Dimmitt Ethanol takes charge of former Cargill plant

The Dimmitt City Council at a Tuesday night meeting recently approved the transfer of the former Cargill plant to the City of Dimmitt Development Corporation, which then transferred the plant to Dimmitt Ethanol. The funds went from Dimmitt Ethanol to an escrow account and then to Cargill, according to Mayor Wayne Collins, who works for Dimmitt Ethanol.

“What this means is Dimmitt

Ethanol is owner of the plant and is moving ahead to convert it to an ethanol plant,” Collins said. “We have entered into a contract with the engineering company, CJ Schneider Engineering Co. of Omaha, Neb., to provide Phase I and Phase II engineering services. They will have three representatives in Dimmitt on Monday evening to do their evaluations on the plant. They’ll take that data back to Omaha and come back with price figures and preliminary

design.

“We’ve also contracted with Eddie Adams, a former plant employee, to provide environmental services for the plant, which includes getting the environmental permits, air and water, transferred to Dimmitt Ethanol from Cargill. He’s also doing the necessary testing of water to make sure that we are in compliance with all environmental regulations. He will also assist in modifying the permits to accommodate the plant being an

ethanol plant, rather than a Dimmitt sweetener plant.”

These are all important steps that must be taken to continue the process of converting the former sweetener plant to ethanol, he said.

Collins said he is an employee of Dimmitt Ethanol, he will have no share of it, but he did say that 25 percent of the money made by Dimmitt Ethanol is being donated to a local foundation currently being set up for the benefit of

As for the major financial partner, Collins said that Dimmitt Ethanol is negotiating with several companies.

Almost immediately, however the public will notice that things are changing at the plant.

“We hope to start cleaning the plant up right away, getting the weeds mowed down, looking better,” he said. “What we hope to do is a phased engineering and

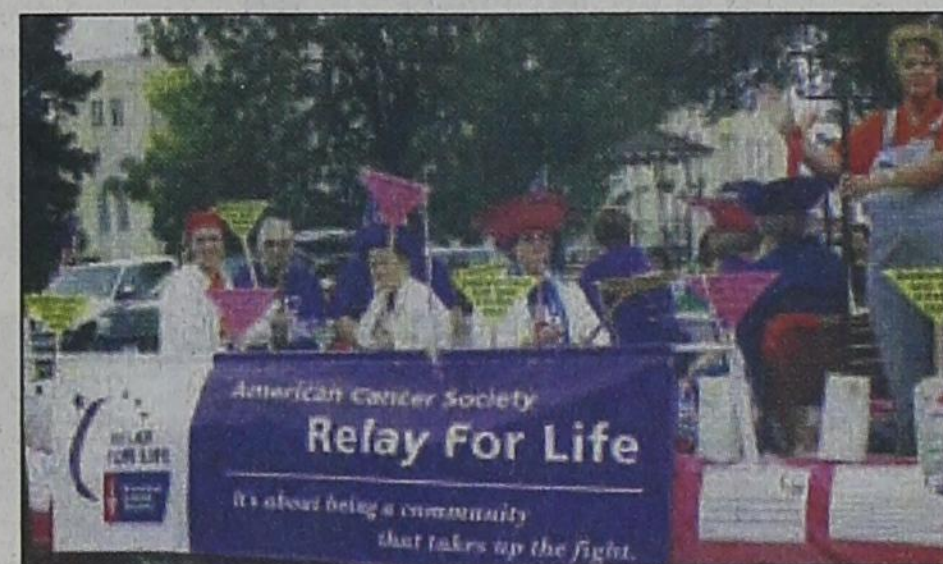

What's the Law?

Q. I went into a nail saloon that I have been to many times in the past. After the services were performed, I went to pay what I had been paying. They told me the price had been raised and I owed twice as much. Is this legal?

A. It is not illegal to raise the price for something, even if you double the amount. In your case, however, the question is not whether the price increase is legal; the question is whether the new price is part of your contract with the salon.

Whenever you have a service performed, you enter into a contract with the service provider. The price is the price you agree to, or if no price is stated, a "reasonable price." My opinion is that in your case, a reasonable price is the price you had been charged in the past. Unless you were told of the price increase before the service was performed, the new price does not apply to this transaction. Of course, from this point on you are aware of the new price and will be subject to it.

Q. I live alone in my apartment. I heard that a landlord must supply two types of locks and a door viewer on

my entry door. My door has only one lock. I am concerned that someone could easily break into my apartment, so I requested the landlord install an additional lock on the door. He refused to install an additional lock and told me that one lock was sufficient. I don't want to stay with only one lock on the door. Can I get out of my lease?

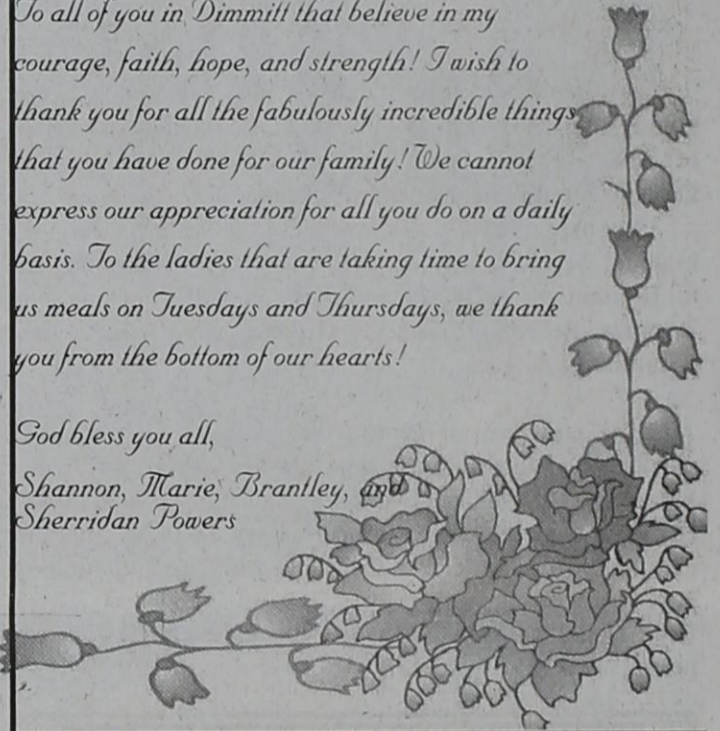
A. Generally, your landlord is required to install a door viewer and both a keyed and keyless deadbolt lock on your exterior door. After receiving notice from a tenant, the landlord will generally have 3 days to install the required viewer and locks or the tenant may terminate the lease. If, however, your lease contains a provision underlined or in boldface print notifying you of your rights regarding the required security devices, your landlord will have 7 days to install the devices before you can terminate your lease. The bottom line is if he refuses to install the locks, you can terminate your lease.

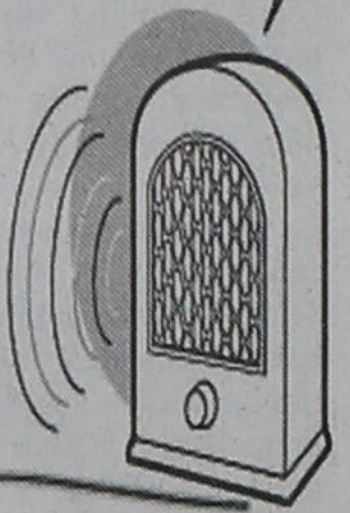

 construction and get the design specifications for the foundation done so we can go ahead and have the footings dug and the concrete foundations poured to support the fermentation tanks. At the outside, although I think we can do it quicker, it will be 16 months before the plant is operating. It depends on the availability of equipment. We'll move ahead as quickly as possible."

Collins said he plans weekly bulletins on the plant to let the citizens know what's going on.

"We're real pleased with the way things are going right now and happy to have Eddie Adams on board," Collins said. "He has handled the environmental issues for the plant for the past 20-plus years.

"That's been his area of expertise for a number of years. And we're pleased to have Schneider Engineering on board. They bring a great deal of expertise in corn wet milling."

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (DSEC) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), seeking approval to build a 115-kV transmission line extending approximately 18.3 miles. The new transmission line will begin at the existing Castro County Interchange in Castro County (owned by Southwestern Public Service Company [SPS]). From the Castro County Interchange the line will go north approximately 1.0 mile, paralleling the east side of an existing SPS transmission line to the south side of State Highway (SH) 86, just south of existing Substation 21. The proposed transmission line will then continue west approximately 17.2 miles along the south side of SH 86 to the east side of SH 241. The new transmission line will then parallel the east side of SH 241 continuing north to existing Substation 18 (approximately 0.1 mile). Along the route of the proposed transmission line DSEC plans to construct a new substation, Substation 22. The majority of the new transmission line as well as the proposed Substation 22 will be located in Parmer County, Texas. Approximately one-third of the line will be located in Castro County, Texas.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has selected two alternative transmission line routes to be considered by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, described as follows:

Preferred Route (Route 1) consisting of line segments A, B, and D. The preferred transmission line route, will start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an electrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company, (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County Interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the south side of SH 86; then the line turns west and continues along the south side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles, crossing over County Road (CR) 505, FM 1524, an SPS 69kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer county line, and continues west along the south side of SH 86 past CR 28, FM 1172, CR 25, CR 24, CR 23, CR 22, CR 21 and CR 20 to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 214; then the line turns north and continues along the east side of SH 214 right of way approximately 1/8 mile, crossing SH 86 and terminating at an existing electrical substation, (Existing Substation 18), owned by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

Alternate Route (Route 2) consisting of line segments A, F, and D. The alternate transmission line route (Route 2) will start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an electrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County Interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the north side of the SH 86; then the line turns west and continues along the north side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles crossing over County Road (CR) 505, FM 1057, a DSEC 69kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer county line and continues west along the north side of SH 86 past CR 23, FM 1172, CR 23, CR 21 and CR 20 to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 214; then the line turns north and continues along the east side of SH 214 approximately 1/8 mile and terminates at an existing electrical substation (Existing Substation 18) owned by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

A new electrical substation (Proposed Substation 22) is proposed to be located adjoining SH 86 along the route of the transmission line approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The estimated cost of these transmission facilities is approximately \$5,820,000, of which \$3,815,000 is for transmission facilities and \$2,005,000 is for substation facilities.

As for Olton, he said the teams match up well in size. And he believes that the taste of their first win will push the Bobcats.

"The players had a good time in Friday's game," he said. "It was good for them. It was great for the kids and good for the community."

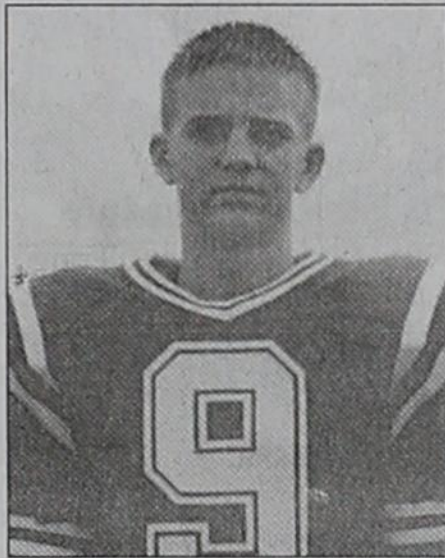

New Deal 38, Dimmitt 14

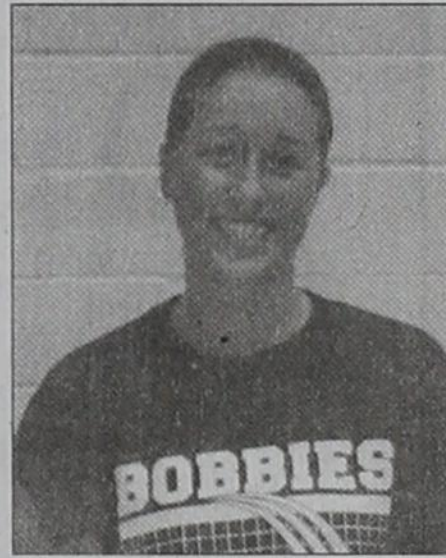

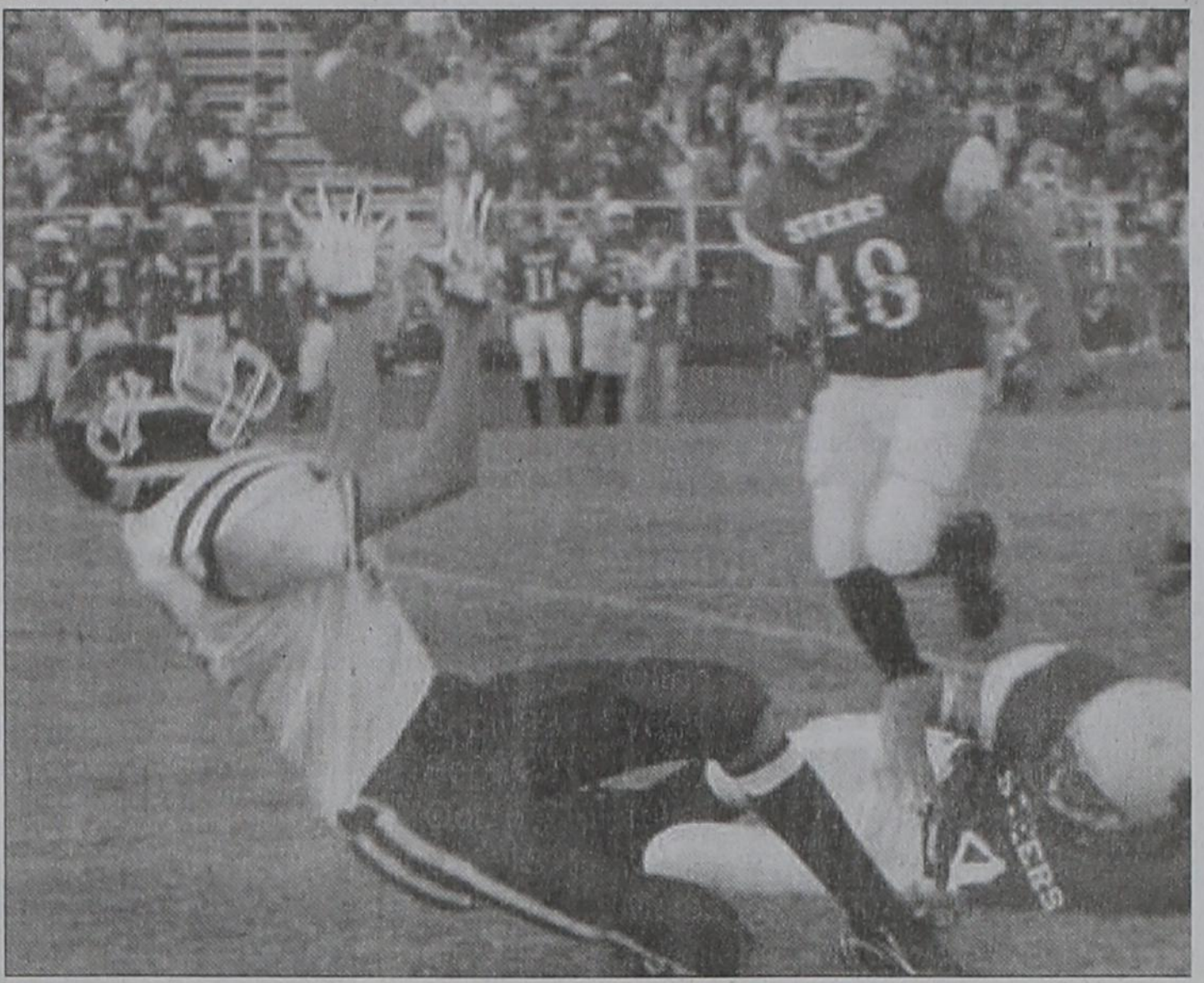

DIMMITT'S JAKE EBELING catches a pass during the Dimmitt-Farwell game on Friday night.

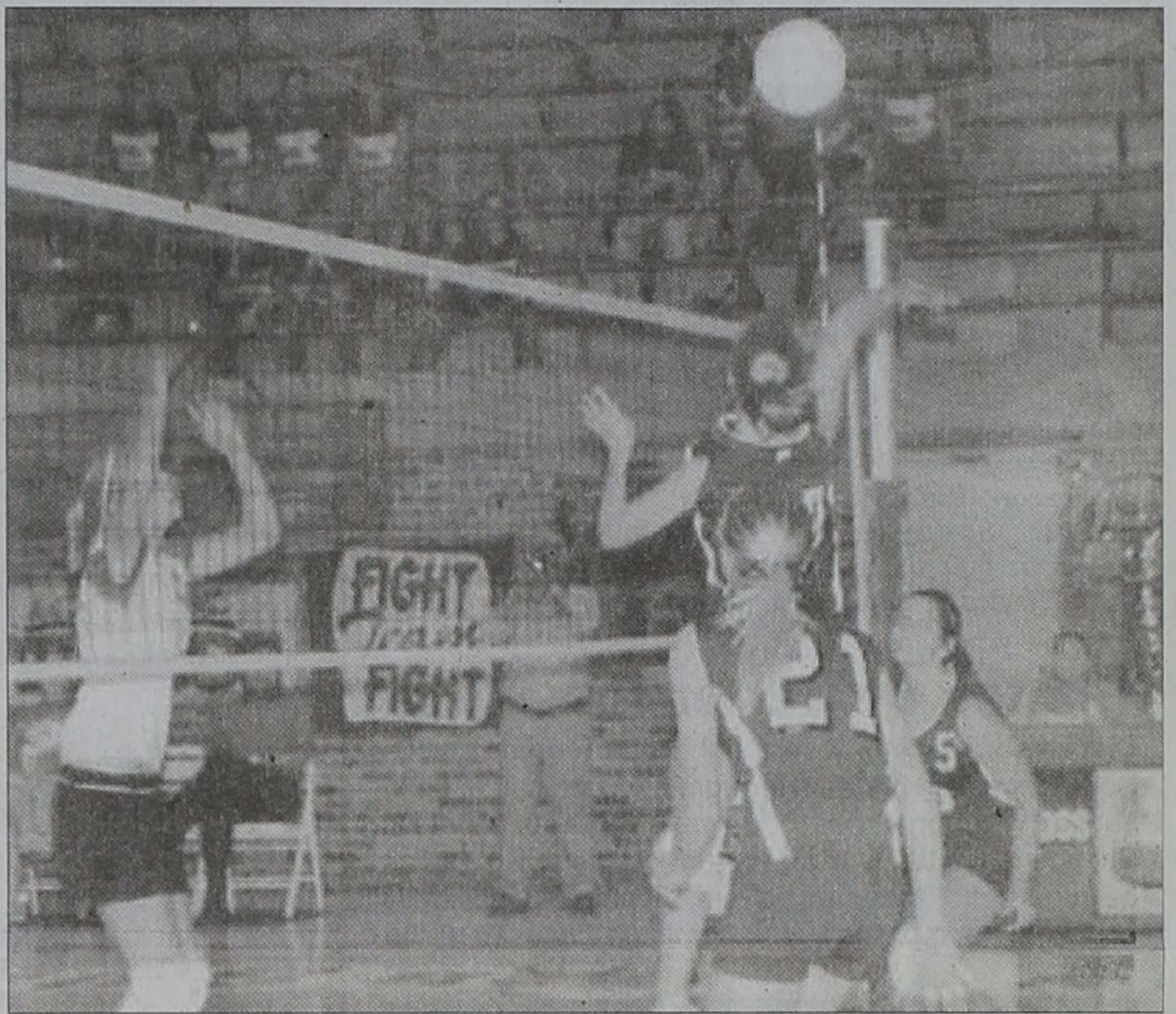

Will take on Vega for Homecoming

The Nazareth Swifts overwhelmed Morton, 38-7 on Friday night, improving to 2-0 on the season.

"Well we definitely showed signs of improvement from our first game," said Coach Ricky Peacock. "We played well on both sides of the ball, especially defensively this week. We did a great job."

Dustin Schulte threw for three touchdowns, completing seven of 19 attempts.

In the third quarter, Black caught another Schulte pass for 39 yards and a score. With Schulte's PAT, the Swifts led 30-0. However, before the third period ended, Morton had

scored on a Jacob Navarett 1-yard pass from Aaron Lewis; Jesus Alvarez kicked the PAT, but the Swifts still led 30-7 and never looked back.

Nazareth scored twice in the final period, first on another safety and then on a 44-yard Waggoner run. The PAT kick failed, but the Swifts had a satisfying 38-7 win, while amassing 411 yards total rushing.

What Peacock is looking for this week is improvement on catching the ball.

"We've got to keep on working on catching the ball," he said. "A couple of our young receivers are still getting confidence in themselves. Our special teams play continues to get better. That will be crucial down the road."

For Homecoming, the Swifts will host Vega on Friday night.

"They're a pretty solid little team," Peacock said. "Like us, they don't have a lot of kids, but they have some good, quality players and are well-coached."

"We've got to keep working on the mental part of the game, make sure we

stay focused and are ready to play and not have any letdowns."

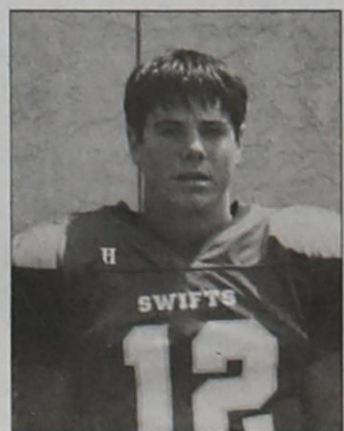
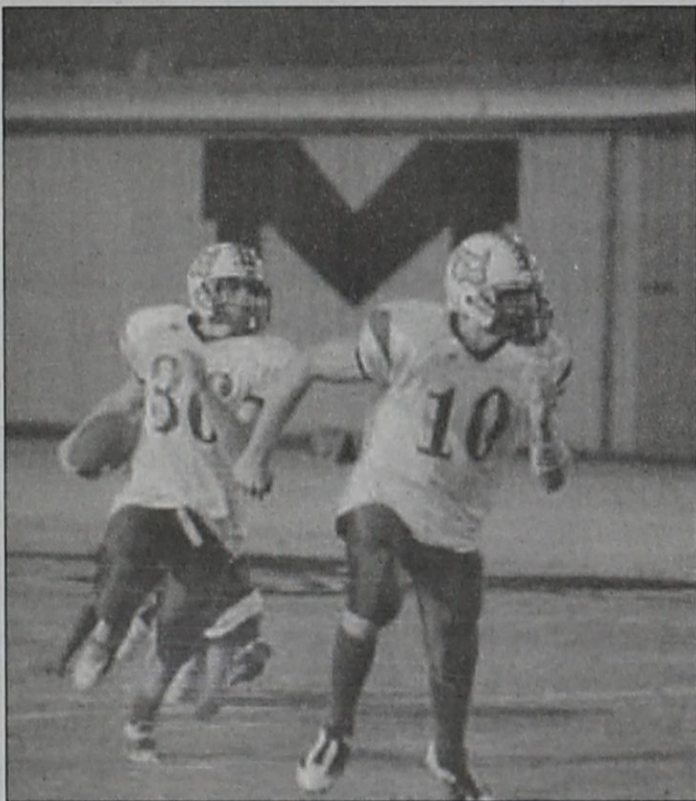

"Those guys did a great job the other night of controlling the line of scrimmage and getting pressure on the quarterbacks. We had several sacks because of them."

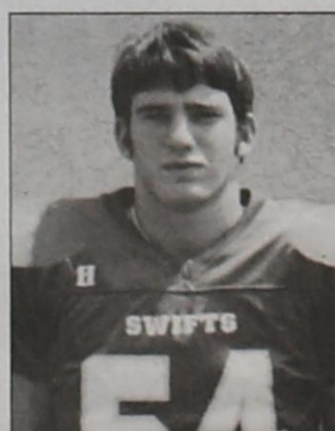

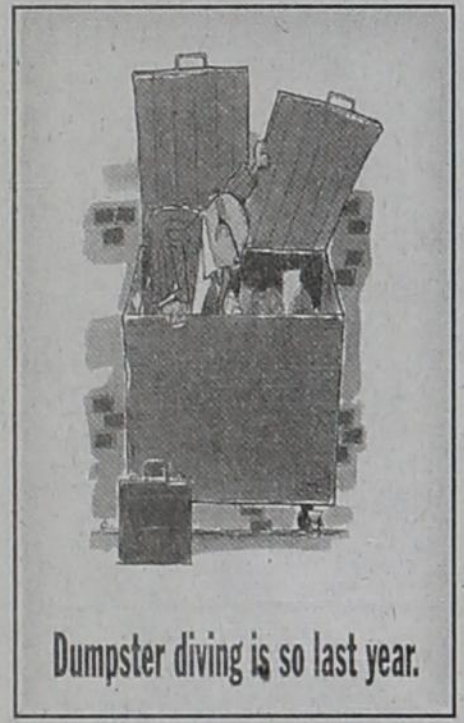
