It was the almost universal opinion of those present that all sight drafts should be promptly honored and if the shipments were not what were represented there was recourse when application was made to the board of arbitration of the association, a provision made whereby all disputes and contentions might be settled to the satisfaction of those interested.

NEW YORK, May 21 .- In the past fortnight there have been 150 deaths in New York from spotted fever, or cerebro spinal meningitis. That the epidemic is increasing is shown by the fact that the week just passed had ninety-four fatal cases. Stringent measure are now being taken by the health department to stop the spread of the contagion, which has grown steadily since March 1. Just how the disease is transmitted is not fully understood by the doctors, nor is there any known remedy, the efforts of the physicians being directed almost entirely to alleviating the terrible agony of the suf-

The latest great epidemic of the disease in New York occurred in 1873, when It caused great mortality.

The bodies of all the czars of Russia who have died since Peter the Great lie in a memorial chapel in one of the Islands of the Neva. All the cenotaphs, consistexactly alike, excepting that each bear the name of the emperor whose body ! beneath it.

a short time ago married. Captain Clements was elected to the city council of Fort Worth in 1889 and in 1890 was re-elected. He was again elected to the council in 1894. While in the council the last time he was a member of the public schools committee and had much to do with the erection of the handsome buildings which are now being used.

He was prominent in the Presby erian church, being an officer of the Broadway church of this city. He was member of the Longview lodge. Knights of Pythias, of the Knights of Honor and of the United Confederate Veterans

He was very popular with all who knew him. He was a well preserved man for his age, was of genial disposition, a good citizen, and a loving husband and father. His relations in every walk of life were such as to attract people to him, and throughout his entire residence here he has been liked

by all who knew him. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock


Vast Quantities of Zinc Exist in Arbuckle Moutains, Also Gold, Silver and Lead
