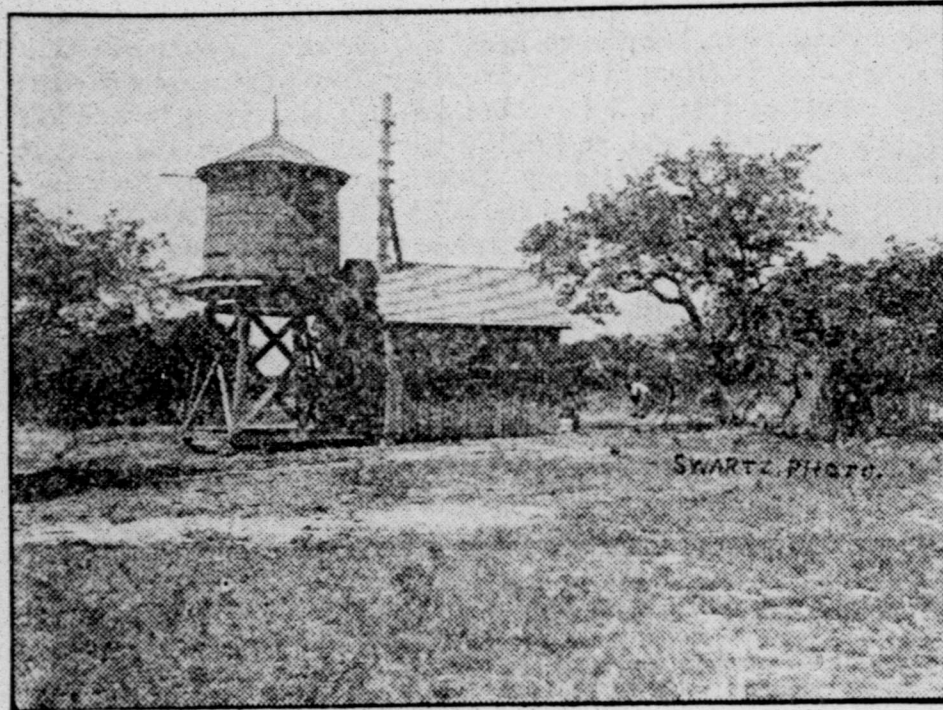

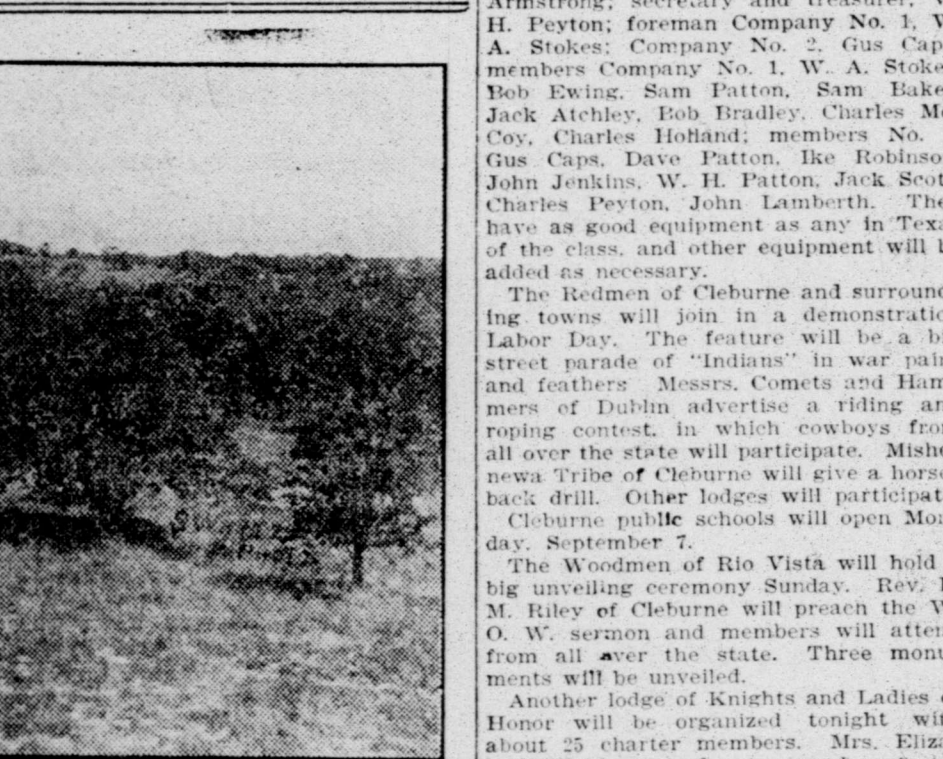

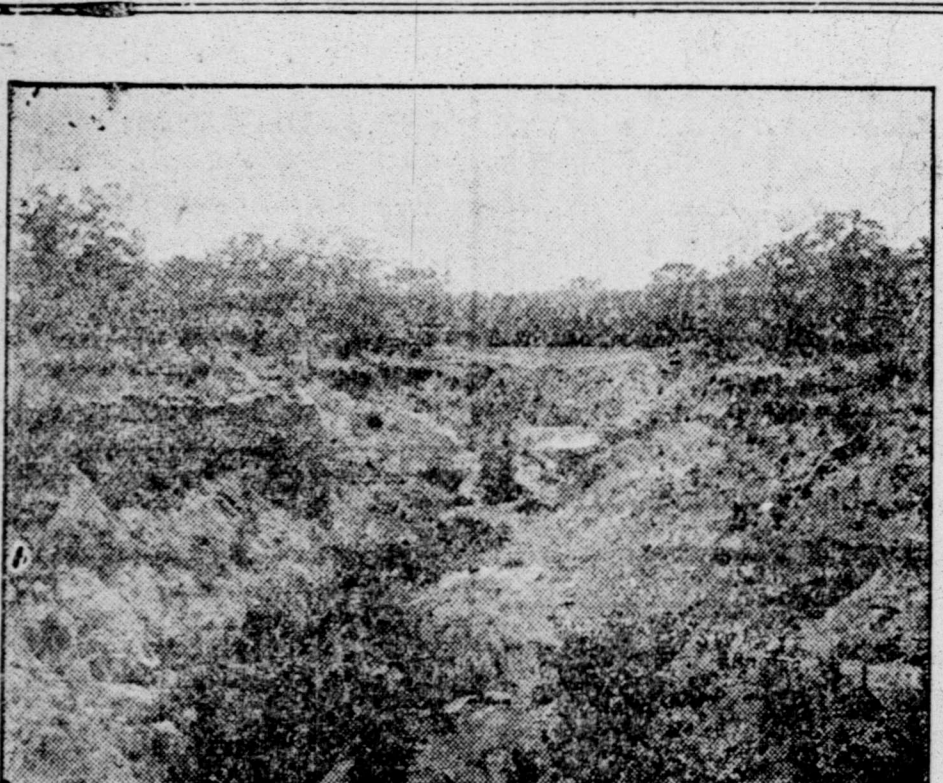

IN CLAY COUNTY OIL FIELDS

The Excitement Continues and There Is Much Interest Manifested in Every Quarter Regarding Prospects

MORE NEW WELLS ARE BEING DRILLED DAILY

Product Is Used as Fuel for Gasoline Engines, and Many Letters of Inquiry Have Been Received - People Are Taking Active Interest

HENRIETTA, Tex., August 29.—Excitement still increases in the Clay county oil fields. There is much activity manifested in every quarter. Several leases have been made recently, notably one to C. A. McAfee, an old time oil man, recently an operator in the Boulder, Cal. field, who leased from Thomas Grubb 600 acres two miles southwest of the original or first well.

The Jones well still shows gas in quantities sufficient to burn readily and a goodly quantity of oil. The Jones company has commenced the drilling of another well about 200 feet from its No. 1. They are one mile south of the original well.

The Leach-Tate company is drilling with the very best of prospects, six miles southeast of the original well. The Landrum people, three-quarters of a mile northwest of the original well, is down 250 feet, with both gas and oil. The water is boiling some. They are casing the water off and will continue drilling, believing they will have the best well in the field before 400 feet is reached.

Mr. McCord commenced drilling yesterday for J. D. Stine one-half mile west of the original well. McCord has already brought in five producers and guarantees to bring in a producer for Mr. Stine. The Dismuke people from Boulder, Col., are drilling one mile southwest of the court house in Henrietta, inside the city limits. They struck gas at 150 feet; are now down 125 feet with fine prospects. They report they will have one or two more rigs drilling within fifteen days.

The Leachridge Oil company has put in a first class system of shale and pumps, with which they claim they can pump at least 25 wells with one power. They commenced pumping day before yesterday and were delivering oil in the city yesterday.

The light, power and gas plant is taking out the boiler and engine and putting in an 80-horse power Fairbanks, Morse & Co. gas engine, with a gas engine, with crude oil burner attachment, and has contracted with the Leachridge Oil company for a fuel supply.

Producers here are receiving many letters from owners of gasoline engines, asking for prices and indicating that, owing to the high grade of Clay county oil and the amount of gasoline it contains, they will purchase the Leachridge Oil company's product, owing to the fact that they can develop their power with Clay county oil for less than one-fourth the cost of gasoline or Fremont oil.

Palo Pinto, and the pros were represented by T. F. Temple of Weatherford and J. H. Mayes of Greenville. Mineral Wells, the greatest health resort of the southwest, is in Palo Pinto county and there are seven or eight coal shafts operating in the territory of a radius of ten miles around Strawn.

PRESENT COTTON SITUATION

HOW THE SPINNERS OF NEW ENGLAND ARE AFFECTED BY THE HIGH PRICES

FALL RIVER, Mass., August 29.—In the opinion of many well informed mill officials the outlook is exceedingly grave. During the protracted season of the price of cotton suddenly soared upward like a rocket some time ago, unlike the rocket stick, it did not come tumbling down again to its original level. While the value of the raw material has gone up and stayed up, the selling price of the manufactured article was maintained stationary at a low figure resulting from competition where the cotton could be obtained here at less than three-fourths of the present quotations.

As a result mill after mill has closed. Some of them will not open their doors again until the conditions improve, while others are struggling along, working three or four days a week to use the cotton they have on hand, and to keep their help together. Each week the conditions become more serious and the number of the mills increases. While there is considerable sentiment shown in the concerns of some of the great companies here, the practical proposition is that if goods can be manufactured only at a loss, the mills must keep going indefinitely. One mill is said to stand alone in having more cotton bought at a low price than it can possibly use before the new crop is received. It has been in the position of being able to sell some of its surplus at a handsome advance over the cost price. Some others still have a moderate supply on hand while others have had to suspend their position by either partial suspension or by closing their doors without giving any intimation of when they propose to open again.

With cotton back at last year's prices and a normal demand for the cotton goods of every description turned out by the Fall River mills, the value of the manufactured article produced in the closed mills would have aggregated millions of dollars. A fair share of the money would have been distributed here among the mill owners, and through them would have reached the local business men and helped to maintain the former high degree of prosperity which has suddenly given way to stagnation. On every side the difference is manifest.

DIFFICULT TO SELL PRODUCT. What has chiefly astonished the leaders in the industry here is that the great decrease in production does not appear to have had any effect upon the market. Not only has there been no increase in prices, but the demand has been so slack that there seems to be difficulty in disposing of the present product of the mills. A serious problem confronts all who are interested.

"I do not believe that there can have been overproduction in the past to the extent that existing conditions would indicate on their face," said the manager of one of the great corporations today. "The demand continued right up to a certain point and then it began to fall off alarmingly. All that we do is to wait for the market to right itself, but that is hardly satisfactory, either for the persons who have their money invested or for the greater number who are only anxious to work and cannot remain very long in idleness without suffering. I do not wish to appear pessimistic, but the further we go the worse we get, and the end is not yet in sight. There has been no such shortage of cotton here since the civil war times, when the industry was in its infancy. It is difficult for those who do not live here to understand what it means to the community to have the mills shut down. Upon the mills the entire population has to depend. As soon as they close the savings banks accounts begin to dwindle and the merchants find no customers."

GAYETY AND DISTRESS. Curiously enough the sole outward evidence of the great blow to the prosperity of the city consists of greater gaiety — movement in public. The streets are thronged with pretty girls in gala attire, and there never was a time in the past when public dances and picnics were so well attended. Strangers cannot fail to observe how very well dressed most of the young girls were. Very many of them are French Canadian, and they have true Parisian loveliness. They may have to wait and struggle to get their dresses, but all seem to manage to have good gowns to wear. In their regular grind in the mills anything that covers them will do to wear, but they are very particular about their holiday trappings.

There is practically nothing for the men to turn their hands to here to employ their time profitably. Very many are spending their days fishing and crabbing, hoping to supply their families in this manner, and are curdling the little luxuries which they have been accustomed to. Life is always hard for the mill men and wages are low at best, but very many of them are managed to put aside money for such emergencies as this. Thus has

already been pinching and deprivation everywhere. The grocers and butchers are selling very little, and each day sees a further reduction. 75,000 SPINDLES IDLE. There are in round numbers 2,000,000 spindles in Fall River, and of these 150,000 are idle today. These figures are obtained from reports made by the directors of the mills to the labor union headquarters and verified by James Tansey, president of the Textile Council and secretary of the Card Room Protective Association, and Albert Hibbert, secretary of the United Textile Workers of America. Here is time lost in different mills according to Mr. Tansey's reports: Border City Manufacturing Company, No. 1, twelve weeks; No. 2 and 3, three weeks, distributed over the months; Barnaby Manufacturing Company, three weeks; Chase Mills, four weeks; Cornell Mills, six weeks; Davel Mills, six weeks; Durfee Mills, two weeks; Fall River Manufacturing, three weeks; Flint Mills, four weeks. No. 1, 2 and 3 three weeks total, made up of two and three days a week; Granite Mills, three weeks; Hargrave's Mills, two weeks, made up of two and three days a week; Mechanics Mills, three weeks; Osborn Mills, No. 1, three weeks; Parker Mills, two weeks, made up of two and three days a week; Robeson Mills (in process of reorganization), seven weeks; Richard Bader Manufacturing Company, two weeks; Sagamore Manufacturing Company, No. 1, three weeks; Sagamore Manufacturing Company, No. 2, two weeks; Stafford Mills, seven weeks; Union Cotton Manufacturing Company, ten days; Wampaug Mills, eight weeks.

These mills are among the largest in the United States. The regular output of the Border City company, of the Stafford Mills and of the Union Cotton Manufacturing Company is about thirty million yards of finished cloth per annum each. The Granite Mills make thirty-two million yards, the Sagamore Mills twenty-seven million yards, the Chance Mills and the Hargrave Mills, twenty-six million yards each, and the Osborn Mills nineteen million five hundred thousand yards. Other companies have larger mills but smaller capacity. STRIKE EXCUSE FOR SHUTDOWN. 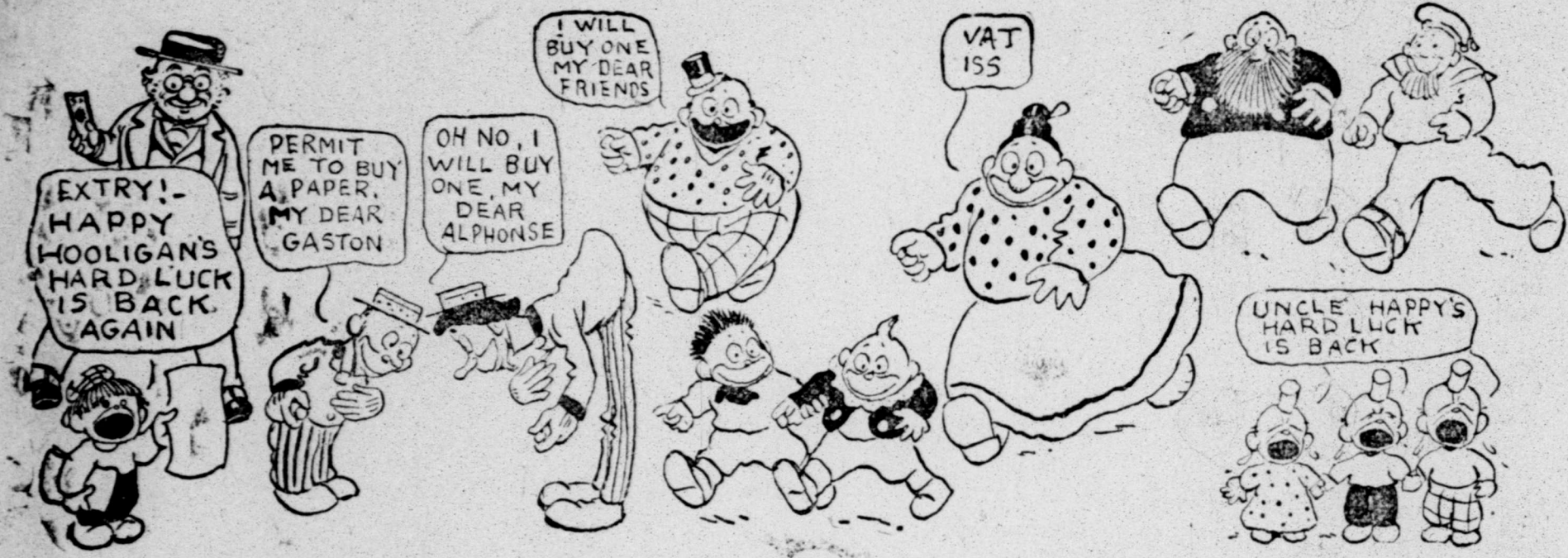

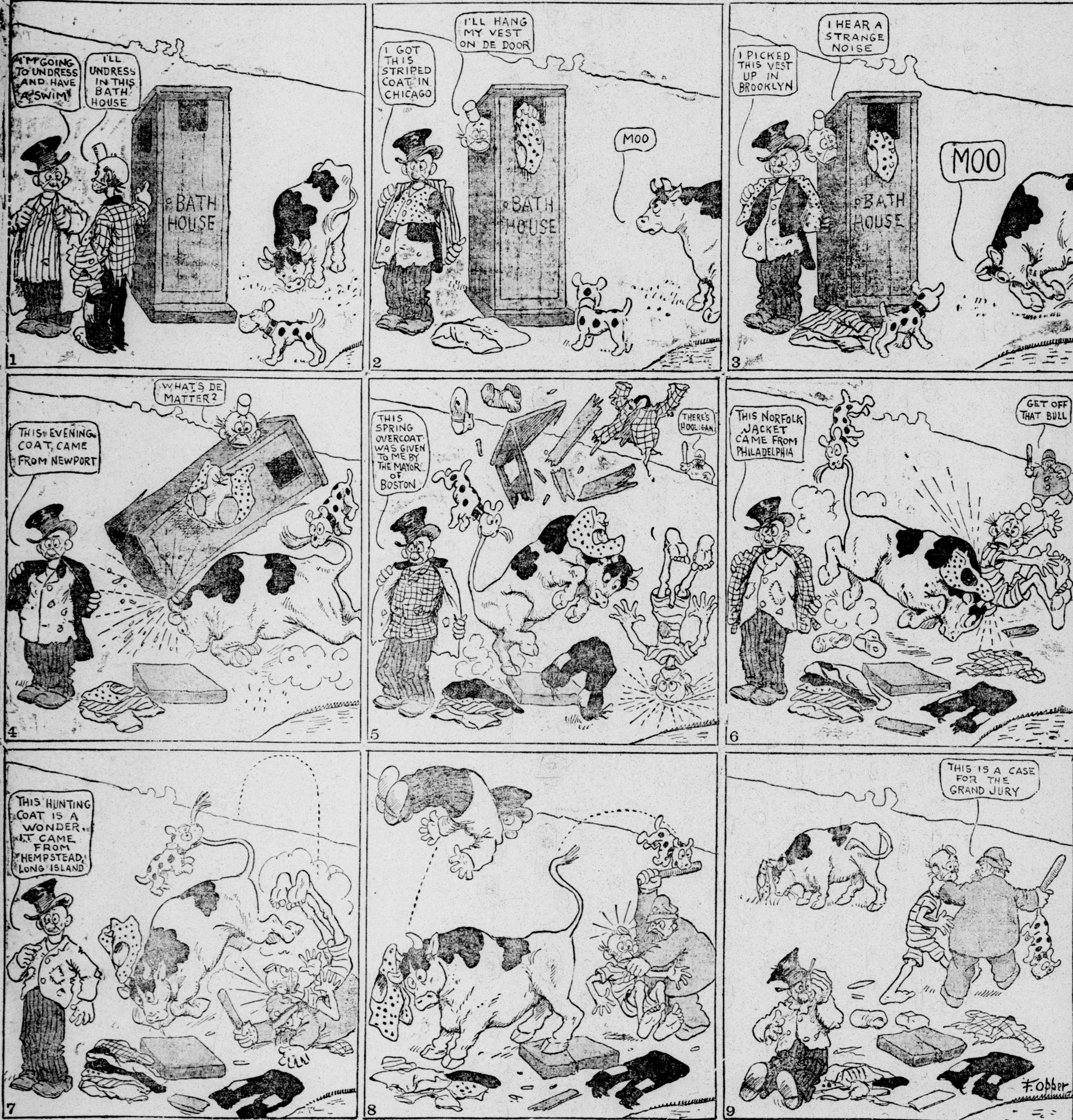

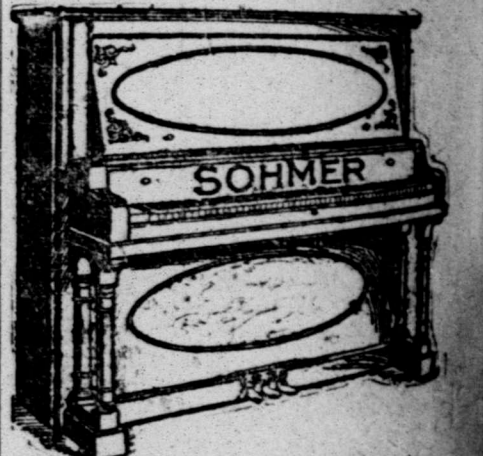
