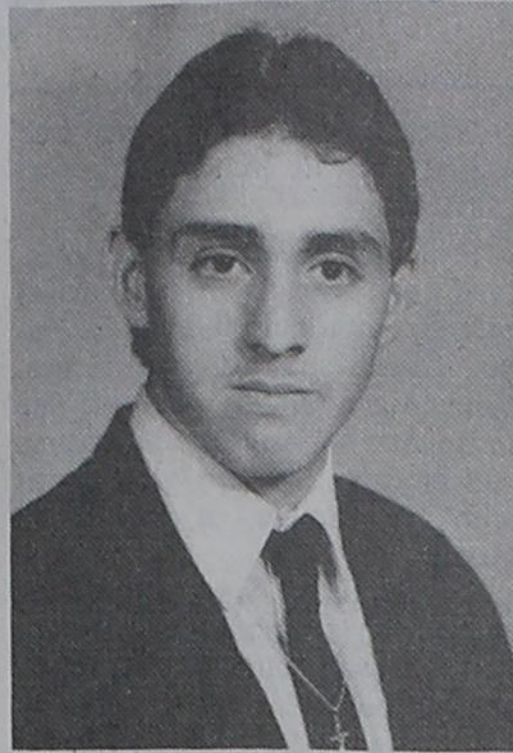




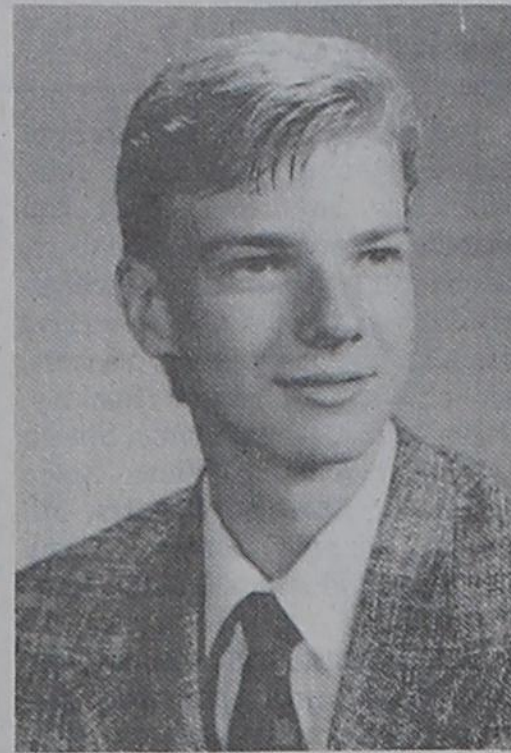

Voters approve city charter

The proposed charter for the City of Dimmitt was approved, and all incumbent candidates were returned to office in local elections throughout the county Saturday.

With 213 ballots cast (about 10% of the registered voters) in the charter election for Dimmitt, 130 voted in favor of adopting the proposed document and 83 voted against it. Included in that number were the absentee ballots, which numbered 13 against and 8 in favor.

Dimmitt Mayor Wayne Collins said that the charter provisions will go into effect immediately, except those governing elections and election precincts, which will be subject to settlement of the current lawsuit against the city, asking for single-member districts.

In the only local race that did not go to an incumbent, the incumbent chose not to run for reelection. Jerry Lange vacated his position as Nazareth City Commissioner, and the spot went to Gregory Schacher with 48 votes to opponent Thelma Wethington's 29. Three write-in votes were also cast for two separate unofficial candidates.

In a close race, three incumbents were returned to their positions on the Nazareth school board, crowding out challenger Lou Wethington, who received 74 votes. The successful candidates were Henry Ra-

mackers with 129 votes, Alphonse Kleman with 124, and J.C. Pohlmeier with 119.

Incumbents on the Hart school board handily defeated their challengers. Board chairman Harold Bob Bennett received 171 votes and boardmember Danny Rodriguez received 122, knocking out Jerry Miller, who got 96 votes, and

Kent Irons, with 71 votes.

Unopposed candidates included Nazareth Mayor Ralph Brockman, who received 70 votes; Hart City Commissioner Stanley Dyer, who garnered 117 votes; and Castro County Hospital District board members Stanley Schaeffer, with 454 votes, and Nell Ingram, with 399 votes.

City-wide garage sale set June 9

The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce's third annual city-wide garage sale day is scheduled for Saturday, June 9.

In addition to the annual "courthouse square sales," sidewalk sales and individual garage sales, the Chamber will conduct a "large item auction" at 3 p.m. on the east parking lot of the courthouse. Items to be sold on the auction must be worth \$10 or more, and a 10% fee will be charged to have the item sold there. The seller will be allowed to place a minimum price on their item. This auction is designed to help sell large items that were not sold at individual garage sales.

The Chamber of Commerce has established a goal of having 100 family garage sales planned as well as a flea market and sidewalk sales in Dimmitt.

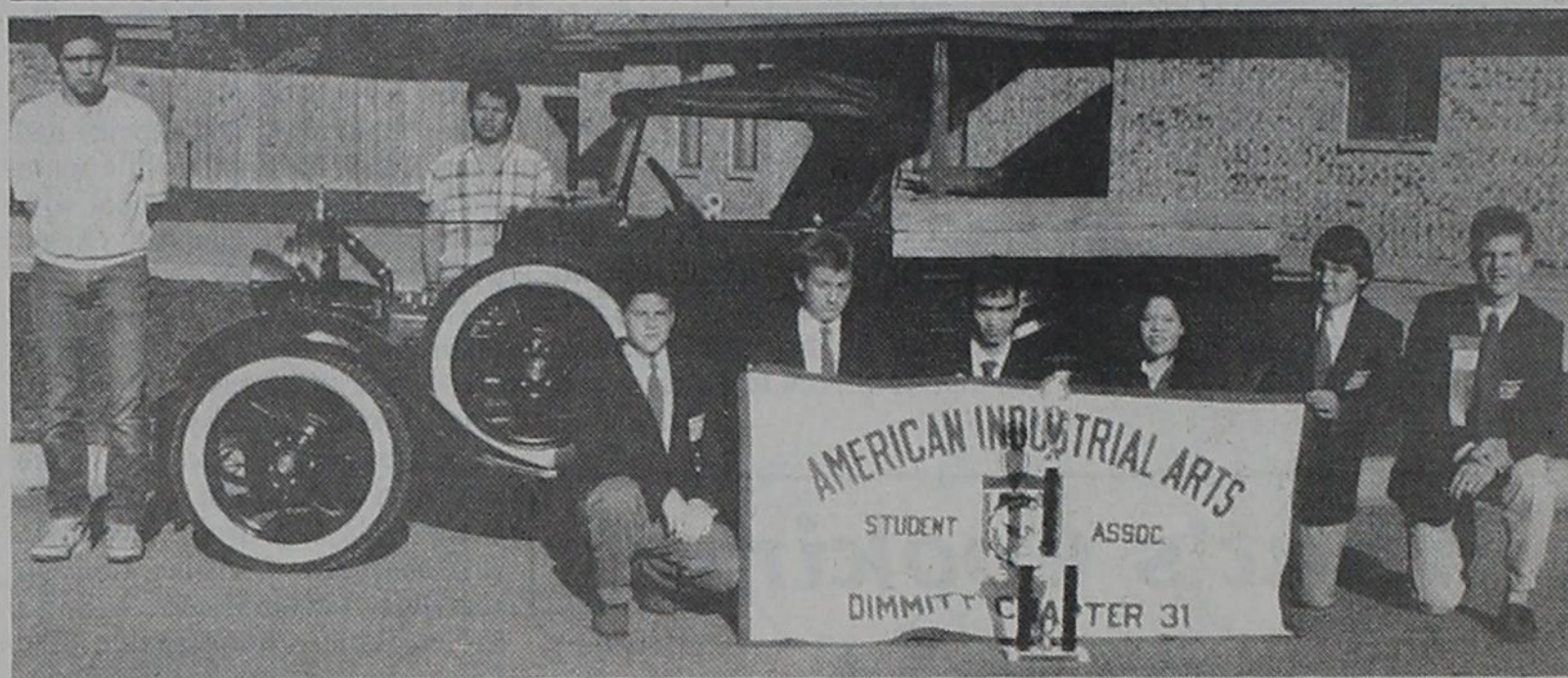
Map listings will be given out at Dimmitt businesses displaying a

red bow on their front door on the day of the sale. Individuals must sign up with the Chamber of Commerce to have their sale listed on the map and the deadline for signing up is June 1.

Businesses, individuals and organizations may hold sales. Each participant pays a \$10 fee which goes directly toward publicity of the event. Spaces are available on the courthouse square for \$15 to individuals or groups. Businesses may buy a "business card" size ad on the map for \$15.

"We have had great success with this event the last two years and we are planning on large crowds again," said Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Delores Heller.

KDHN-Radio will conduct on-the-spot interviews with individuals throughout the day. A Salvation Army truck will be parked on the square at 4 p.m. to pick up any items that didn't sell.

Bids accepted for city improvements

Plans are moving forward on two grant programs for the City of Dimmitt, including one for paving and drainage improvements and one for airport improvements.

Bids were accepted at the Monday meeting of the city council on the paving and drainage projects being administered through the Texas Community Development Grant. Funding approved for the projects included \$51,847 for paving and \$103,478 for drainage.

Judy Munden of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, which administers the grant funds for Dimmitt, told the council that after their acceptance of the bids, the winning contractors must be approved by the Texas Dept. of Commerce in the areas of employment and completion of any previous federal projects.

Low bid on the paving project was submitted by High Plains Pav-

ing for \$49,941.35 for hot mix. Low bid on the drainage project came from Utility Contractors for \$119,937.25 for a 36" drain pipe or \$152,437.25 for a 42" pipe, and installation.

City engineer Bill McMorris told the council that both companies perform satisfactorily and submitted bids that will meet the required specifications.

Munden noted that a preconstruction conference will be held May 21 at 10 a.m. with the bidders, if approved, and requested at least one representative from the city council also attend.

Five members have been appointed to the City-County Joint Airport Zoning Board as a prerequisite for a state and federal grant for airport improvements.

Wayne Proffitt and Robert Jones for the city and Vincent Guggemos and Jeff Robertson for the county

selected Allan Webb as the chairman of the board. These five will now select an airport zoning commission.

City Manager Reeford Burrous told the council that work on the airport grant is progressing. Grant funds will provide 95% of the cost of expanding the runway, with the city providing the other 5%.

The council approved a resolution authorizing application for the grant funds.

Burrous gave the council members copies of a letter from the City of Beaver, Okla., stating that they will sponsor an area-wide meeting Tuesday at 7 p.m. in Beaver to discuss problems they and other cities are having with MultiVision Cable TV, which also provides cable TV service in Dimmitt.

The letter cited poor quality channel reception, channel interference, periodic interruption of service, billing problems, difficulties in obtaining repairs and "a generally indifferent attitude on the part of MultiVision officials in connection with their serving the people."

Dimmitt council members declined to attend, but authorized Burrous to send a letter detailing Dimmitt's complaints and expressing support for any efforts to bring about changes for the better.

The council also approved a resolution to be sent to Congressional representatives asking for legislation to regulate cable television suppliers and giving local governments power to regulate the rates and quality of service of cable television companies.

In other business, the council approved appointment of Emigdio A. Sandoval to the Dimmitt Board of Adjustment, in place of Graham Sheffy, who is moving away.

The council also canvassed and accepted the election results from Saturday's charter election, which registered 130 votes in favor and 83 votes against adoption of the charter.

In NORWAY, the penalty is three weeks in jail at hard labor and a one-year loss of license. If a second offense is committed within five years, the license is revoked for life.

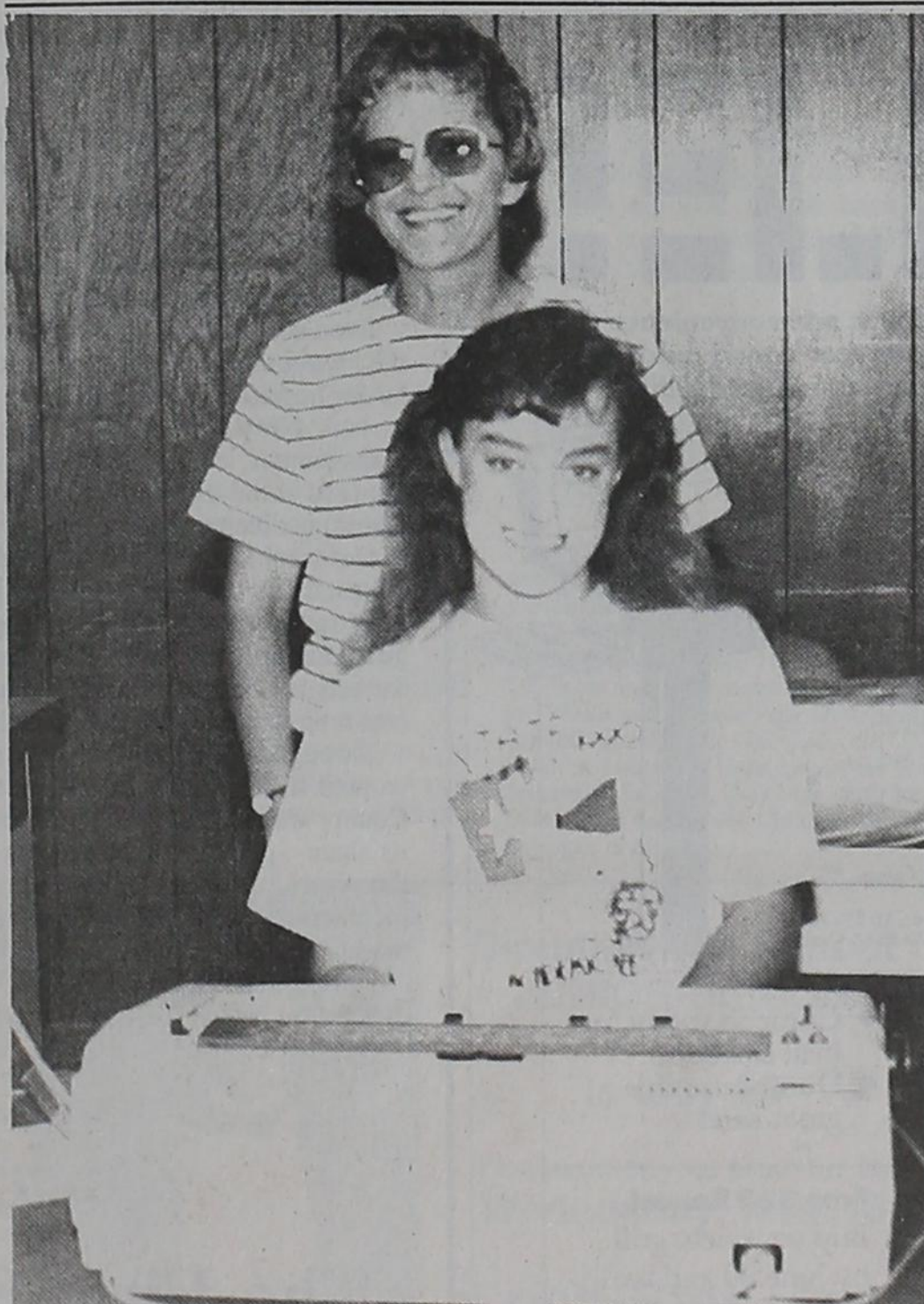
In FINLAND and SWEDEN, there is automatic jail for one year at hard labor.

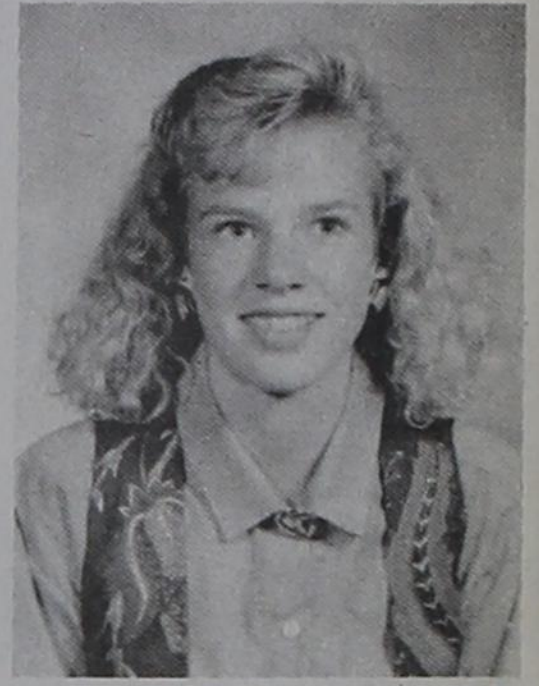

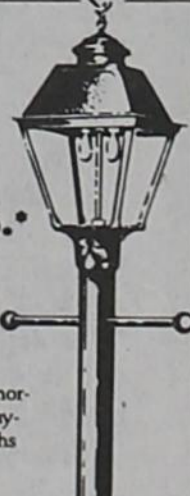

We Salute

Our Hospital

All across the nation, rural hospitals have been closing their doors, leaving millions of Americans many miles from the nearest medical care.

Many here have worried that the same fate might befall our own hospital.

But we can breathe easier now. Plains Memorial Hospital is weathering the storm. Despite the inequities of the Medicare program, the tremendous increases in operating and insurance costs, and all the other problems and expenses that have been forcing other rural hospitals to close their doors, Plains Memorial is now operating successfully.

And all indications are that it will continue to operate into the foreseeable future, providing good-quality, caring service to the people of our county.

The fact that our hospital is professionally and financially sound is a real blessing, and a tribute to a lot of dedicated people, for it has been an especially difficult task.

It helps in a major way that we have four medical doctors here. A hospital can't stay open if there aren't enough local doctors to admit a sufficient number of patients.

Even so, the trend now is to transfer patients to specialists and to the metropolitan hospitals for more specialized care when possible, so our hospital is having to make ends meet with fewer patients than it had 20 years ago. To be able to do that requires good management, close supervision, and some hard decisions. It has required some sacrifice from all of us, in the form of the hospital district tax increase several years ago.

Our local hospital was founded in the 1940s as the "Castro Co-op Hospital." It was built of surplus barracks buildings. Later it became the "Castro County Hospital," operated as a branch of the county government. Still later, the Castro County Hospital District was formed as a separate taxing and management entity, and the hospital was rebuilt and renamed "Plains Memorial Hospital."

Throughout that half-century of evolution, a lot of people have worked in many different ways to make sure the people of Castro County would have quality hospital care. Plains Memorial has had its share—perhaps more than its share—of ups and downs through the years. On April 21, the US Air Force announced the public debut of the once "Top Secret" F-117A Stealth fighter at Nellis Air Force Base in Las Vegas, Nev. For five years, the members of the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing at Nellis AFB had a secret.

The pilots, crew members and others knew what outsiders only suspected—the Tonopah Test Range 150 miles northwest of Las Vegas was the home to a highly classified fighter jet program. The Stealth fighter was recently used in the December 1989 invasion of Panama with pinpoint bombing accuracy. The F-117A's primary mission is not the classic fighter role of air to air combat. Instead, the fighter is designed to perform single air strikes using air to ground missiles against high priority targets deep within enemy territory.

T/Sgt. Sandoval is a 1979 graduate of Dimmitt High School and is currently enrolled in the business program at the University of Nevada in Las Vegas, Nev.

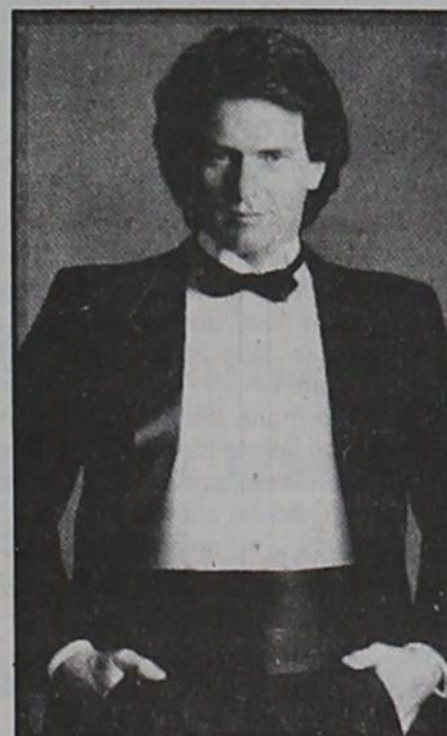

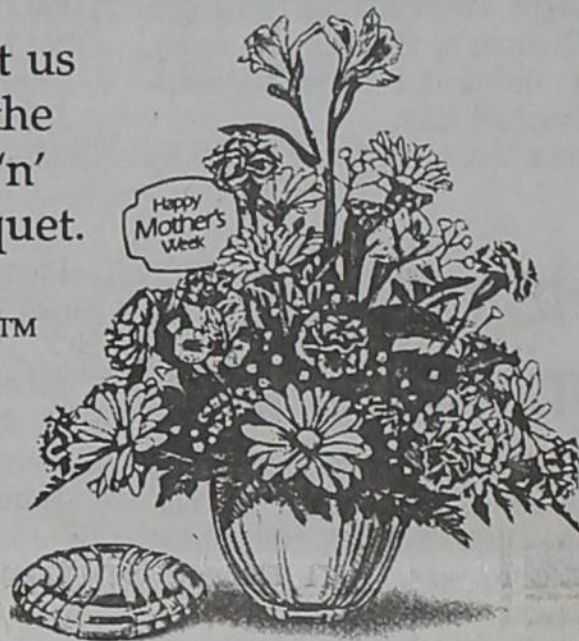

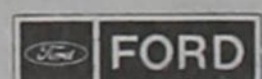

Dimmitt trio studies economic development

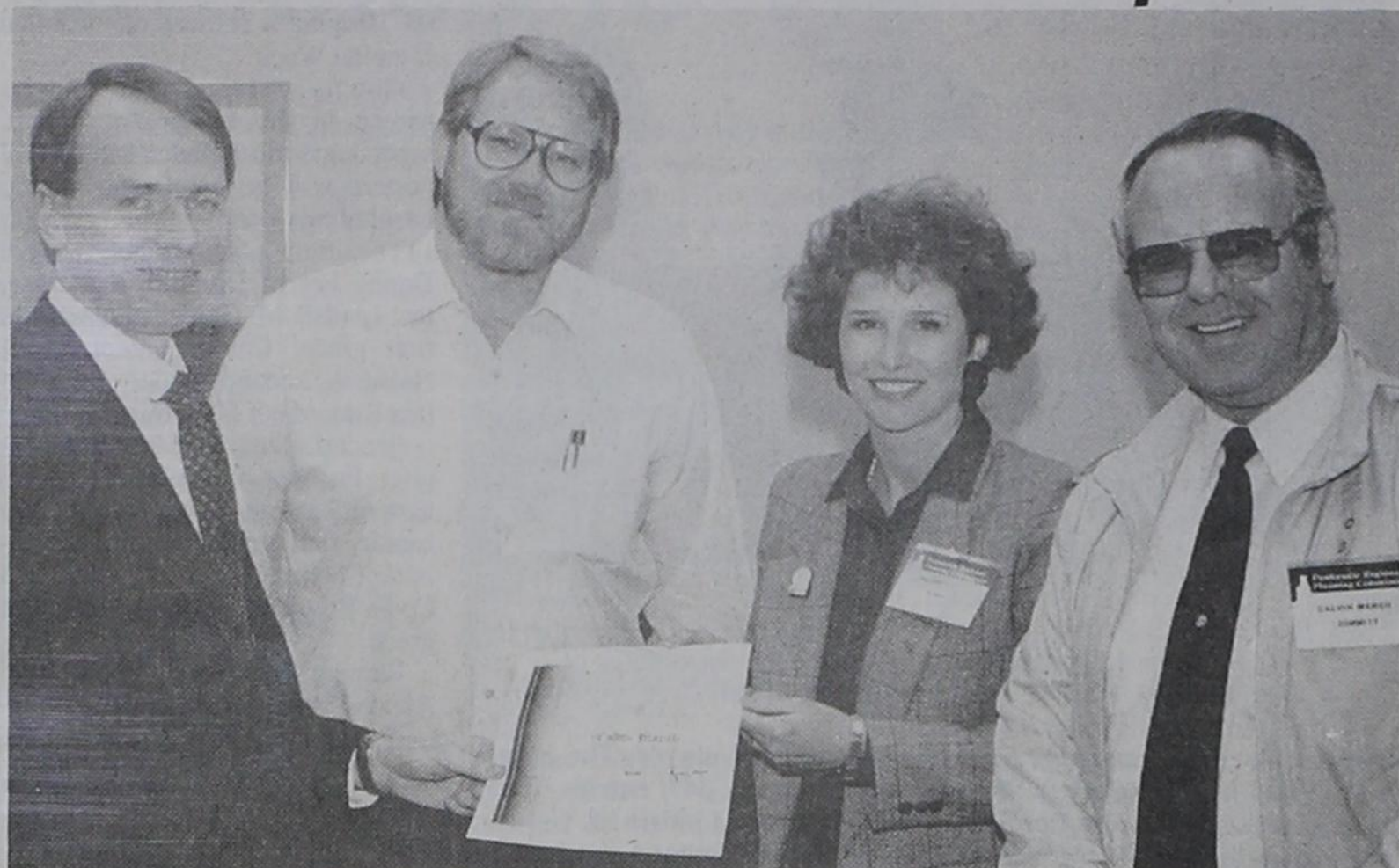
Jerry Cartwright, Delores Heller and Calvin Marsh, all of Dimmitt, were recently recognized for completing a 15-hour economic development training course in Amarillo.

The three Dimmitt professionals took the course, "Economic Development Strategies for the '90's," which was co-sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Co., and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The program's purpose was to update local community leaders on the latest issues in economic development.

Cartwright represented Jay Cross Realtors and American Fructose Corp., Heller represented the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, and Calvin Marsh represented the local SPS office.

"New legislation has greatly expanded the role of government in economic development at the local levels, and one of our program objectives is to disseminate information covering recent changes," said Perna Strickland, PRPC's director of economic development.

Cheryl Pink, an economic development specialist at SPS, served as instructor for the course.

SPS' customers to receive credits

Southwestern Public Service Co.'s customers will receive credits totaling \$20.7 million for savings in fuel costs.

SPS has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to credit bills for retail customers including residential, commercial and industrial users.

A residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would receive a one-time credit of \$22.51. The proposed credit includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7%.

SPS expects to get swift approval on this filing, according to Gerald Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation.

"We hope to be able to apply the credit to our customers' July bills," he said. The credit would cover fuel expenses from April 1989 through March 1990.

"Several factors made these savings for customers possible," Diller said. "For example, expenses related to the purchase of power from other electric companies were reduced. Also, we were able to negotiate for lower fuel contracts at our power plants. Additionally, this credit includes customers' share of the proceeds made from off-system sales to other electric utilities. The net result is lowered costs for our customers."

Of the \$20.7 million requested credit, about \$11.2 million accumulated since the beginning of the year. This primarily was due to the delay in getting approval from the Texas commission to implement a new lower "fuel-cost recover factor." SPS's original request, filed in November 1989, was to implement the lower "fuel-cost recovery factor" by Jan. 1. The factory was ultimately implemented on April bills, Diller said, resulting in an overall 9.6% rate decrease.

Doyle Moore, SPS's Panhandle Division manager, said continued savings in fuel expenses will help the area economy.

"We are active in economic development activities in our region and we are pleased to be able to pass this savings on to our customers," Moore added.

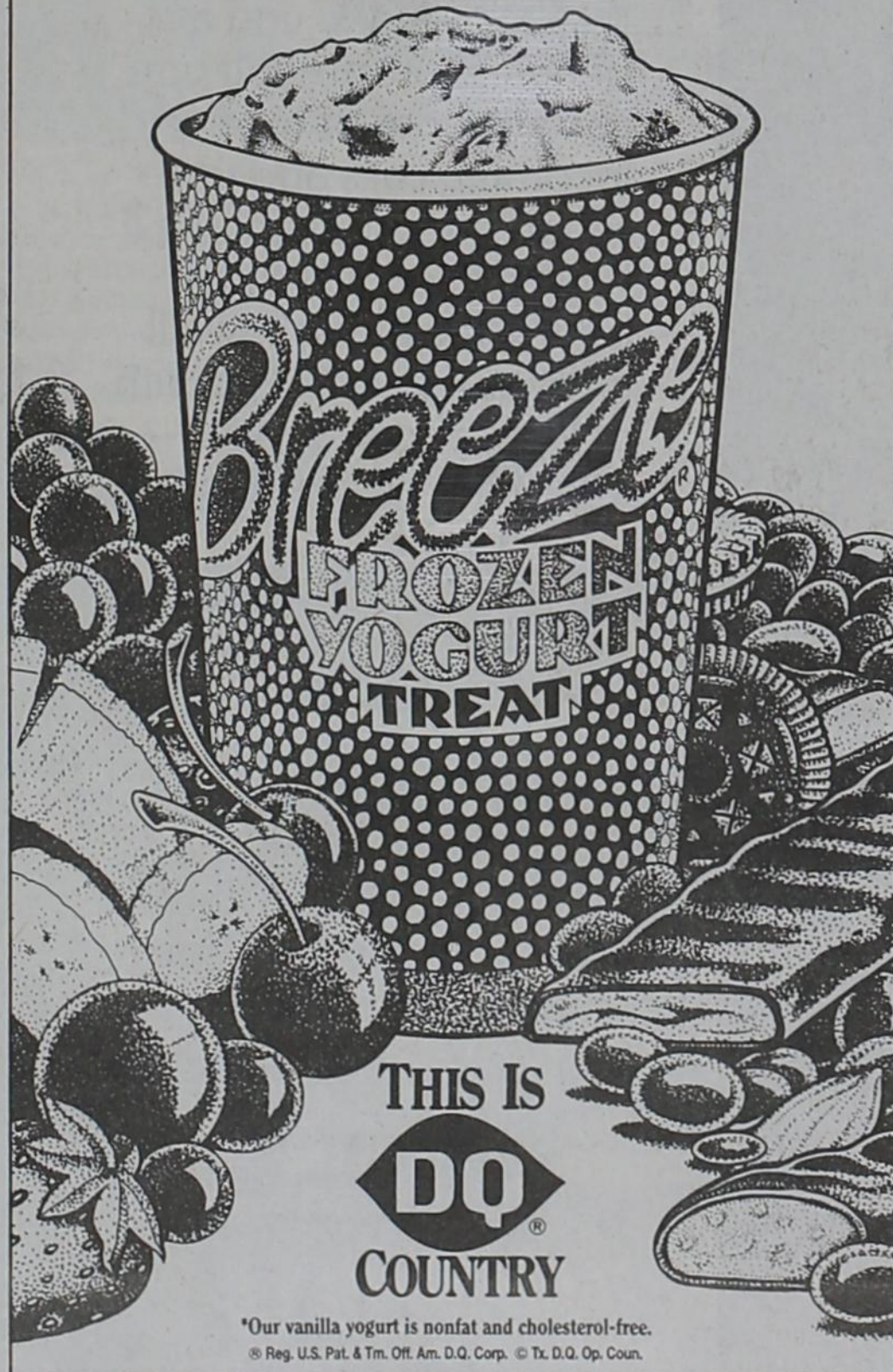

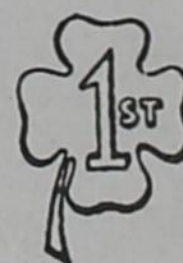

IA students win at state, 12 qualify for national

The Dimmitt High School Industrial Arts Club was judged the runner-up for AAA schools in Texas at the Texas State Technology Education/Industrial Arts contest held Friday and Saturday in Waco, and 12 students qualified for national competition.

First place winners at state will attend the National Student Conference June 19-26 in Corpus Christi. 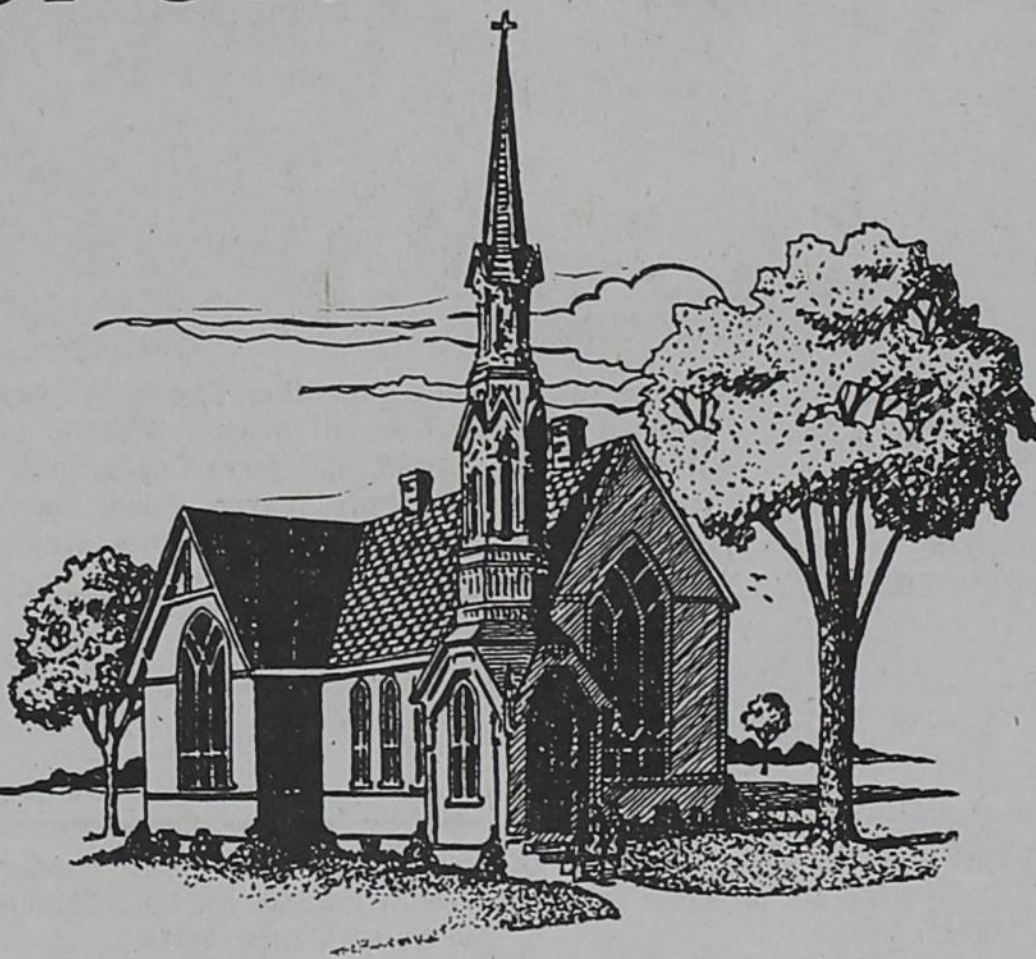

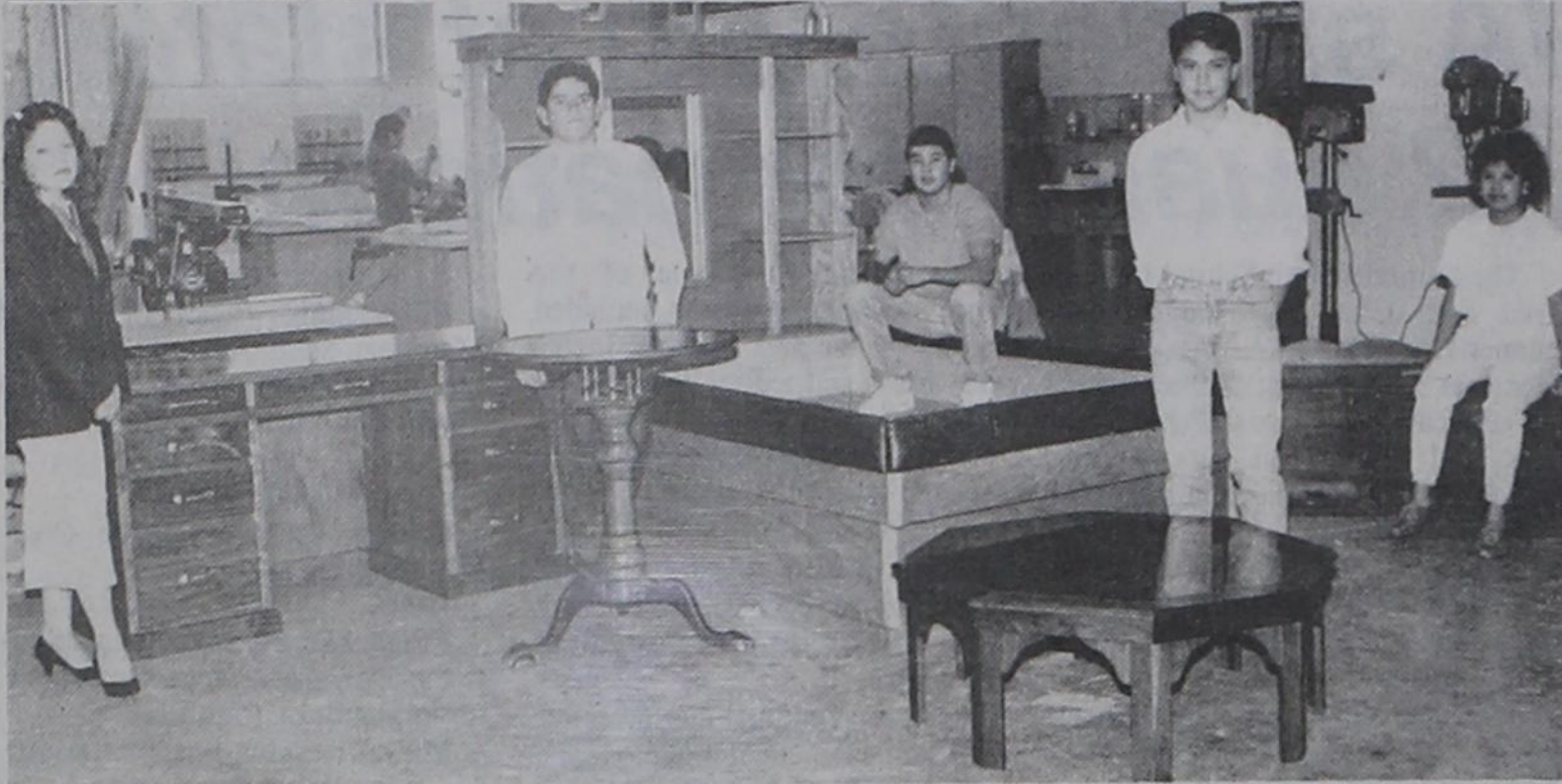

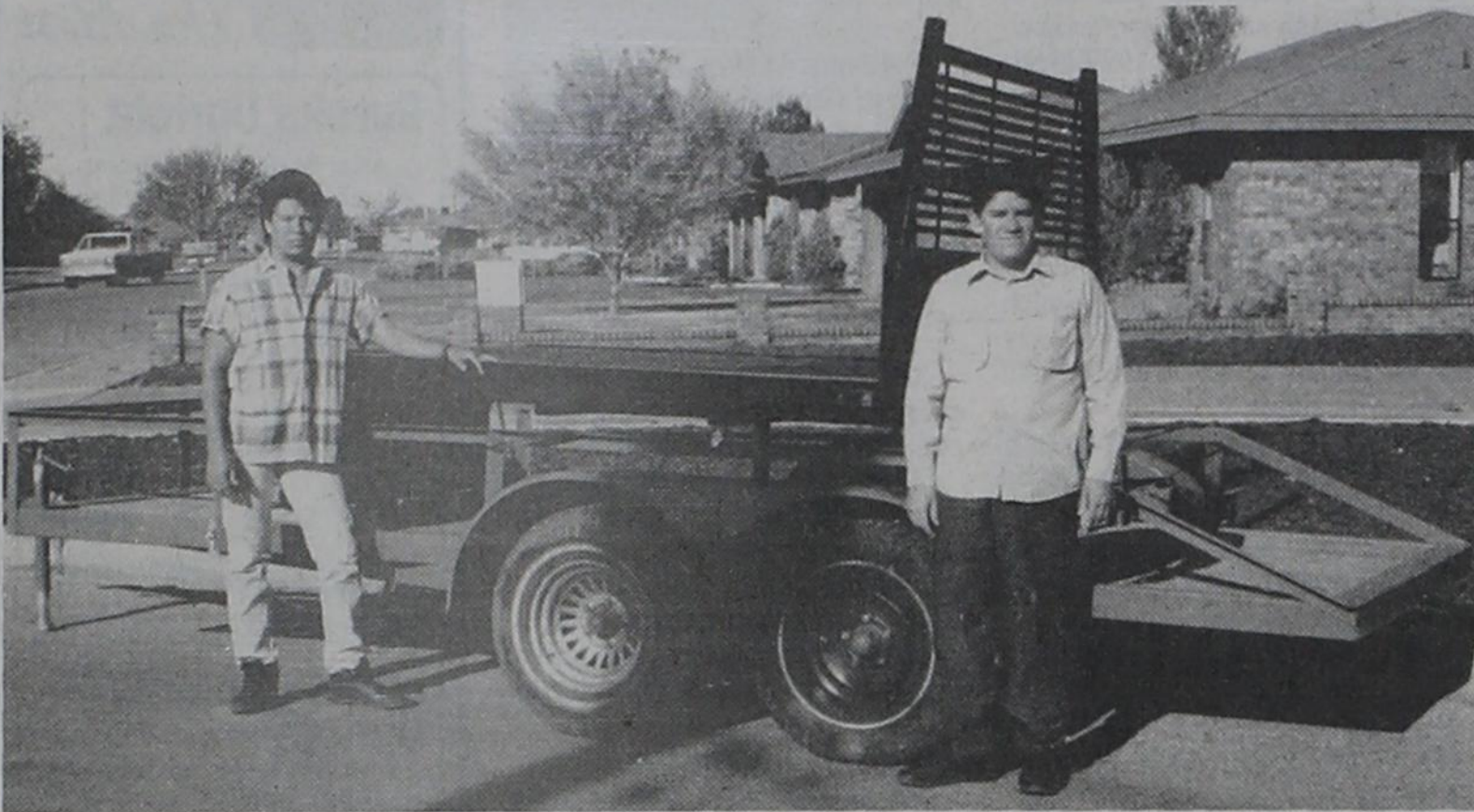

Dear Editor:

This Monday will be the most important commissioner's court [meeting] that has ever been held in Castro County, in my opinion.

One of the items on the agenda is to continue to use employees in Precinct 1 or go to some type of contract on getting our roads maintained. I have checked many ways other counties are improving their roads—in Ochiltree, Hansford and Winkler counties in Texas, Beckham and Texas counties in Oklahoma, and Roosevelt County in New Mexico—and I think all are doing better than we are in Castro County.

The county commissioner that I think is doing the best job is Tommy Smith, formerly from Petersburg, but now in Winkler County. Commissioner Smith tells me that a county road should not need to be maintained but once a year, and you can see how much this would

save the county.

Approximately 98% of the roads in Winkler County have had an improved road material added to them. Tommy is willing to come and help Castro County free of charge, to show how they improved their roads.

Tom Linberry, who owns an extra large ranch (300,000 acres) west of Kermit, was selling cattle to Homer Hill, and he told me that the roads, before they were improved, would get impassable, and now they are better than the asphalt and much cheaper to build and maintain.

Another item on the agenda is to build roads jointly, with industries, residents and neighbors, such as has been proposed in the Nazareth Community.

L&S Feedlot and Bridges Feedlot are also interested in some type of joint road building project.
