Louis F. Swift, president of Swift & Co., in defending the packers declared the price of beef is not too high considering the cost of cattle on the hoof. He said criticism on this score is unjust and not in accord with the facts of the situa-

"All this talk and hubbub about high prices of beef is unfounded," said Mr. Swift. "The figures do not prove it. There has been no increase in the cost of beef that I know of, and I can not understand why there should be criticism. Beef sold in the Chicago market last week at 6.14 cents a pound. The cattle which furnished the beef cost on the hoof from 3% to 5 cents a pound.
