We inadvertently missed forty or fifty names on our Dimmitt mailing list two weeks ago, and we wish to state right now that it will never happen again! Folks who failed to receive their paper forthwith told the postoffice employees and then piled in on the editor, with the result that we feel sure the News is appreciated. However, we will employ other means hereafter to ascertain such facts!

We have been wondering of late, if it wouldn't be possible, and a good plan, for us to begin to think of a county library for Castro. It would be much easier and less expensive, to procure one at this time, that later, with a larger population. The News will welcome communications on this subject, from those interested.

The Little Red Schoolhouse that used to turn out leading business men and statesmen, is complained of now for not producing enough ball players and athletes.

With twelve candidates out for governor, and as many for other state offices, and all clamoring for free publicity in the newspapers of the state, we see no reason why a paper could not publish twelve pages every week from now until July 26, but—the day of so much promiscuous free space is gone! The many platforms, etc., etc., coming to the News each week are read, and then, ordinarily, relegated to the receptacle provided for the use of the products of the spring poets!

The most important election, so far as the entire county and its future welfare is concerned, will be held on Saturday of this week, when school trustees will be elected in the 15 districts of the county. This is the most important department of our public administration, and a perusal of the names printed on the ballots, indicates interest has been shown thus far. THREE COURTS FOR DIMMITT DURING APRIL

District and Commissioners' Tribunals to be in Session Here on April 14.

Dimmitt will have its share of court beginning on Monday, April 14, when the spring term of District Court will open, with Judge Charles Clements on the bench. On the same day, the regular monthly meeting of the Commissioners' Court of Castro County will be held. And due to the fact that County Court is subject to call at any time, it is barely possible that we will have three courts in session in one day, as the county tribunal may be in session for the setting of any business coming before it. In the News next week, will appear the list of grand and petit jurors, summoned for the District Court, as well as a complete civil and criminal docket of the cases to be tried during this term.

Many Connections Being Made on Water System

Work on ditching for the city waterworks system has been held up this week, awaiting the arrival of a car of six-inch cast iron pipe, to be used as mains in residential sections of the city.

According to Bert Huckabee, this pipe is expected daily, and the testing of mains will begin on April 12, at which time the reservoir will be completed, and it is very likely that the tank will be finished by that date.

While no contracts are being made by the city for water connections, a large number of property owners have ordered same, and meter boxes are being installed in many places over the city.

NEW ELEVATOR TO BE BUILT BY GRAIN CO.

New Elevator to be Started Next Week Will Give Dimmitt Total of Four.

Announcement is made this week by Clarence O. Byrnes, of the Castro County Grain Co., that work would begin on a new elevator, of 60,000 bushels capacity, next week, and would be completed by June 15, in time to handle the grain from this year's harvest.

The new elevator will be constructed of sheet iron, and will be located just north of their present building, and the contract has been awarded to the Star Engineering Co., of Wichita, Kansas.

This new elevator will give the Castro County Grain Co. a total capacity of 80,000 bushels, and a total loading capacity of 6,500 bushels per hour, and will be equipped thruout with the latest and most modern machinery.

Substantial Refund On Gasoline Tax To Come Back

According to dispatches from Austin, 121 claims have been made from Castro County for refunds on gasoline taxes, as provided by a law passed last year. This new law provides for the refund of taxes on gasoline where the fuel is used exclusively for farming purposes other than the propelling of vehicles on the streets, roads and highways of the state.

It is necessary, under the law, for the purchaser to file notice of application for refund, with the comptroller of public accounts at Austin, some time before the actual application, which is then filed on special blanks provided for that purpose by the comptroller's department.

The 121 claims allowed from this county amount to \$2,181.36, covering the period from July, 1929, when the law went into effect, to March 30, this year.

The total refunds in the state amounted to \$142,101.98, covering 8,327 claims, during the same period.

CITY OFFICIALS RE-ELECTED BY VOTERS APR. 1

Very Little Interest Shown in City Election Tuesday. No Opposition

Dimmitt voters are evidently satisfied with the manner in which the affairs of the city are being conducted, judging from the vote polled in the election Tuesday, when A. M. Brownlee was re-elected mayor and George Barnett and Edgar Ramey were returned to the commissioners' posts, all for a term of two years.

Only thirty-nine votes were cast, as compared with 121, when the present commissioners were elected, and the commission form of government adopted last December. There are estimated to be from 150 to 175 qualified voters in the city at this time.

Much Interest is Being Shown in Excursion on 27th

Additional plans concerning the Castro County Excursion to the Tunnels and Gravel Pit on April 27, have been made, and it is announced this week that church services will be held in the afternoon by the excursionists, conducted by local pastors.

It is understood that Edgar Ramey, Dimmitt business man, and Edwin Ramey, prominent farmer, have arranged to furnish free tickets to all old settlers of the county, who have resided in Castro county for 35 years or more.

Tickets are now on sale for the trip, at \$2.20 for the round trip, at the Dimmitt and Hart depots, Evers Cafe in Hart, the Ramey Implement Co., and Gunter and Dimmitt Drug stores in Dimmitt. W. P. Ray, of Dimmitt, Denver conductor, and the originator of the trip, is also selling the tickets.

CONTRACT FOR NEW SCHOOL AT FLAGG LET

Contract for the new school at Flagg was awarded at a special meeting held on Tuesday of this week. The bid of Charles McBride, of Crosbyton, was accepted, and it is understood that work will begin at an early date on the structure, which will be of brick and tile construction.

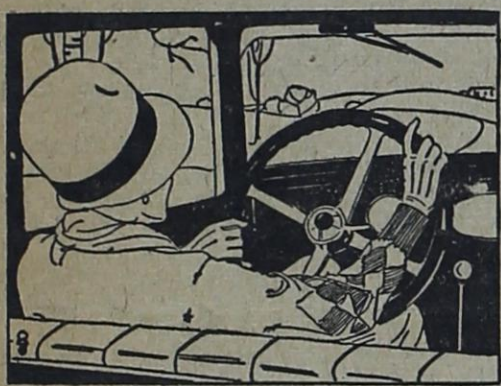

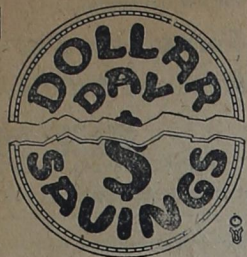

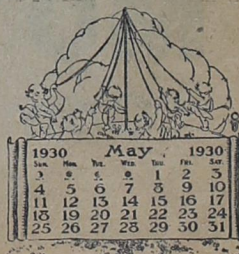

used good judgment in placing the initial rate at a figure that could be lowered, rather than one which would, eventually, be raised, for revenue purposes in the operation of the plant.

In reply to a recent communication as to how the date of Easter is determined, we quote the following: The Council of Christian Churches at Nicaca adopted the present rule for determining the date of Easter, in A. D. 325. The day falls on the first Sunday following the Paschal full moon, which happens upon or next after March 21. The principal reason for placing Easter Sunday on this date, it is said, was that the Pilgrims needed moonlight to travel on their way to the great Easter festivities. The date of Easter may vary at present between March 22 and April 25. If a Paschal full moon falls on a Sunday the Easter day is the next Sunday. This year Easter comes on April 20th.

Sidewalk construction in Dimmitt is progressing nicely. Very few property owners have been opposed to the construction of walks adjacent to their property. 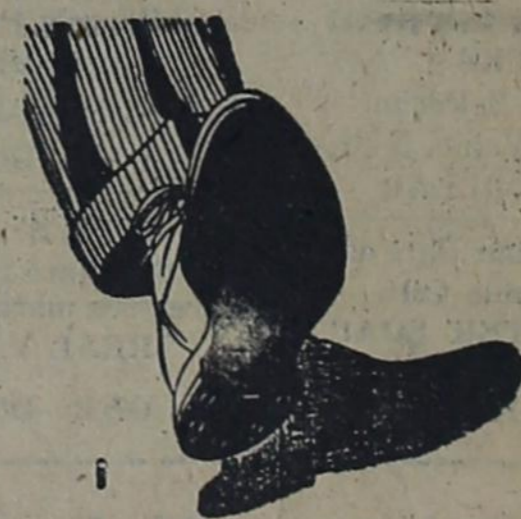

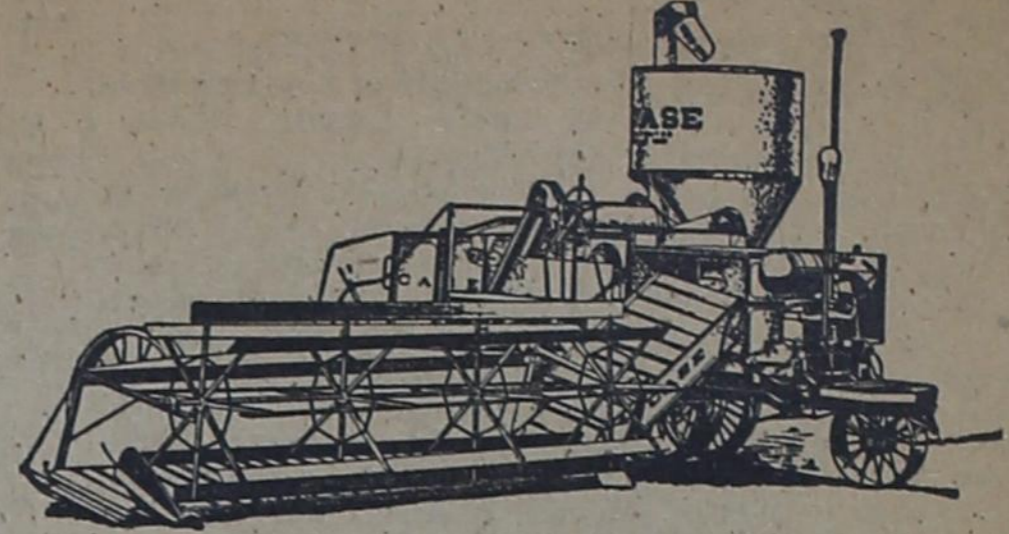

ORDINANCE NO. 15

CAPTION: SIDEWALKS AND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE BUILDING

of Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, the repairing of Sidewalks, providing the levying of a tax for the building of Sidewalks and creating a penalty for the neglect or refusal to repair Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, by virtue of the terms and provisions of the Act passed at the First Called Session of the Fortieth Legislature of the State of Texas, and known as Chapter 106 of the Acts of said Session. BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Dimmitt, Texas:

Section 1. That all Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt that may be built by any resolution of the City Commissioners shall be constructed under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of the Street Committee, or Street Commissioner; and all Sidewalks hereafter constructed shall be built in strict conformity to grade for Sidewalks established by the City.

Section 2. That all sidewalks shall be made by or at the expense of the owners or occupants of the premises fronting thereon, and shall be built within fifteen days after publication of notice in the official newspaper of the City as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. That unless a different width be specified in the resolution ordering the construction, all Sidewalks shall be sixteen feet wide in the business district, and four feet wide in the residential district.

Section 4. That all Sidewalks hereafter constructed shall have a uniform slope of one-fourth (1/4) inch per foot from the building or front line of the lots, in front of which same are built to the outer edge thereof.

Section 5. That Sidewalks must be built of concrete, to be made in the proportion of one part cement to two parts sand and four parts gravel for base course, top dressing to be made of one part cement to two parts sand, and one course work shall be made of one part cement to five parts sand and gravel.

Section 6. That the City Commission by Resolution may at any time, order the building of Sidewalks on any square, street or alley of the City. Such Resolution shall prescribe the street or place along which same shall be built, and may be in the following form:

BE IT RESOLVED by the

City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, that the owners or occupants of all the property fronting the North, South, East or West side of (name the street from to in said City) be and they are hereby ordered to construct a concrete Sidewalk in front of said property in conformity to Sections Three, Four and Five of this Ordinance.

Section 7. That on the passage of an order for the building or repairing of any Sidewalks, the City Secretary shall cause a notice thereof to be published for fifteen (15) days in the official newspaper of the City, which notice shall be dated and signed by the Secretary and shall specify the day on or before which said sidewalks shall be constructed by the owner or occupant, and may be in form as follows:

NOTICE is hereby given that the City Commission has ordered Sidewalks to be constructed as follows: On etc. (giving the description contained in the Resolution offering the same) now unless the same shall be constructed in the manner required by Ordinance relative to Sidewalks on or before the day of next, the same will be built and paid for by the City and the expense assessed on the premises chargeable therewith.

Section 8. That the City Secretary will make out and cause to be served upon the owner or occupant of such real estate when known and can be found, a written or printed notice thereof, dated and signed by himself, and formed substantially as follows:

"Mr. (name the party) Sir: You are hereby notified that the City of Dimmitt has ordered a Sidewalk to be constructed in front of Lot No., Block No., on Street, in the original town (or any addition thereto, specify the addition). Now unless you shall construct the same to the satisfaction of the street Committee or Street Commissioner in the manner required by Ordinance, on or before the day of (day and month mentioned in published notice) the same will be built by the City and the expenses assessed against the premises."

Section 9. The notice required by the preceding section shall be served by delivering a copy thereof to such owner or occupant in person, or by registered letter, or by leaving the same at the residence or place of business of such owner or occupant. Such notice may also be served upon any known agent of the parties aforesaid. The person serving such notice, shall endorse thereon his return, showing when and how and on whom the same has been served.

Section 10. That should the owner or occupant of any real estate in front of which any Sidewalk has been ordered to be built, fail or refuse to construct the same within the time mentioned in the notice aforesaid, to the satisfaction of the Street Committee or Street Commissioner, it shall be the duty of said Committee, or Street Commissioner to report the same to the City Commission; said report shall be in writing and shall give a description of the lot or other premises, also the name of the owner or occupant on whom notice has been served and the manner of service, or if any owner be unknown or cannot be found, such report shall state opposite the lot:

"Owner unknown" or "Cannot be found"
as the case may be. The said Committee or Commissioner shall also procure and file with such report a copy of the Sidewalk Notice published in the newspaper doing the city publishing with an affidavit of the publisher, of its due publication.

Section 11. That on receiving such report, the City Commission may order the Street Committee or Street Commissioner to construct the Sidewalk mentioned therein which order may be in the following form:

Whereas, the owner of the following described real estate to-wit: Lot Block original Town of Dimmitt, Texas, (or any addition as the case may be) has failed after due notice to construct a Sidewalk thereon in pursuance to an order passed the day of (giving date

of Resolution ordering the same). It is therefore, ordered that the Street Committee or Street Commissioner, construct the same forthwith in conformity with the original order and report the expenses for assessment.

Section 12. That an accurate account shall be kept by the Street Committee or Street Commissioner of the cost of every Sidewalk constructed by order of the City Commission and they shall report the same in writing as soon as practicable in the following form:

"Your Street Committee, or Street Commissioner begs time to report that in compliance with an order of the City Commission passed on day of 19.... (giving date of order) they have constructed a Sidewalk on the premises herein after described, at an expense set opposite thereto, to-wit: Lot Block of the original town (or addition as the case may be) of Dimmitt, \$..... to be signed by the Chairman or other member of said Committee or Commissioner and addressed to the City Commission."

Section 13. That the City Commission on receiving the report required by the preceding section by a Resolution passed by a vote of the majority number, assess the expenses on the real estate described therein, which Resolution may be substantially in the following form:

"BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, that the sum of money set opposite the following lot, to-wit: Lot Block original Town of Dimmitt, \$..... be and the same is hereby assessed thereon to defray the expenses of a Sidewalk constructed and paid for by the City, in pursuance of an order passed on the day of 10....."

Section 14. That it shall be the duty of the City Secretary as soon as practicable after the passage thereof to furnish the assessor and collector a certified copy of the Resolution provided for in the preceding section, signed by himself and attached by himself with the seal of the corporation attached thereto, which certified copy, as aforesaid shall be full and sufficient authority for the assessor and collector to remise and collect the assessment therein specified.

Section 15. That upon receiving such certified copy of said assessor and collector to cause to be published for ten days in the official newspaper of the City, a notice of such assessment as made by the City Commission and demanding the same within thirty days after the date thereof. Said notice shall be dated and signed by the assessor and collector and may be in the following form:

"Notice is hereby given that the sum of money set opposite to the following lot to-wit: Lot Block original Town of Dimmitt, has been assessed thereon by the City Commission for the cost of a Sidewalk constructed and paid for by the City and payment of said amount is hereby demanded within thirty days from date hereof."

Section 16. That should the owner of any real estate so assessed fail or refuse to pay the amount of such assessment or any portion thereof, within thirty days after the date of the first publication of the notice prescribed in the preceding Section, the assessor and collector shall by virtue of his certified copy of the Resolution signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Secretary under the seal of the corporation as provided in Section 14, file suit in the Corporate name in any Court having jurisdiction, levy and sell such delinquent premises of real estate, whether belonging to resident or non-resident, for the payment of the assessment due thereon together with the costs of sale accruing thereon, according to the order of said Court.

Section 17. That the owner of real estate sold for the payment of any assessment for the construction of Sidewalks or his heirs, assigns or legal representatives shall have the power to re-deed the same at any time within two years from date of sale by paying to the purchaser

double the amount paid by the purchaser.

Section 18. That should the assessor and collector fail to make the sale of any real estate for want of a purchaser he shall bid the same off to the City for the amount of the assessments due and costs accruing thereon and execute and deliver to the City a deed to same in the same manner provided for to individuals for real estate sold. Said deed shall be recorded in the County Clerk's office and shall vest a good and absolute title in the City to said land, if not redeemed as herein provided. The owner of such real estate may redeem the same at any time within two years from date by paying the assessor and collector double the amount of money paid by the City and upon payment being made by the owner or his agent, the assessor and collector shall procure from the City Secretary and deliver to such party a quit claim deed to such property which deed shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary under seal of the City.

Section 19. That whenever the assessor and collector shall have made sale of any real estate under this Ordinance, it shall be his duty to make return of said sale to the City Commission stating in the return, the land sold, the name of the owner, if known, and if unknown state the fact, the time of sale, the amount for which said sale was made, together with the name of purchaser which return shall be entered of record on the minutes of the proceeding of the Commission.

Section 20. That the assessor and collector on final settlement of his assessments with the City Commission shall be entitled to a credit for the amount of all the assessments for the construction of Sidewalks due the City, for which the lands and lots were bid off to the City, and in all cases where the property if levied on and sold for assessments, for Sidewalks, he shall receive the same compensation that is allowed by Ordinance for making a levy and sale for the taxes.

Section 21. That nothing contained in this Ordinance shall be construed to deprive the City of any rights, power or authority which it may have, to collect said assessments for the construction of Sidewalks, or the value of work and labor done and material furnished in constructing Sidewalks by instituting suit in the Corporate name in an Court having jurisdiction thereof.

Section 22. That no assessment for Sidewalks as herein contemplated, shall be deemed to be invalid in any case where the name shall be made in conformity with law although the same not be in conformity with the preceding and forms herein prescribed.

Section 23. That any person being the owner of any premises in front of which any Sidewalk may be broken or otherwise out of repair who shall fail or refuse to repair such Sidewalk within the time required by the notice prescribed in Section 7 shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding one hundred dollars and each day that such person fails or refuses shall be deemed a separate offense. It shall also be unlawful, with penalties as prescribed above, in this Section, to damage any Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, by the driving of heavy vehicles over same, or damaging them in any other manner, to require repair.

Section 24. The fact that the City of Dimmitt is without adequate Sidewalks, that for the immediate preservation of the public health, and safety, said City creates hereby an emergency, which requires that the rule requiring Ordinances to be read at more than one meeting, be suspended and that this Ordinance take effect immediately after its passage, and it is so ordered.
