Local Frigidaire Dealer Attends Company Meet

The extensive new product lines include: Four type refrigerators with capacities ranging from four to 17 cubic feet; electric ranges in 40, 30 and 21-inch sizes, home laundry equipment featuring an automatic electric clothes washer, dryer and ironer; food freezers, electric water heaters, an electric dehumidifier for home or business use and home air conditioning units. Distinctive new Raymond Loewy styling and advance engineering design have been incorporated into Frigidaire's extensive line of household refrigerators as well as the ranges and other appliances.

Influenza Is Cold Weather Ailment

Austin, Tex.—Cold weather and influenza go hand in hand, so the proverbial "ounce of prevention" is especially timely. Influenza has many of the signs and symptoms of a common cold, and may develop from a cold. The popular nickname for the disease is "flu", according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The common symptoms of "flu" are well known. Fever at the onset, cough, and pains in the head, back and limbs have been experienced by many. This disease, which spreads rapidly, has a crippling effect on the community. Much time is lost from school and work; therefore, its control is of economic and social as well as medical importance.

Since permanent immunity is not developed as the result of an attack of the disease, these epidemics continue to appear. Everyone is susceptible. The fact that this disease is highly contagious makes isolation and personal cleanliness of utmost importance in its prevention and control.

These suggestions should help: Keep up bodily resistance by eating well balanced meals and getting regular and adequate sleep; practice cleanliness; avoid using cups, glasses, dishes, or towels that have been used by anyone else, including family members. A physician should be called

when "flu" symptoms appear. The sick person should be isolated from others with the exception of the person acting as nurse. The "flu" victim should go to bed and stay there until his physicians says he can return to usual activity.

Prevent influenza if you can, but if you do get it, take care of yourself and protect others from your germs.

Buy Roses With Care

College Station, Feb. 26 The unusual weather, very dry and the early freeze, that has existed in Texas for many weeks has been

very hard on roses. According to Sadie Hatfield, extension specialist in homestead improvement of Texas A. & M. College, roses have been killed or badly damaged in many areas of the state, and replanting will be necessary.

She offers the following suggestions to those who will be purchasing rose plants. First, she says, select the grade 1 plants. These plants will have at least three strong canes or branches, 18 inches long, growing from the main crown of the plant starting at the ground level. Grade 1½ plants are her second choice and they should have at least two strong canes about 14 inches long starting at the ground level. Plants of these two grades will bloom more and fewer will die from transplanting for in addition

to the strong top growth, they also have strong root systems.

She says the root systems and underground stems should be checked on all plants for dark rough galls. Also look for nematode knots on the small roots. If diseased roses are planted, they'll prove very unsatisfactory and will foul up the soil in your garden.

Next she says to examine the tops and roots of the plants to see whether or not they have been allowed to dry out. If the stems are a dull green color and show shriveling, avoid them. If not already dead, they may be stunted.

Then check on the age of the plants. She says it is sometimes possible to buy one year old budded roses and generally they are satisfactory. It is well to know

whether the roses are on their own roots. Many hardy varieties such as Cecille Brunner or Radiance roses thrive on their own roots, but generally, budded roses give better results. Then last but not least, she says, buy from a reliable nurseryman, one that you know.

The best plants will not thrive if they are not handled properly. She says they should be planted in well-drained, moderately fertile soil. They should be protected from strong winds but should be in the sunshine most of the day. Roses will not thrive in soils that are high in lime, in tight soils which do not drain well nor in poor white sand.

Set the plants the same depth they were growing in the nursery and avoid planting in old rose

beds. Planting in soil that has been in grass for at least five years is a measure of protection from diseases, she says. And don't plant them where they must compete with shrubs and trees for plant food and moisture.

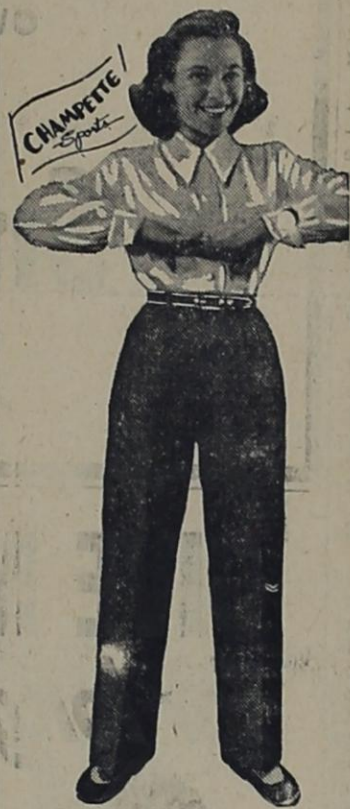

Health Talks . . .

Hemorrhage is commonly considered to stand for any excessive bleeding but actually means any escape, excessive or slight, of the blood from the tube-like vessels it flows in. It may always be considered a sign that something isn't going right; how wrong things are will depend upon the source of the bleeding to a large extent.

A nosebleed, for instance, may be a very slight affair resulting from the rupture of those small varicose veins in the lower front part of the nose. It may come from injuries to the nose such as squeezing the nose too hard or picking the nose or it may originate from the inside as a result of high blood pressure.

A small piece of cotton or gauze placed in the nose will usually stop the bleeding unless the source is higher up and back in the nose, in which case it may be

necessary for the doctor to pack the whole nasal cavity to stop the flow before he can discover the source.

The spitting of blood is usually a sign of irregularity in the respiratory tract, any place from the mouth on down to the lungs. Blood spit out will nearly always be accompanied by sputum which may be only slightly tinged or may be a decided frothy pink. Swallowing hard on rough objects which may scrape the wet lining of the respiratory tract or cause inflammation by their lodging in the tract may lead to blood-tinged spit. Fractured ribs or injuries to the chest may cause a puncture of some of those blood vessels lining the respiratory tract and bring blood to the mouth.

High blood pressure and hardening of the arteries may be general diseases which would cause the spitting of blood. Tuberculosis is notorious for the amount of blood spit out with coughing. Any swelling or sores that develop along the respiratory tract, whether single instances or as a result of certain diseases, may lead to this sign of disorder.

The vomiting of blood is a different matter. The source of bloody vomit is considered to lie within the digestive tract, usually in the upper part. Sometimes the vomiting of blood is not distinctly red and bloody, it may appear more like coffee grounds in the material brought up.

Blood from the bowels is also considered an intestinal tract irregularity. Hemorrhoids or tears in the wall of the rectum will usually account for bright red blood in the stools whereas darker blood is generally considered to arise from disorders in the large intestines. Black, sticky stools are frequently a sign of intestinal hemorrhage; black stools may result from medicines containing iron or bismuth but are generally not sticky like the black stools of hemorrhage.

Peptic ulcer is the most common cause of intestinal hemorrhage, either bloody vomiting or bloody stools. There are many other possible causes of this disorder, though, with cancer as one possibility, so the presence of discharge not only from the intestines, but from any other part of the body should be considered a signal deserving medical attention. One or an occasional nosebleed that resists staunching the flow should serve as a warning.

The body has wonderful defenses to stop the flow of blood to one particular spot, build back the amount of blood lost, and keep the blood circulating to other places that are not endangered. But these defenses can be over-worked by the constant abnormal loss of blood and the organs that function in the defense set-up may require outside help. If no help arrives, the sudden rapid loss of blood may cause death. If the loss is slow over a period of time and no help is given those defenses, it may lead to that state

known as secondary shock. Fainting is the most common phase of shock. Some people actually faint at the sight of blood, of course; others faint from the loss of blood.

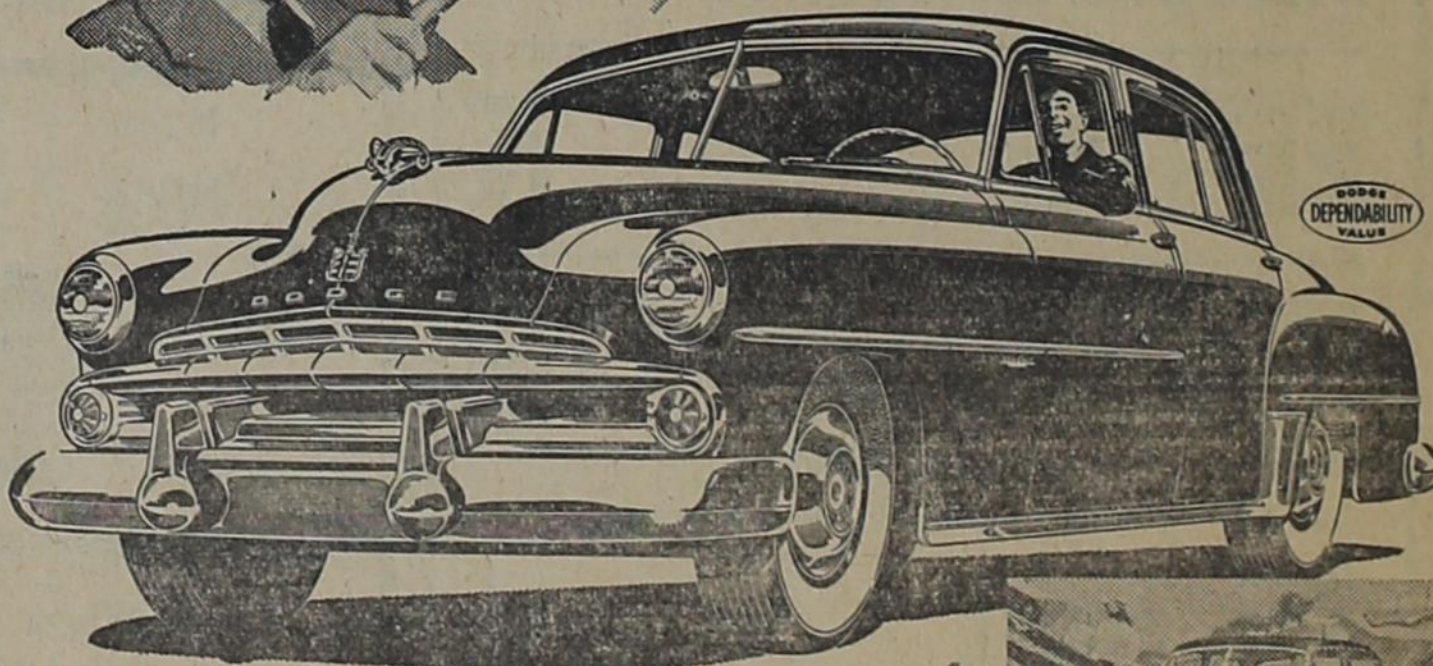

Washington Newsletter

By Congressman Walter Rogers
 THE STATEMENT OF JOSEPH STALIN:
 The great significance of the recent statement of Joseph Stalin

does not lie in what Joe said or what he left unsaid, but in the fact that he broke a silence of approximately two years duration. It is well known that under the communistic theory "Silent Joe" is not supposed to say anything publicly unless it is for the purpose of settling inner-party differences which are of such great concern as to require a definite announcement of policy by Uncle Joe himself. Therefore his state-

ment could well indicate that there are repercussions within the higher echelons of the Party in Russia as to the method of handling the great masses in Russian proper and the satellite nations. There is no doubt but that definite trouble has been encountered in the satellite countries that demanded some immediate and extreme measures. So it became necessary for Uncle Joe to speak his piece and to definitely underwrite the policy that the "big lie" propaganda methods were still number one with the Reds. More about this later.

GRAIN SORGHUMS: The loan maturity date of grain-sorghums could cost many farmers of the 18th District and 19th District lots of money. Congressman George Mahon and myself have conferred on several occasions with the Commodity Credit Corporation hoping to secure a sixty-day extension of the loan maturity date and have enlisted the aid of numerous other Texas congressmen in this fight. There are several excellent arguments against the extension of this maturity date, but we have kept up the fight and expect to meet with Commodity Credit officials sometime within the next few days for the purpose of trying to work this matter out to the benefit of the Panhandle farmers. I have just talked to Mr. Underhill of the department and expect to have a conference with Mr. Kruse and Congressman Mahon within the next few hours.

WHEAT TO INDIA: There is a sharp division in Congress on what should be done on the Indian situation. The grain being considered is not all wheat. The request has been for food grains, which of course includes grain sorghums. The Indian grind this and make bread. Perhaps we could do a little research on this problem and help our own grain sorghum market. There are many points to consider in the proposed food grain shipments to India. Would appreciate the thoughts of you people in the Panhandle concerning this. Many letters have already come in.

RAW COTTON CEILINGS: We are trying to do away with the ceilings on raw cotton. I placed in the Congressional Record a most pertinent resolution adopted by the State Legislature of Texas concerning this situation.

VISITORS: We enjoyed visits from the following Panhandle folks this week: H. A. Wallace, Glen Osborn and W. V. Swinburn, from Tullia; Worth H. Nicholl, Charles M. Rogers and R. A. Selby, from Amarillo; Curtis A. Cryer and Ernest Kelly from Borger; Elmer J. Moore from Shamrock; J. L. Russell from Canyon; H. F. Railsback from Dalhart; C. R. Zevely and Huelyn Laycock from Pampa; and Lee Johnson from Phillips.

SIX DAYS A WEEK: Letters have been pouring in from all over the nation concerning my statement that Federal departments should stay open six days a week. Many of these are most abusive; many highly complimentary. The abusive ones did not come from the 18th District, but mostly from large cities and from Washington, D. C.

TEMPO: The tempo is increasing. Look for lots of news in the next few months, especially on the international situation.

Increase Noted In Highway Truck Law Violations

AUSTIN—More than 17,800 truck arrests were made on Texas Highways for overloading and other violations for the year ending August 31, 1950, according to a recent report released by Kent Odum, Chief of the License and Weights Division of the Department of Public Safety.

8,447 cases were filed in Justice Courts throughout the State, charging the operation of vehicles with loads in excess of the 48,000 pound gross load limit and over 18,000 pounds of weight on each truck axle; 3,801 cases charging operation in excess of registered gross weight of the truck and 5,582 cases were filed for miscellaneous offenses, such as overlength, overwidth, driving while intoxicated and operating without permits.

According to the report, nine trucking companies were arrested more than 100 times last year. One Dallas firm with 265 arrests, was fined over \$5,000 for hauling more than a million pounds excessive weight.

The License and Weights Division of the Department of Public Safety is composed of only 33 inspectors, who must work in pairs patrolling the 36,840 miles of the Texas Highway System. During the period covered by Chief Odum's report, these guardians of the State roads checked more than 72,000 trucks and found one out of every four were violating the law.

The January monthly report just released by the Public Safety Department indicates an increase in highway truck law violations. It shows a total of 2,051 arrests.

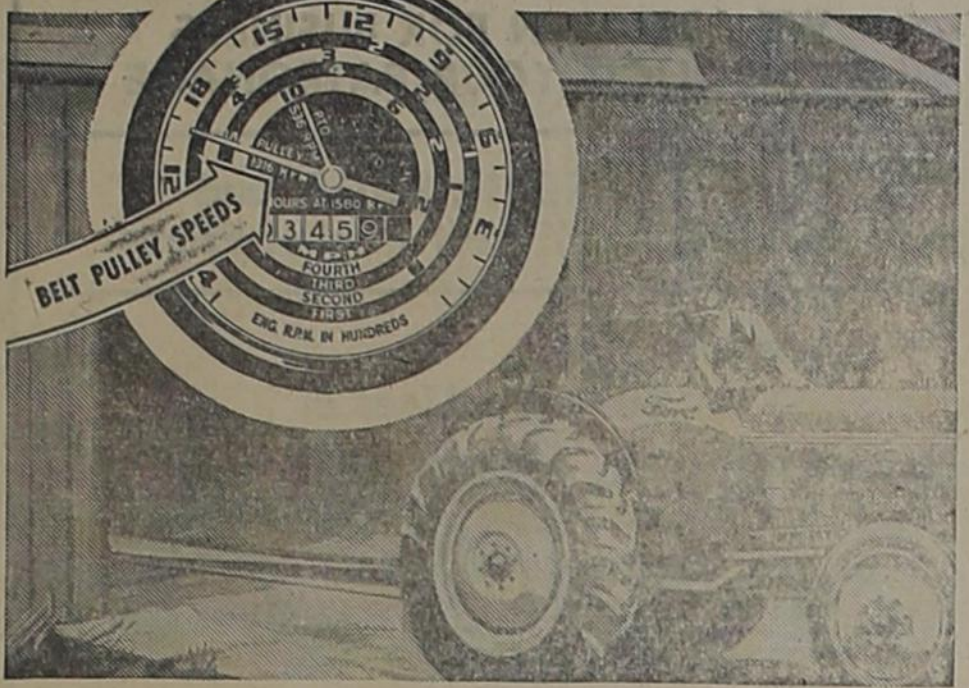
Many states have found the only effective way to prevent these constant violations of overloading trucks on State and County roads, is by requiring the overloaded trucks to reduce the excessive weight to the legal limits before proceeding over the roads.

Texas has no such unloading on the spot law. A bill is now pending in the Senate, known as H. B. 11, designed to stop the practice of overloaded trucks continuing on their way after paying a small

Justice Court fine. The proposal would also give authority to the Department of Public Safety, the County Sheriff or his deputy to make such arrests.

The first time the Bobbies ever appeared in a state tournament, was in 1930, when they got into the finals and were beaten in the last two minutes by Athens, 45-41. This team was made up of Ona Fay Smith, Frankie Senters, Evon Craiger, Littlebell Harp, Effie Elder, and Ruth Waggoner (now Mrs. J. R. Rothwell).

The Bobbies made the trip again in 1931 and copped the coveted crown by defeating Mingus in the finals, 30-26. Members of the team were Ona Fay Smith, Zonelle Brooks, Gertrude Wesson, Elaine Dyer, Ruth Waggoner, and Frankie Senters. Three of these girls, Ona Fay, Zonelle, and Frankie, were placed on the Texas All-star team of 1931.

The Bobbies repeated the act of winning state honors in 1932 breezed through the tourney and defeated Celeste 42-34 in the finals. This team was composed of Frankie Senters, who again placed on the all-state team; Ona Fay Smith, another all-starter; Elaine Dyer, who was Dimmitt's third all-state player that year

(and who, incidentally, is the sister of Jack Dyer); Irene and Ruth Waggoner; and Ozetta Hawkins (now Mrs. Earl Hembree).

A period of 18 years elapsed before a Dimmitt Bobbie team went to the state tournament again. They took it for the third time by defeating Seagoville, the defending state champs, in the finals, 46-40. This team consisted of Mona Simmons, Pat Tate, Lometa Odom (who made all-state), Maurine Smithson (another all-stater), Lanelle Walthall, and Phyllis Behrends (now Mrs. Dale Allen).

This year the Bobbies make their fifth trip to the state playoffs, with a team whose starters are Lometa Odom, Johnny Godfrey, Mary Nelson, Maurine Smithson, Decima Denris, and Mitzi Wilson. Good luck, girls!

THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW whether the Defendant can be forced to testify as a witness in his trial?

The Defendant in a criminal case does not have to take the witness stand, if he does not want to. This is entirely up to him and his attorney. He may testify if he desires to do so. Having become a witness he may be cross-examined by the prosecuting attorney. If the Defendant does not take the witness stand, the prosecuting attorney has no way of making him do so, and thus has no way of asking questions of the Defendant.

Should the Defendant not testify, this fact may not be commented upon by the prosecuting attorney, either directly or indirectly. Should the prosecuting attorney make any reference whatsoever to the failure of the Defendant to testify, the prosecuting attorney would thereby commit an error, which would cause the trial court or appellate court to grant to the Defendant a new trial.

and was crushed as it overturned. His shattered watch was stopped at 12:41.
Minor had left Edmonson only a few minutes before after unloading a quantity of lumber he had delivered for use in construction of an elevator.
The pavement was slippery from heavy mist. A few minutes after the fatal accident occurred a pickup overturned a half mile west of the site of the car-truck collision.

Mr. Ewers was a Castro County pioneer and one of Dimmitt's first businessmen. He had been a resident of the county for the past 37 years, and had engaged in many pursuits since that time. His first business venture was in 1923 when he established Bill's Cafe, Dimmitt's first eating establishment. The cafe was located next to the postoffice on what was then the main street of Dimmitt. Previous to opening the cafe Mr. Ewers had served as Star Route mail carrier between Hart and Kress, the route was established in 1913 and he was the first carrier. The cafe was eventually sold and Mr. Ewers bought the Tourist Hotel in North Dimmitt which he operated for a number of years before selling it to Att Webb. The hotel was later razed by fire. In later years Mr. Ewers engaged in ranching in Castro county, cattle buying, and had recently engaged in the real estate business. He was a native of Erath county.
Funeral services were conducted from the Hart high school auditorium Sunday afternoon with Rev. E. J. Keith, pastor of the

Hart Baptist Church, officiating. Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview was in charge of arrangements. Interment was made in the Hart cemetery.

Active pallbearers were Cecil Hamm, Dean Sanders, Stewart Newsom, Tory Smitherman, Claud Cox, and Bobby Edd Brooks.
Mr. Ewers is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Monroe Phillips of Hart and a brother, Mack Ewers of Stephenville, and six grandchildren: Mrs. Dan Wakefield of Tulla, Bill Phillips of Quail, Dean, Jerry, Jane and Monte Phillips of Hart.

The first unit in the plant, a 50,000 kilowatt turbo-generator, is scheduled to go "on the line" in the Spring of 1952.


