NEWS COMES BY THE WAY OF TOKIO

LONDON, June 1.—A dispatch from Rome says a telegram has been received there from Tokio reporting that General Kuropatkin has completely defeated General Kuroki's forces near Sumantsu (probably Salimatsza of Siam). All Russian positions east of Hai Cheng have been abandoned, according to the telegram, several guns having been taken and whole squadrons of Cossacks captured.

JAP BATTLESHIP RUNS AGROUND

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1.—An unconfirmed report has reached here from Mukden that the Japanese battleship Fujii is aground on a reef off Misao Tao islands, between Taiwan Tung and Shan Tung promontories, where she is being guarded by torpedo boats.

JAPANESE PRISONERS ARRIVE IN SIBERIA

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1.—Advices received by mail from Tomsk, Western Siberia, report the arrival there of a detachment of Japanese prisoners, consisting of twenty-six officers and 180 men, the majority of whom are sailors. All were in good health. The officers were sent to the officers' club, while the men are quartered in a riding school. A food allowance has been granted the officers of \$5 to \$25.50 monthly, while the enlisted men receive eight cents daily.

OKLAHOMA SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN CONVENTION

GUTHRIE, Okla., June 1.—Enthusiasm appears to be the keynote of the twentieth annual convention of the Oklahoma Sunday School Association in session here. A big parade of the delegates and the Sunday school children of Guthrie marked the opening today. The three days' program is the best ever arranged for a meeting of the association. The Oklahoma delegates to the world's convention at Jerusalem will report on their trip and noted Sunday school workers of several states will deliver addresses. The music promises to be a notable feature of the gathering.

JAP MERCHANT CARRIES MONEY TO THE MIKADO

CHICAGO, June 1.—Ito Himatsu, a Japanese merchant of New York, who arrived in Chicago with a common split leather valise containing \$1,129,000 in United States money which he will give to the mikado to help defeat Russia. The cash is all in United States gold notes and bank bills. The money was deposited here with a trust company on the advice of the local Japanese consul.

Ito Himatsu expects to sail from San Francisco on June 11. He is a recognized authority in America on Japanese art and his discourses at chautauquian assemblies for the last five years have been the subject of many written disquisitions on influence of Japanese arts and Japanese ideas upon modern aestheticism. Ito Himatsu is known in New York as a dealer in objects of Japanese art.

Fears are entertained here for the safety of the Japanese garrison and regiment at Wonsan, as Russian cavalry is reported south of Ham Heung, says a Herald dispatch from Seoul. Reinforcements are being sent to Wonsan from Ham Heung and Ping Yang. Reinforcements sent to the latter point and Anju have reduced the strength of the local garrison to about 2,000 which is considered sufficient as any Russian approach by way of the east coast against Seoul would be speedily known through the numerous small Japanese squadrons located in every village to the north and east. These squadrons also can be used to reinforce Seoul.

ST. AMENT AT 5 TO 1 WINS ENGLISH DERBY

LONDON, June 1.—The race for the derby stakes (6,500 sovereigns, at about one mile and a half) at Epsom today was won by St. Ament.

St. Ament was at 5 to 1 in the betting and was ridden by K. Cannon. The result in detail follows: Leopold De Rothschild, St. Ament (K. Cannon), first; Sir Tatton Sykes, John O'Gant (Thursby), second; S. B. Joes, St. Denis (Halsey) third. Eight horses (K. Cannon), 5 to 1; John O'Gant (Thursby), 11 to 2; Coxswain (Butchers), 10 to 1; St. Denis (Halsey), 50 to 1.

LOWDEN UNDERMINES DELEGATES OF YATES

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 1.—Predictions were freely made among the delegates to the republican state convention today that Frank O. Lowden is ready to make a renewed assault on Governor Yates' column in the hope of capturing at least 100 of Yates' delegates. The theory put forward was that if Lowden would do this he would get the Sherman vote solidly, a large part of the Hamlin and the Warner votes, and enough of the Deneen delegates to make the 752 necessary to break the dead lock on the gubernatorial nomination.

OKLAHOMA FEARS TO INSTRUCT LEST WOULD IMPERIL STATEHOOD

ANADARKO, Okla., June 1.—Before the democratic territorial convention to elect six delegates to the national convention was called to order here today, the anti-Yates delegates were taken out of the hall by a man about the age of 40, who, according to reports, was fighting for statehood, would lay itself liable to attack from the eastern party in case of instructions for Hearst and he ever, seemed to be about evenly divided.

EUROPE MUST COMBINE AGAINST AMERICAN AGGRESSION

CHICAGO, June 1.—A union of the majority of the nations of Europe into a great federation has been predicted by Anatole Le Roy-Beaulieu, a French economist and sociologist, in a lecture on "The United States of Europe," given under the auspices of the Alliance Francaise. In this union, which Prof. Beaulieu thought was sure to come about, though possibly not in the twentieth century, three nations he said would not be included: England, because it would combine instead with the United States; Russia, because it would form a great independent nation by itself; and Turkey, because it would be absorbed by the condition and lose its identity. The union would be a necessity, the speaker said, to resist American aggression and the "yellow peril." The lecturer said he thought this country has a tendency to look upon continental Europe with the same regard that children have for super-annuated parents, whose usefulness has come to an end.

THEIR AIM PEACE OF WORLD

JUDGE GRAY PRESIDES OVER NOTABLE ASSEMBLAGE AT LAKE MOHONK, NEW YORK

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., June 1.—Drawn together by their common desire to see arbitration succeed war as a means of settling disputes between nations, some 200 men and women—educators, jurists, diplomats, statesmen and business men—have gathered here for the tenth annual conference on international arbitration. The visitors are the guests of Albert K. Smiley, a wealthy Quaker who inaugurated the series of conferences ten years ago and who has devoted a great part of his time and fortune to the promotion of peace.

JUSTICE HARLAN REACHES AGE OF 71

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Justice John M. Harlan of the United States supreme court observed his seventy-first birthday today. Though eligible a year ago for retirement from the bench on full pay, there is not the slightest prospect that he will avail himself of the privilege for some years to come, as he is hale and hearty and has the vigor of many healthy men half his age. The justice has served nearly thirty years on the supreme bench and is the senior member of the court.

BRYAN WILL CONTROL NEBRASKA DEMOCRATS

OMAHA, Neb., June 1.—Notwithstanding the opposition on the part of many prominent Nebraska democrats to the leadership of William J. Bryan it is probable that the democratic state convention in session here today will act in accordance with the wishes of Mr. Bryan and in support of the Kansas City platform. The work of the convention is confined to the selection of delegates to St. Louis. The nominating convention will be held at Lincoln later in the summer.

GEORGIA HOLDS ITS CONVENTION

ATLANTA, Ga., June 1.—The democrats of Georgia met today in state convention to name delegates to the national convention, and to confirm the nominations of the state officers made at the primaries in April. Prior to the assembling of the convention the situation was chaotic. A contest for the nomination, which several days of conferences among the leaders has been unable to settle in advance, whether or not the delegate to St. Louis shall go instructed for Parker or shall be bound by the union and by preferential resolution from the convention to support Parker at St. Louis so long as he shall seem the strongest candidate before the national convention.

MUST KNEEL WHEN THE POPE APPEARS

ROME, June 1.—The vatican authorities have given strictest notice to those who recommend people for audiences with the pope, that they must guarantee that such persons will conform to the vatican etiquette in kneeling and kissing the hand of the pope. This notification is issued as a result of the conduct of some Americans a few weeks ago, who refused to kneel when the pope appeared.

TERRIFIC FLOOD COSTS TWO LIVES

Waters Sweep Down Green River and Tributaries in State of Wyoming

MORE MAY BE DROWNED

GREEN RIVER, Wyo., June 1.—Floods in the Green river and tributaries have cost at least two lives and much damage to property. A messenger has just arrived here with news from the inundated district. It is his opinion that the death list may be greatly increased when complete returns come in. The known dead are: FRANK WOODRUFF, range rider; WILLIAM EUBANKS, range rider; Woodruff was foreman of the Circle cattle outfit and was drowned while fording Silver Creek, a tributary of Green river. His horse was swept from its feet and rolled over on him, fracturing his skull and rendering him incapable of making a fight for life. His body was recovered. Eubanks was drowned in Green river while running a bunch of horses through the stream near Barns postoffice. His body and that of his horse were swept away and have not been recovered.

FLOODS IN HORSE CREEK VALLEY

CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 1.—Word has just reached this city of a terrific flood which swept down the valley of Horse Creek 30 miles north of Cheyenne yesterday afternoon. The flood followed a tremendous fall of rain about the headwaters of the creek and within a short time the creek was transformed into a torrent from 200 yards to half a mile in width. It is said that the damage to ranch property will be immense. There is no report of loss of life.

JUDGE GRAY PRESIDES

OVER NOTABLE ASSEMBLAGE AT LAKE MOHONK, NEW YORK

MEN OF WIDE EXPERIENCE TAKE PART TO CONSIDER VARIOUS TREATIES OF WORLD

The conference, which began today, is unusually well attended and promises to attract more attention than any previous session. It is fortunate in having as its presiding officer Judge George Gray of Delaware, who is one of the four United States representatives on the bench of the Hague tribunal, and whose experience as a member of the Paris peace commission of 1898, the anthracite strike arbitration bodies has given him a wide and varied knowledge of arbitral procedure. Other notable men who will be heard during the three days' session are Judge William L. Penfield, of the state department at Washington, who will speak on the Venezuelan case at the Hague court; Commissioner of the District of Columbia who is down for an address on the significance of the present agitation in favor of an arbitration treaty with Great Britain and Charles M. Pepper, special commissioner appointed by the government on the Pan-American railway project, who will speak on the relations of that enterprise to the promotion of peace and good will among the nations of the western hemisphere.

These three are among those who have prepared set addresses, but there are many other men of note who are expected to take a part in the conference discussions. Among the number are Don M. Dickinson of Michigan, Prof. Joseph H. Bassett Moore and James Brown Scott of Columbia University, Assistant Secretary of State Francis B. Loomis, Justice David J. Brewer of the United States supreme court, General Stewart L. Woodford, President Warfield of Lafayette College, General O. O. Howard, Edward Everett Hale, Judge Charles E. Elliott of Minneapolis, Congressman George W. Smith of Illinois, Congressman C. E. Littlefield of Maine, Congressman Robert F. Brewster of Louisiana and Congressman T. E. Burton of Ohio.

for hitherto, by the purchase of land grants, he owned about 200,000 acres eastward from his land acquisition, as well as fully 1,000,000 acres in the northern part of the Mexican state of Sonora, secured in the shape of Spanish land grants or through direct deed from the Mexican government.

Within his Mexican domain is included the Cananea range of mountains, wherein the great copper mines that bear his name and whence have come his riches. On the north these holdings join his possessions within the United States, the international line running for fifty miles or more across the Greene cattle range.

All this is one grand cattle range, where barbed wire fencing is bought by the train load and where the cowboys employed could form a regiment of Rough Riders. It is held as the property of the Greene Cattle Company, of which Greene also is a funded debt of \$5,225,000 which was guaranteed by the New York Central. This, too, is taken over.

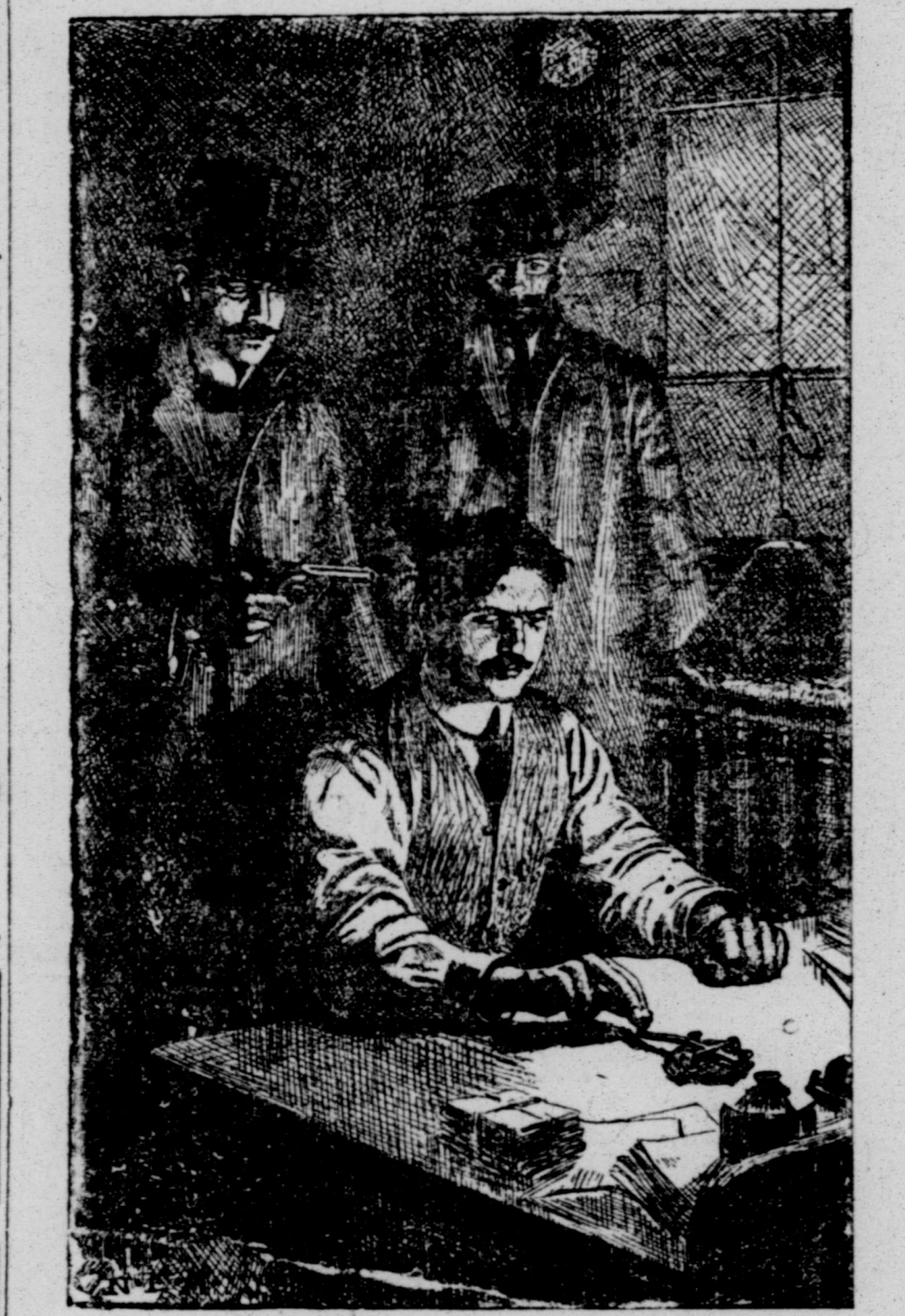

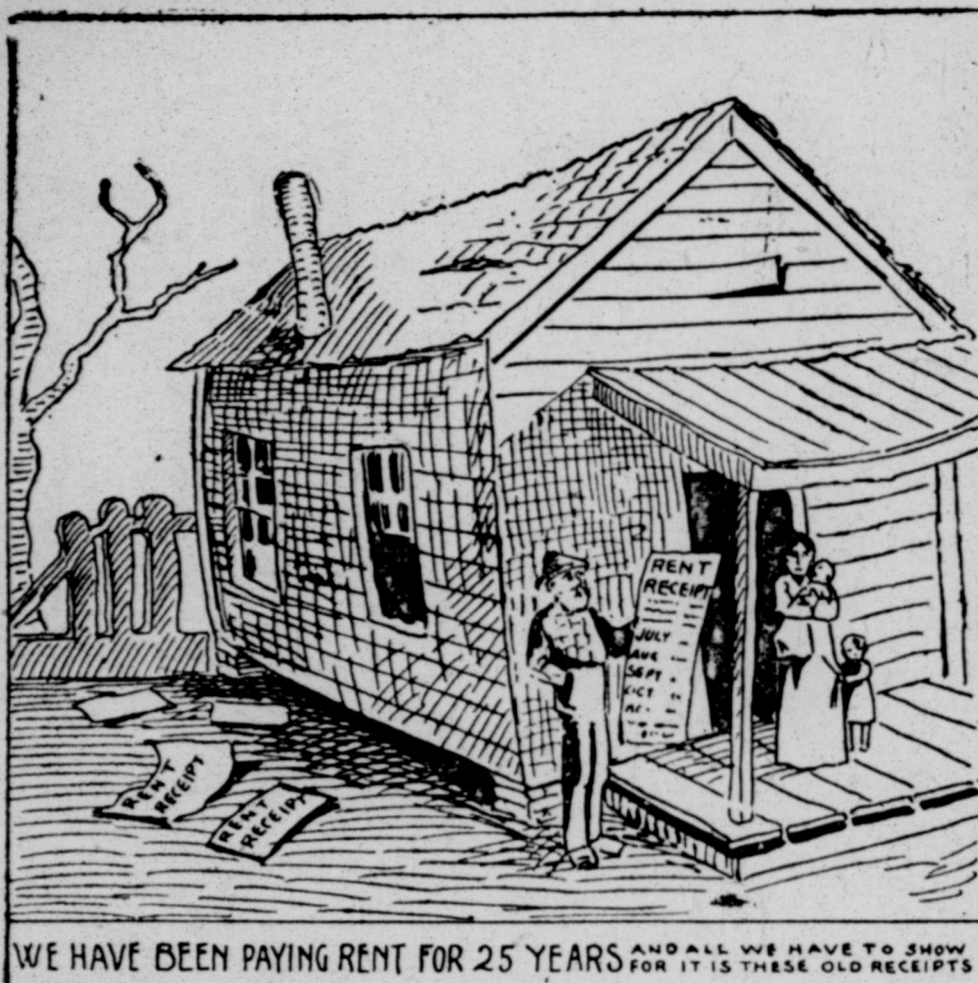

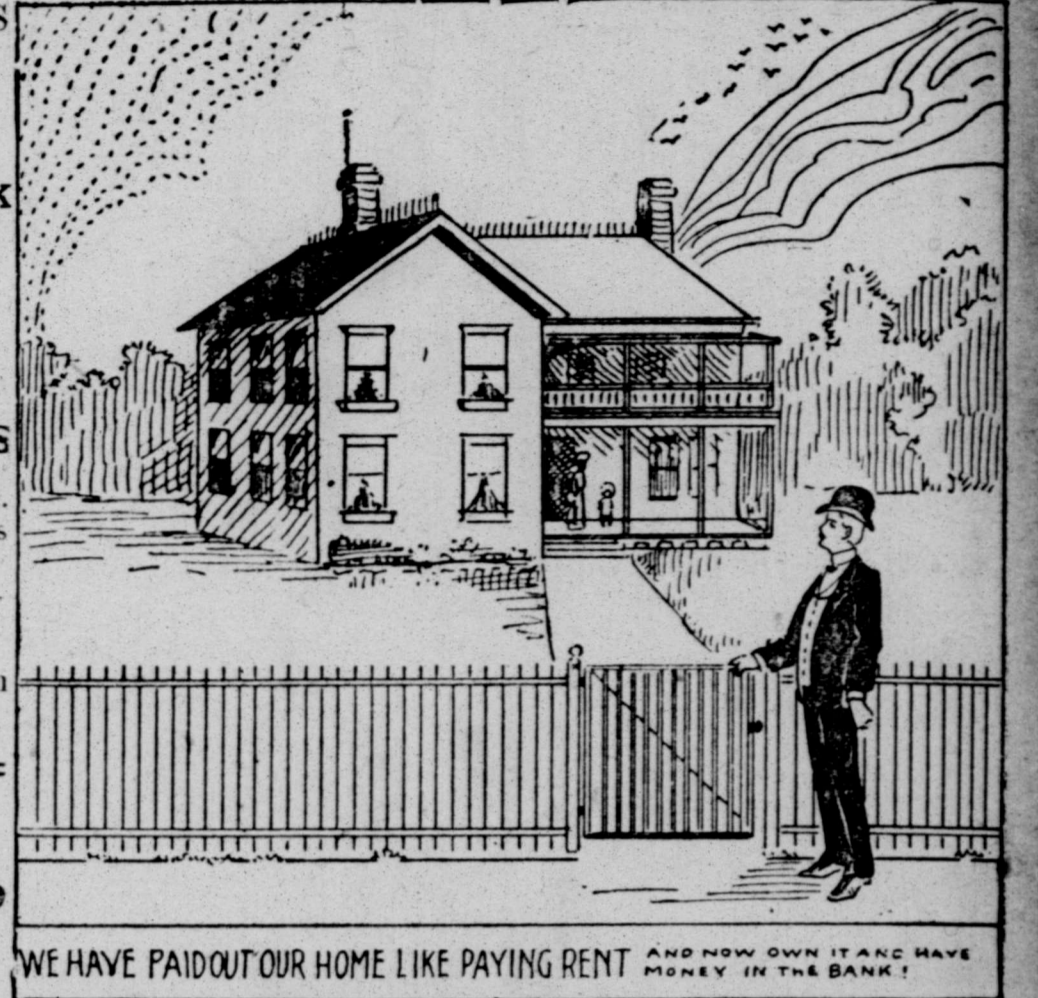

Fencibles Cannot Afford to Pay Their Own Expenses to the World's Fair

Captain B. C. Carter of the Fort Worth Fencibles said today that it was very doubtful whether the company would be able to attend the World's Fair along with the other Texas companies that have been designated by Adjutant General Hulen of the Texas National Guard. "It will take at least \$400 or \$500 to pay the actual expenses of the company after it reaches St. Louis," said Captain Carter, "not considering the incidentals, and many of the members of the company are not financially able to meet these expenses." An effort is being made to have the above amount raised by public subscription in order to assist the company in going to the World's Fair. As has been stated in The Telegram, many of the other companies have been aided by citizens and members of the Fencibles hope that Fort Worth will come to the front and help them. Captain Carter says that an answer as to what the company will do is to be given Adjutant General Hulen at once, and he will be expected to advise that official within the next few days either that the Fencibles will go or remain at home. Colonel George T. West has gone to Austin on matters relating to the trip to St. Louis. He will confer with the adjutant general regarding the trip and arrive at some understanding. Members of the company are all anxious to go to St. Louis, but all of them are not financially provided for such an expensive outing. Captain Carter says that with some assistance the company will be able to go.

WARD MEETINGS SATURDAY NIGHT

Some Will Favor Instructions Regarding the Candidates for President

Under the call issued a few days ago by Chairman William Capps of the democratic executive committee of the county, the various ward chairmen of this city are selecting places for holding the ward primaries next Saturday night. These ward primaries are for the purpose of selecting delegates to a county convention which is to be held June 11. The county convention will select delegates to the state convention to be held in San Antonio, which will send delegates to the national democratic convention. The indication is that great care will be exercised in selecting the delegates at the ward primaries and at the county convention. The Parker Club in this city is quite active and the members want to see the delegation to San Antonio go instructed for the New Yorker. There are others who will oppose this, some being in favor of instructing for Hearst while others are for an uninstructed delegation. The announcements as to where all these meetings will be held has not been made. Chairman A. J. Pasquin of the Eighth ward has selected Skidmore's store at the corner of Magnolia and Hemphill streets for his meeting. The Hemphill car line goes to the locality direct. Ward Chairman J. H. Thrasher of the Ninth has called his meeting for the office of John L. Terrell, in the basement of the court house.

SITS HOURSON PILE OF TIES

Man Comes From Waco Very Sick and Is Now at the Emergency Hospital

Yesterday afternoon about 1 o'clock, a Norwegian, Benjamin Reed by name, was discovered choking for breath and half dead from exposure and starvation, sitting on a pile of ties near the International and Great Northern round house. The police patrol was immediately summoned and the man conveyed to the emergency hospital. There medical attention and food were given so that now there is some hope for his recovery. Reed is a middle-aged man, and, as he says, has been employed as a railroad hand. Last Monday, at 5 in the morning, with a companion, he left Waco on an International and Great Northern freight. In the freight car he was taken sick and on arriving in Fort Worth at 3:30 Monday afternoon crawled from the car to a pile of ties near the International and Great Northern round house. He was unable to lay down, for when he did so he could not breathe. Thus the sick man sat all Monday afternoon in the broiling sun; all through Monday night and was not discovered until 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. During the time since he left Waco until he was taken to the hospital he did not taste food or drink. His companion did not desert him. In almost a dying condition he was finally taken to the emergency hospital, where he now is. He is suffering from acute asthma as well as being in a general weakened condition. Dr. A. J. Mullennix is treating him and has hopes of his recovery.

STOCK RAISING IN PHILIPPINES

Something About Conditions That Prevail at This Time in Our New Island Possessions in the Far East

From reports and other data on file with the bureau of insular affairs, war department, the following facts relative to stock raising in the Philippines have been taken: The industry must be built up anew as a result of the ravages of war, followed by the losses occasioned by the rinderpest, which carried off nearly all of the bovine animals of the archipelago. Prior to the outbreak of hostilities one writer stated that he saw herds of cattle and horses and droves of sheep and goats everywhere. General Otis also, in his report, speaks of large herds of cattle, and states that some localities are distinctively cattle raising districts. Fine grazing lands are to be found in eastern Pangasinan, northern Nueva Ecija, Isabela and Cagayan, and probably in other provinces of Luzon and certainly in other islands. In the three provinces first named are rolling uplands and in the latter broad prairies, although as far as abundance and quality of the grasses are concerned there is apparently no difference, the same species growing both on the prairies and in the hills. These grasses consist of one or two species of Panicum and Eragrostis, and many representatives of several of the Andropogonae, all fine-stemmed, five-leaved grasses, which, in the United States would be known as "bunch" grasses, as they grow in small tufts, not being truly tuft-forming; yet there is sufficient of the latter to prevent gully-eroding or washing, notwithstanding the heavy tropical rains to which the region is subjected. The grazing lands of Pangasinan, Nueva Ecija and Visaya are distinguished by their hilly, rolling character, the ridges and small valleys, tops of the higher hills and surrounding mountains being densely forested. In every small valley is a stream of clear, pure water. Hence there is an abundance of feed, water and shelter—the requisites for an ideal cattle country, and the topographical features of the country permit herds of cattle to be isolated in the valleys and thus guarded for months against infection by contact or through the water supply. The water supply is especially to be noted, as in the numerous mountain streams the water is pure and as clear as crystal, except immediately following a heavy rain. ATTACK ON PORT ARTHUR BEGUN BY THE JAPS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 1.—A special cable from the staff correspondent of the Indianapolis News at Cebu dated June 1 says: "The Japanese land attack on Port Arthur was begun yesterday morning. The Russian forces that were driven southward from Dalny and Kin Chou by Japanese are assisting the garrison at Port Arthur and the Russian navy has joined in the movement to repulse the enemy. "There may be several days skirmishing and outpost work before the Russian city is taken, but it is the opinion of the refugees who have arrived here that the Russians eventually must succumb to overwhelming numbers. Dalny, Kin Chou, Tallenwan, and Nanshan have already fallen before the Japanese."

OFFICER KILLS BROTHER-IN-LAW

BEAUMONT, Texas, June 1.—Vester Burg, a police officer, shot and killed Fred Gainer of Waco at the Southern Pacific depot at noon. Gainer was shot twice in the back. Either wound would have caused his death. The men are brothers-in-law. Gainer's wife witnessed the killing. Family troubles was the cause. IS NOT FRED GAINER WACO, Texas, June 1.—The man named Gainer killed in Beaumont today is not Fred Gainer, but J. L. Gainer, who is in the employ of the Canuteson foundry. He is secretary of the Hook and Ladder Fire Company of the Waco fire department.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Considerable comment has been evoked over the reported failure to extend an invitation to Mayor McClellan to review the Grand Army parade on Memorial day. JOHN G. CARLISLE RECOVERS BIG FEE

WASHINGTON, June 1.—John G. Carlisle, ex-secretary of the treasury, obtained a verdict against Leon Barnes in an action brought before Justice Clark in the supreme court to recover \$25,000 for legal services rendered in endeavoring to secure a rebate on certain customs duties on goods imported into New Porto Rico. Mr. Carlisle was awarded the full amount, plus the costs, the total being \$25,349.

LANHAM TAKES OF TEXAS EXHIBIT

While Not Properly Placed Yet Shows to Advantage Resources of the State

AUSTIN, Texas, June 1.—Governor Lanham, who has just returned from St. Louis, where he went to receive the Texas building on the exposition grounds, was seen today and expressed himself as being highly pleased with the showing the state is making at this big fair.

The building, which at first was adversely criticised, is now admitted to be one among, if not the most novel, unique, striking and attractive on the grounds, and is commented on in this way by all who see it.

The agricultural, timber building material and mineral exhibits, he said, are very fine, and altogether Texas is making a showing at the fair equal, if not superior, to any state in the union, and is one of which all will feel proud who see it.

TOBACCO TRUST SUES MEXICO FOR \$7,500,000

MEXICO CITY, June 1.—A telegram was received here stating that a Virginia tobacco manufacturing firm is suing the government of Mexico for damages to the extent of \$7,500,000 against the Mexican cigar factory, claiming that a Mexican cigar factory has infringed the patent laws by using the trademark of the Virginia company.

He is not steady, working but two or three days at a time and then laying off for a week or so.

This problem has been bothering the plantation owners for some time and a remedy has been found in the employing of Mexican laborers. The Mexican is rarely affected by labor agitation and will work from sunrise to sunset. The negro labor has so far been introduced only in the state of Louisiana.

END SEAT IS NO LONGER RESERVED

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 1.—Passengers must move away over and back of having other persons climb over their knees will be denied them.
