



There were no choice butcher steers in the yards and best quality steers, averaging 794 pounds. sold to a feeder at \$3.00, with the heavy end of the steer receipts selling at \$2,50 to \$2.85. The average quality of cows was hardly up to yesterday's standard, but in most instances the steers showed a steady market with yesterday's close,

Calves were scarce and the light supply sold at unchanged prices, no extra fancy calves being offered. A few sales of feeder bulls were made to outside buyers at \$1.85 to \$1.90.

Sheep-On the early marke: T. D. Hovenkamp sold to Swift & Co. 39 sheep, averaging 78 pounds, at \$2.70, and 27 lambs, averaging 68 pounds, at \$3.50. Both buyers and sellers are quoting the market
