All Russian Positions East of JAP MERCHANT CARRIES Hai Cheng Have Been Abandoned and Many Squadrons of Cossacks Are Captured

LONDON, June 1.-A dispatch from Rome says a telegram has been received there from Tokio reporting that General Kuroki has completely defeated General Kuropatkin's forces near Sumentz (probably Saimatsza or Simatsi.) All Russian positions east of Hat Cheng have been abandoned, according to the telegram, several guns having been taken and whole squadrons of Cossacks captured.

It is possible the news received in Rome refers to the fighting reported is last night's dispatches from Lion Yang and St. Petersburg. These did not indicate a general engagement but showed that a series of sharp engagements had taken place east of Simatsi, lasting from the morning of May 27 until May 30 which resulted in severe losses on both sides and the retirement of the Russians upon Simatsi. The latter place is 35 miles north of Feng Wang Cheng.



BUILDING ORDINANCE TO PREVENT DISASTERS

NEW YORK, June 1 .- A new building ordinance has been adopted by the board of aldermen. It is designed to prevent such disasters as the collapse a few months ago of the Hotel Darlington, entailing the loss of nearly a score of lives. The new regulation gives the superintendent of buildings power to enforce his orders. When the Darlington collapsed, in-

spectors of the buildings department said they had filed the necessary "violations" against the building but that the contractors paid no particular attention to them. The new ordinance empowers the superintendent, without the formality of applying to the court for an order, immediately to stop work on a building when in his judgment the conditions warrant such stoppage.

ORDINANCE NO 903

An Ordinance regulating the use of Automobiles in the city of Fort Worth. it Ordained by the City Council of

the City of Fort Worth: Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to drive, propel or to use or to cause to be driven, propelled or used in, upon, along or across any public square, street, alley or public place in the city of Fort Worth any vehicle or vehicles of the kind commonly known and styled as automobiles, unless the owner of such vehicle or vehicles shall have complied with the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance.

Section 2. The owner of any automobile shall register the said vehicle with the city secretary and procure from the said city secretary a certificate thereof, which said certificate shall state that the owner. giving his name, has registered his said vehicle giving a general description thereof, and that a number has been given the same, which number shall be certified in the face of the certificate. The city secretary shall keep a register in which he shall note the name of the

with a general description of the vehicle registered, together with its number, and he shall in no event give the same num-ber to any two of said vehicles, but they shall be numbered in the order of their registration. The owner of any such vehicle shall, after registration as aforesaid, cause to be painted, placed or affixed on and to

the back of the said vehicle in a con-

spicuous place its number as certified in

owner of the vehicle registered, together

not less than six inches in height and proportionately broad. In case any vehicle which has been registered as aforesaid shall be sold, the keeping. J. J. Dillin, 423 Jennings ave. purchaser thereof may obtain new certificate or registration or at the request of the said purchaser the city secretary shall indorse on the certificate of registration of the former owner the fact of its transfer, and the said city secretary shall note the fact of said transfer in his book required herein to be kept, and the certificate so indorsed shall be in all respects as valid and shall protect the pur-

chaser of the said vehicle to the same extent as would an original certificate of registration. Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to drive, propel or to use or to cause to be driven, propelled or use in, along or across any public square, street, alley or public place in the city of Fort Worth any vehicle or vehicles of the kind commonly known and styled as automobiles, even though the same be duly registered and numbered as provided in section 2 of this ordinance, unless the said-vehicle shall be provided with at least two lights. which, during the hours of darkness shall be kept continually burning and which shall be of such character, size and strength as to be plainly visible for a distance of one-fourth of a mile in front of the said vehicle, and it shall also be unlawful unless the said vehicle be provided with a good and sufficient gong or horn capable of giving such warning as can be plainly heard for a distance of at least six hundred feet. And it shall also be unlawful if the said vehicle or vehicles
