The first step taken by the men to strengthen their position occurred last night, when a meeting of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers of America was held at the Labor Temple. The attendance at this meeting was over 400 and applications for membership were received from 200 men, 112 of whom were accepted. Defections are also being claimed among the laborers, who have emained at work, fifty of whom the union men say were induced to quit and rdingly did not return to work this norning. 

TWO BOYS DROWN

Money on call-11/2 per cent.

While Bathing Near the Old Water Plant They Lose Their Lives

Herman Green, 13 years old, and Alf Fuller, aged 18 years, both negroes, lost their lives about 6 o'clock last evening by drowning at a point near the old water

works plant. The boys were bathing and became entangled in a rope that hangs from a tree into the water.

Green was the first to become tangled in the rope. His companion went to his rescue and was caught by the drowning lad and the two sank beneath the water. Jesse Brazzil, a white boy, witnessed the drowning and attempted to attract the attention of some one, but no one responded and he was afraid to risk his own life to aid in rescuing the two drowning boys by himself.

Both drowned. The bodies of the two boys were recovered soon after the drowning, clasped tightly in each others embrace. Charles Rowland, justice of the peace, began a coroner's inquest, which ended this morning. The finding was that the boys lost their lives by drowning. Justice of Peace Rowland this morning took evidence in the Alfonzo Fuller and Herman Green drowning case, eJsse Brazzil, a 9-year-old boy, testified thet he witnessed the drowning, which occurred about 5:30 last evening. Young

Brazzil said that he saw Herman Green drown; that he attempted to catch the end of a rope hanging from the limb of a tree; that when Alfonzo Fuller saw Green was in trouble he jumped in to save him. Both went down three times. Brazzil said he believed the rope was placed on the tree by the "Dirty Dozen Lulu Green, mother of Herman Green, one of the drowned boys, testified that Herman was 9 years old in October last;

the Greens came here from Calvert four months ago. Mrs. Green stated she had been told that a little white boy had pushed Herman into the river. Elmer Green, a brother of Herman, said hat Herman was sitting on the bank when he was pushed into the river. Her-

man could not swim. Justice Rowland will further investigate the charge made by the brother of the drowned boy.



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



slogan, "I am a man without a party, a free, untrammeled soul," was coined by the mayer and has since been used with telling effect among his constituents. In 1901 and 1903, deserted by the men who had helped elect him, because he did not give them political preferences, Jones made his campaign practically unassisted. He employed one or two men to rent halls and scatter his literature, while with the Golden Rule band he sang his way into the hearts and votes of the people. His defeat of General McMaken in 1901 was the culmination of his triumph. for McMaken had never been defeated for office in city or county and was the strongest man that could be brought against Jones.

Not rewarding his friends was peculiarity of this Golden Rule mayor, and the men who worked hardest for him in the campaigns were the men he turned down for office. Frequently he gave preference to the very men who were known to be against him, thus applying the maxim that made him famous. Single-handed he went into the council and defeated measure after measure of the machine. He fought every attempt to give away valuable franchises and was generally successful. His masterful handling of the men arrayed against him has always characterized his public life.

Under him as mayor, Toledo has be come known as a "wide open" city. Theaters are allowed to give Sunday performances, Sunday baseball thrives, and it is charged that gambling and saloonists are unchecked.

Jones never defended his position, but maintained that the theaters were places where the people were educated along broad lines, that Sunday baseball was not harmful, that it was useless to close the gambling houses, for men would gamble anyhow until they reached that point where they knew better, and that if you refuse a man the right to get a glass of beer in the place he was used to getting it he would get it in some other way.


