METER SYSTEM PROVES ITS WORTH During the past year two important things have been accomplished in Fort Worth, Texas: The completion of the Mead system of artesian water supply and the introduction of the meter sysm. In four years the annual revenues of the water department increased over \$19,000, although the rates were cut from 20 cents to 10 cents per 1,000 gallons, when the meter system was introduced. Inside of five years Mayor Powell thinks that the revenues will have paid for the new system. In 1901 about 1,000,000 galions a day more were pumped than for a similar period in 1904, although there are 1,600 more services at present than in 1901. This saving in pumpage, togram pay 25 cents instead of 10 cents, and gether with the 50 per cent reducton in rates, have amply justified the introduction of the new supply and the meter system

The city charter should be enlarged in scope that the city might have power to regulate the rates and service of the public utilities of the city in the hands of private concerns. The state legislature had passed several acts to assist railroad building, one of which authorized the loan of \$6,000 on every mile of road completed. The bridge was a r_de structure and very unsafe. Two ac-cidents occurred on it before being re-placed with a substantial structure. In one of the accidents the train was dashed into the river and three men killed. This was in '60. On approaching the bridge passengers were given the privilege of riding over it on the cars or walking, and in most cases they generally accepted the latter alternative as a matter of safety. In 1850 the terminus of the road was at Schulenburg, eighty miles distant from the starting point. Austin was the ob-jective point, but when the road had been built twelve or fifteen miles further the civil war broke out and stopped further construction. After the war the construction was again resumed and the route changed from Austin to San Anonio, which point it finally reached. It was continued on to El Paso, where the road met the Southern Pacific from the west, making an important link in the Southern Pacific system across the con-







Total\$15,490.00 REQUESTS A BATTLESHIP

WASHINGTON, June 6.-Rear Admiral Chadwick, in a cablegram to the navy department today, said the British minister at Morocco had requested the English government to send a battleship to Tangier and gave information that the sultan of Morocco was expected to arrive at Tangier.
