





The expectations of the railroads that the September business from Texas to the World's Fair would be very much augmented over the past two months are not being realized, and as a result there is much disappointment being expressed by various lines.

Traveling Passenger Agent Kilgore of the Pennsylvania lines, headquarters at San Antonio, is in Fort Worth today, and states that the anticipated big passenger business out of Texas for this month is not meeting the expectations of passenger officials, and it is his candid opinion that even October, especially the first part of that month. will prove to be no better.

He says that this condition of affairs is due to the fact that the farmers of Texas are too busy devising means whereby they may be able to save their cotton crop, and as a result men, women and children, both white and black, are in the cotton fields all over the state, picking the staple, and still there is a pressing need for more pickers who are not to be

In Central and South Texas the section men are leaving their jobs and making for the cotton fields, where they can easily earn in excess of section wages-\$1.15 per day. From 60 to 75 cents per hundred is being paid pickers. Even at these prices there is an alarming scarcity of pickers all over the state, and it is predicted that much cotton will be lost because of the shortage of labor. In many parts of the state Mexicans have been mported from the republic, but still planters are unable to secure as many pickers as they need.

Mr. Kilgore states that in two days the rainfall at San Antonio was over six inches. There has been an excess of rain in that part of the state during the past





While this statute was not expressly repealed by the Twenty-eighth legislature, yet section 2, chapter of the acts passed

by this body provides: "Any person who shall enter upon the inclosed land of another without the consent of the owner, proprietor or agent with firearms, or therein catch or take any fish from any pond, lake, tank or stream, or in any other manner depredate upon the same shall be punished by fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100; provided further, that this act shall not apply to inclosures including 2,000 acres or more in one inclosure."

This act was approved April 2, 1903. This statute has not been construed by the higher courts, nor has the attorney general's department given an opinion on it, but some able attorneys have expressed the opinion that it repeals the statute of 1895 by implication and that it is not now necessary for the owners of inclosures of 2,000 acres and less to even nail boards with the word "Posted" on their premises, and that persons who hunt or fish on inclosed lands must obtain permission from the owner or agent charge or else he lays himself liable to prosecution and upon conviction the payment of a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

Traction Company Will Spend Merchants Are Meeting in the Twenty-five Thousand Dollars-New Section of City Will Be Opened Up

About \$25,000 will be spent by the Northern Texas Traction Company in the laying of the new tracks in North Fort Worth, the franchise for which was granted to the company at a meeting of them to attend the Friday afternoon

Tuesday night. General Manager F. M. Haines of the Northern Texas Traction Company stated yesterday that work would begin on the new line within thirty days and would be completed as rapidly as possible. The entire line, according to Mr. Haines, will be finished in ninety days after work is

About two miles of track in all will be laid. Track for the Twenty-third street line will commence at the second street north of the street leading from Main street to the packing plants. The line will run about four or more blocks east on the policy of the company. Twenty-third street to the Fort Worth Belt Railway tracks on what is known as Packers avenue. The street railway track vill then extend for about two blocks orth on Packers avenue to a point very

early opposite the two packing houses. A new section of North Fort Worth will e opened up as a result of the Twentieth street line. This line will be about threefourths of a mile long. The line will intersect Main street line at that street that intersects with North Main street, where the bend occurs, a short distance above the Marine school house. The line will run due west on this street for about four blocks, then turn off at an angle and take a southeasterly direction down a new street, known as Sixteenth for about eight blocks, to an avenue not yet opened, and known as Homan avenue. From this street the line will extend for about two blocks south to Fourteenth street, which lies very nearly opposite Summit avenue


