The boats went far inside and were exposed to the Russian fire. One sailor and one petty officer were killed, but the boats escaped dam-

AUSTIN, Texas, June 9.-The general election law passed by the last legislature has been under discussion for nearly one year and nearly every phase of it commented on, but one of its provisions seems to have been overlooked.

Section 94 provides the vote in all primary election shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed at the top thereof the name of the party and under it the names of all the candidates, those for each office being arranged in alphabetical order beneath the title of the office

for which they are candidates. The special provision in this section to which attention is called is that the names of all the candidates must be printed in alphabetical order. GENERAL BELL INVADES A COUNTY WHICH IS NOT UNDER MARTIAL LAW AND IS ATTACKED

The commissioner of the general land OFFICE OF THE VICTOR RECORD IS WRECKED AND MANY UNION MEN HAVE BEEN ARRESTED

VICTOR, Colo., June 9.- A squad of mounted infantry left today in pursuit of fifty-five union miners said to be encamped on Beaver creek. The troops have orders to shoot the men when found if they resist arrest.

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., June 9.-After a night of intense excitement and a battle between the troops and strikers at Dunnville, a small skirmish on Big Bull Hill and the wrecking of the Victor Record office, matters have quieted down and it is generally believed the worst is

A question may arise at Dunnville between the authorities, as it was fought in Fremont county, and John Carley, who was killed, was brought to Teller county. Dunnville, fourteen miles south of Victor, a short distance beyond the border of Teller county, which alone has been decided by the governor to be in a state of insurrection and rebellion.
