ROME, April 25.-President Loubet who arrived in Rome yesterday went * with the royal cortege to the Pantheon today to lay wreaths on the tombs of Victor Emmanuel and King Humbert. He was received by the veterans of the Italian army. He spoke to each veteran, some of whom wore medals gained while fighting in 1859 with the French against Aus-

With the same cortege President Loubet then drove to the Palazzo Margherita, formerly the seat of the American ambassador, to pay a visit to the queen mother Margherita. He remained a half hour.

Those surrounding the pope assert that he expressed an intention to protest against the visit of President Loubet to Rome on the ground that it is the first occasion on which the head of the Catholic country visited the Quirinal since the fall of the temporal powers of the popes. It is not known when or under what form the protest will be issued.

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



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

Twenty-eight Years Ago Judge Coke Was Inaugurated Governor of Texas and Civil Lib. erty Restored to the People

Today, April the 25th, is the twenty-eighth anniversary of the most memorable event in the history of Texas subsequent to the civil war, as it marks the time of the complete restoration of government into the hands of the people who had stood by it in times of war, and when there was no possibility of interference in its civil affairs from military or federal authority.

Twenty-eight years ago Judge Richard Coke and Col. R. B. Hubbard were inaugurated governor and lieutenant governor in the old capitol.

True it is, that they were inaugurated first time January 15, 1874 and had therefore served for two years, but the affairs of the state had been administered under the constitution of 1869, adopted after a second session of the constitutional convention, held during the Davis administration. This constitution was unpopular and so hampered and restricted the action of the legislature in some respects. and was so unbridled in others that the fifteenth legislature decided to call a convention to frame a new organic law. This body met on the 6th of September, 1875, framed the present constitution and adjourned on the 24th of November. The work of the convention was ratified by the people at an election held February 15, 1876.

The legislature convened on the 12th of April, and on the 25th, twenty-eight years ago today, as stated, Governor Coke was inaugurated, and the last vestige of military rule and military government became a matter of history and unpleasant recollection in this state.
