

A Christmas Miracle

Only a few weeks ago, at the newspaper we talked about featuring a Christmas Miracle story in our holiday editions.

Little did I know that this miracle would take place in my own life.

On December 4th a Saturday- I was getting ready to go Christmas shopping, when I noticed several voice mails on my cell phone from Germany, where my daughters live.

Returning the messages, I learned that Cynthia, my youngest daughter, had been in a terrible car accident, and was in a hospital in Bremew, in the North of Germany.

I spoke to a physician at the hospital, who told me that she had very severe injuries and had just come out of surgery.

I booked a flight for the next day.

I called the hospital again before flying.

"Well," the physician said hesitantly, "Your daughter made it through the night."

Dallas, Houston, Amsterdam, Bremen- after about fourteen hours of travel- not knowing what I would be facing, I dropped my suitcase in a hotel and went straight to the hospital.

"You got a flight! You made it so quickly!" The receptionist greeted me.

Such a huge hospital with so many patients! Yet she had taken a special interest.

Behind many locked doors, I was brought to my daugter.

She lay in a bed with many tubes and needles attached to her body.

She opened her eyes and squeezed my hand. "Mama," she said, and drifted back into a deep sleep.

"She may be out of danger for the moment," the physician carefully said.

Her ordeal has only begun, for to this point the doctors could only take measures to save her life. Other surgery will have to follow.

And yet, it is a miracle- for I learned that out of the five passengers in the car, three are dead. We are not sure about the condition of the fourth.

The accident was caused by a drunken driver. He is also dead.

I don't know the names of all the people who saved her life-those who called for help at the accident, the medics who care lifted her to the hospital, the surgeon's who made fast and correct decisions.

And yes, it seems that a power higher than we humans also hovered near her during those fatal moments.

I do believe in miracles.



POMPEII & .1ERCULANEUM... By HVO, GNO & V

MOST OF us only knew of Pompeii as a "far away place" that had been covered by lava from a volcano long, long ago, and had little knowledge of where or when, and had never even heard of Herculaneum, and didn't know that it was also covered. Few ever dreamed of seeing

If we knew anything about Pompeii it was from a brief sentence in a unit on ancient history in high school, and if we were lucky, maybe a field trip to a traveling exhibit of relics from that event. Some may have even been exposed to the "steamier" side of some of the art pieces from those cities in art books.

We got a first hand look on this recent trip; saw more and learned more than we'd ever known, about the towns on the west side of the lower boot of Italy. At Pompeii we lunched on FRESH tomato salad, margarita and spicy pizzas [pepperoni is hot pepper there]) right at the entrance which gave us parking privileges for the ruins. (E10. each entrance.) We walked and passed vendors offering just about everything imaginable.

On a summer morning in 79 AD, Pompeii was buried

after an unexpected and dramatic eruption of the volcano Mount Vesuvius. The tragedy left little possibility of survival for the estimated 10,000 people who lived in the town. Herculaneum (a town between Naples and Pompeii) was totally covered by solidified mud, believed produced by the ground water table that flew into the magma chamber of the volcano. That town was just preserved in a coating of mud. Pompeii was destroyed by fire and lava, with living things killed by the poisonous gases released from the pumice stones. Seventeen years earlier a violent earthquake (estimated level 6) shook the towns with a large number of people killed and much damage done to the buildings. Rebuilding was still underway when the volcano erupted ... The eruption threw pumice, stones and lava into the sky over a wide area and heavy rains followed. Most of the people of Herculaneum had time to escape the onslaught of mud that literally buried their town ... The books report that Pompeii was settled as early as the end of the seventh century B.C. by the Etruscans, and destroyed in a matter of a few hours when the day darkened, the town was buried. Volcanic material fell, the earth tremors continued and tidal waves

occurred the morning of the

day after. A writer says, solidified mud than it was to "There were no longer any houses, roads or trees. All forms of life had been wiped out." The Emperor came in 80 A.D. and decided not to undertake any work in favor of the irredeemably buried towns of Pompeii and Herculaneum. The survivors of the former tried to recover statues of their gods and sacred objects and looked for the bodies of their loved ones. Much later, from 208 to 235 A.D. the emperor began excavations to recover marble, columns and statues but the works were soon interrupted; from then on Pompeii was completely forgotten. A canal project in 1592 found ruins of buildings, but wasn't until 1763 that an inscription was found that named Pompeii. Excavation work made better progress in Pompeii than in Herculaneum which was covered by a mud slide, as it was much harder to remove

the hardened blanket of

dig out Pompeii from the layers of ash and stones ... Excavations continue today; there was a French team working at Pompeii when we were there... Oh, yes, there is a gift shop and snack bar ... What about that mountain by the way" Vesuvius: erupted 11 times in the following 12 centuries, the most violent in 1139. one in 1631 was almost equal to that of 79 A.D. and caused the deaths of approximately 4,000 people. Other violent eruptions followed; in 1707, 1794, 1895, 1899 and as late as 1906 and 1944. A Vesuvius observatory was set up in 1845 to monitor the mountain's activity ... Could go again? Who knows?...What do you see today in the ruins? As much as you've got time and strength to expend ... Roofless masonry walls indicating buildings and rooms within buildings, temples to their gods (and some of the things they worshiped are often done in different ways today), columns remain indicating elaborate structures including community kitchens with giant recessed vessels in bars, a forum where business and government action were conducted, tiered seating surrounding arenas, municipal




"This one's measured wrong," she screams, and the worker prays that the mismeasurement favors the customer. It doesn't, and she rails about being cheated.





Nebraska Governor To Lead USDA

Texas Senator Cornyn Applauds Choice

Nebraska Gov. Mike Johanns has been nominated by President Bush to serve as Secretary of Agriculture.

Texas Sen. John Cornyn stated that Governor Johanns would bring "a wealth of knowledge and experience on food, farming and convervation issues to Washington."

"As the Governor of the Cornhusker State, he has seen firsthand the challenges of today's agricultural producers as they compete in the global economy," Cornyn further stated.

Cornyn said that the existing Farm Bill - in part crafted by Ranking Member of the House Ag. Committee, Congressman Charles Stenholm (TX-Dist.17) - was working and "helping farmers by allowing them to plan and operate based on

expected," he added.

In a redistricting shuffle in Texas, Stenholm could no longer run for reelection in the 17th Congressional District, and lost to incumbent Congressman Randy Neugebauer in the 2004 election Congressional District 19.



The Senator listed the problems of BSE, property rights for farms and ranches, and the ending the death tax, as goals, which needed to be acheived in the future.











I'm even more concerned about the new level of vulgarity that is clearly apparent in T-shirt graffiti. Take a walk in the mall and read teenager's T-shirts. You'll see what I mean.

A company named Co-ed Naked Sports leads the way in this. Most of their T-shirts are inscribed with sexuallycharged, double-meaning phrases like this one for Law Enforcement: "Up against the wall and spread 'em." Or their T-shirt for tennis: "It's in, it's out, it's over." Perhaps you'll think me a prude, but corporation's other T-shirt statements are too crude to repeat here.

People are sometimes known by their T-shirt slogans. And T-shirt graffiti is a lot like bumper stickers. "I am somebody" because of what I say and who I identify with in saying it. Somehow in this "in-your-face" culture in which we live


I think many of the subtlety and gentility have been lost. Now we force our philosophies and our materialism on total strangers.






