The project originated with the German syndicate. It is understood the French manufacturers are sympathetic, but are not represented in the conference because their exports are small.

#### GRAFF SEEKS RELEASE BY HABEAS CORPUS

CHICAGO, April 21 .- "Barney" Graff, convicted two years ago of obtaining money under false pretenses, has filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus based on the claim that he has been at liberty without valid bond since May 28, 1903, and that nine terms of the criminal court have passed without the authorities attempting

to take him into custody. Graff, under order of Judge Gibbons was released on bond of \$15,000 and the hearing on a habeas corpus petition was sent for this afternoon.

Graff was convicted June 2, 1902, and since that time the case has been pass ing through the courts. February 17 the supreme court affirmed the finding of the criminal court and yesterday Graff's bondsmen surrendered him. He at once filed a petition for a writ of habeas cor

# **AMERICANS IN** MANCHURIA Charged That They Helped in

the Bombardment of Port Arthur

THEIR LIVES NOT SAFE

An Englishman Reported Captured and Hung for Being a Spy

BERLIN, April 21.-A correspondent of the Fraunkfurter Zeituna, writing from Harbin, Manchuria, under date of March 16 says:

"Great bitterness has been aroused throughout Manchuria against the Americans and British, and it is believed that American and British vessels took part in the bombardment of Port Arthur under the Japanese flag. That this is believed is due probably to the fact that the Japanese fleet was larger than the Russians anticipated and included unknown types of vessels. The feeling is so strong that Americans and British are not safe anywhere in Manchuria. One Railly, an American, and several others, including Davidson, a Canadian, have disappeared. The authorities are looking for them. It is reported that an Englishman has been arrested in Port Arthur as a spy and taken

to Mukden and hanged. "The plying of the so-called flour boats on the Liao river, mostly under the American flag, and carrying American goods, has been prohibited. Southern Manchuria has been scoured for several months for supplies of flour destined for Port Arthur, which was reported to be provisioned for two years."



All of the condemned youths appear to be bearing up well, but some fear is expressed that Marx may break down at the critical moment.

Texas is in holiday attire today, and patriotic demonstrations will be held in almost every city and community in the state, in honor of the sixty-eighth anniversary of the battle of San Jacinto, which immortalized General Sam Houston, placed a fadeless wreath of renown upon every soldier in his army, made good the declaration at Old Washington that Texas of a right should be free and independent, and gave actual existence to the second real republic in North America.

That Day Sixty-Eight

Years Ago

The history of this great battle is always interesting, is a story of valor of which the people never tire, but is singularly so on each recurring anniversary. It is not only memorable as a military achievement remarkable in its speedy and far-reaching results, but is perhaps the most wonderful engagement in history in its completeness, and the length

GEORGE PETTY'S EXPERIENCES The following description was given the writer by George W. Petty, a San Jacinto veteran, who died near Brenham a few years ago:

"My gun was a long rifle, stock included perhaps fifty inches long, and weighed, I appose, close to twenty pounds. The ramrod was made of young nickory, whittled down to proper size with my pocket knife and smoothed down with a piece of glass.
"I was provided that morning with

twenty-three rounds of ammunition. The powder I carried in a powder horn swung around my neck. The bullets I carried in my pants pocket, the percussion caps in my vest pocket, and the patching cut in the lappel of my vest.

"I left my coat in camp, preferring to be as little incumbered as possible. When the fight was over my last round of ammunition was gone, but so were the Mexicans, so I had all I needed.

"I shall never forget," Mr. Petty continued, "the last shot I fired. I occupied" position to the left of my company, which was on the right wing of the army.
