FOUND DEAD IN OWN AUTO WED.

C. D. SPENCER DIES FOLLOWING SELF INFLICTED GUN WOUNDS WEDNESDAY

C. D. Spencer, 54-year old farmer of the Jumbo community died late Wednesday afternoon from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. His family is at a loss to understand what caused the despondency which led to the fatal act.

About 6 o'clock Wednesday afternoon Spencer drove to the neighboring home of Horace Baird and borrowed a .38 calibre pistol and drove away. He was found by members of the Baird family a short time later nearby in his car dead with the pistol clutched in his hand and the fatal wound in his head.

Surviving are four sons, Jack, Bradford, Marvin and Earl and a sister who resides in Wellington.

A note was left to his sons with instructions as to the property and expressing his regrets at his decision.

Mrs. Spencer preceded her husband in death some three years ago.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church at Hereford Friday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

W. P. A. PROJECTS VIGO-TULIA PLAY ARE EXPLAINED HERE SUNDAY

CASTRO COUNTY WPA LABORERS WILL RECEIVE \$252.00 PER YEAR SAYS JONES

More than 5,000 workable persons now on relief will be given jobs under the W. P. A. program in the fifteen counties comprising District 17 of the Works Progress Administration in Texas on a proportionate basis out of a fund of fifty million dollars allocated for the State of Texas by the Federal Government, J. O. Jones, Director of District 17 announced. The money has been appropriated for worthwhile projects in this district. "It means employment, not relief," Mr. Jones said.

"This is not another relief agency," Mr. Jones emphasized. "W. P. A. has been established to replace emergency relief and provide a way to take employable people off the relief rolls and put them to useful work, either on work projects or in private industry in the shortest time possible and at the same time bring about improvements which might otherwise advance slowly.

Questions concerning the procedure for obtaining W. P. A. grants continue to pour into the headquarters here, and many applications for jobs has been received by the office. Heads of the departments have been selected and other people will be called into the service of this office as work expands.

"Project applicants will not find the procedure complex," Mr. Jones said. "After local officials decide what improvements to undertake plans and specifications should be drawn up by engineering officials. These are to be entered upon special forms to be obtained in this office." "If approved here the application would be forwarded to the state office in San Antonio, thence to Washington.

"Money will be allocated by the Washington office for only the amount necessary to complete the project and pay checks will be distributed twice monthly through the Lubbock office. Pay will be upon the basis of a maximum 130 working hour month and a yearly salary of \$252. per man for common labor in Castro County.

A large number of items are eligible for W. P. A. grants. They include farm to market road and street construction; new construction of and repairs on public buildings; soil and water conservation; recreation facilities other than buildings; public owned and operated utility plant construction facilities; professional, technical and clerical projects; and a variety of miscellaneous items.

Persons eligible for employment on projects authorized under the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935, are those registered by the United States Employment Service, who have been certified by the Emergency Relief Administration as having received emergency relief from public funds during May 1935 or who were accepted for relief subsequent to May 1935.

No restrictions have been placed upon the expenditures of money received by the laborer. "This emphasized the fact that the W. P. A. is not another relief agency," Mr. Jones stated. "Works costing less than \$25,000 are included in the W. P. A. field. No projects can be accepted which call for a loan, regardless of the amount. It is possible, however, to include sums larger than \$25,000 provided the conditions of W. P. A.

STATE TAX RATE HAS BEEN CUT

THE STATE TAX RATE HAS BEEN LOWERED 15 CENTS ON \$100. VALUATION

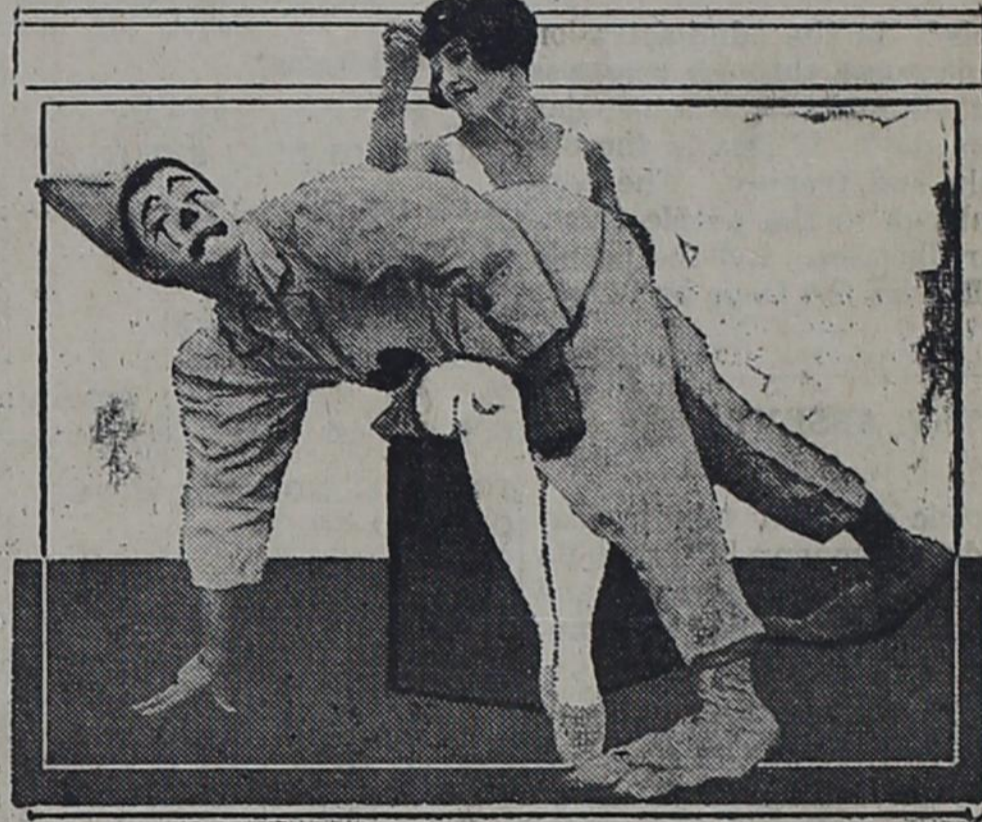
The state tax rate was reduced 15 cents on the \$100 valuation by the state automatic tax board at its meeting Saturday. The reduction was made possible by the accumulation in the school fund, and the reduction was made in this fund.

The rate set for the state was 6 1/2 cents, comprised as follows: state general fund, 35c; state school fund, 20c; Confederate pension, 7c.

The general fund has a deficit of more than seven million dollars, which will increase to nearly 13 millions by next year owing to the three million centennial appropriation, the two million rural aid in addition to interest for the relief fund.

It is entirely probable that a number of local projects will be applied for including repairs on the school building and topping for the city streets.

SEC. WALLACE IN AMARILLO AUG. 5

PANHANDLE FARMERS WILL CROWD AMARILLO AUDITORIUM MONDAY, AUG. 5

Amarillo, Texas.—When Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace comes here, Monday, August 5, it will afford the first opportunity in the Southwest to see and hear a "New Deal" cabinet member.

"Not only agriculture leaders, but also any others interested are invited to greet this distinguished visitor," declared Grover Hill, who is chairman of the general committee making arrangements to entertain Secretary Wallace.

"Agriculture is facing many difficulties and it is important to know what our Secretary has in mind," he continued. "People will want to see and hear the man under whose management they have received wheat and cotton allotment checks, feed and seed loans."

While here for only the one day Secretary Wallace is scheduled to make an address at 3 o'clock at the Municipal Auditorium.

"There will be a tremendous interest throughout the country in this address," said Mr. Hill, "because the Department of Agriculture has become most important in government and its policies affect 40,000,000 persons."

The visiting cabinet member is a real dirt farmer and developed Wallace corn, one of the popular varieties in Iowa. He also operates a dairy, feeding out Panhandle cattle year in his lots.

This true friend of the farmer, the man to whom farmers pin their faith, is coming to Amarillo and the Panhandle on a tour of inspection and as a compliment to Congressman Marvin Jones.

Between the Amarillo congressman and the Secretary of Agriculture a warm friendship has developed.

Congressman Jones was the author of a major portion of the AAA acts, such as the wheat allotment and the cattle program, which saved the livestock industry, and it was under Wallace that all of the triple A activities were developed and directed.

"The AAA is the most far-reaching program ever undertaken by the government for rehabilitation of agricultural interests," Mr. Hill declared.

"The Wallaces have been pioneers, working for the interests of the farmers," continued Mr. Hill. "For three generations the family has published a farm magazine in the corn belt. The present Secretary's father also served as Secretary of Agriculture. And since Henry Wallace became a member of the cabinet he has written three books, devoted to agricultural interests. All of them have been read widely."

Congressman Marvin Jones has advised friends he will make every effort to be in Amarillo when Secretary Wallace is a visitor.

"This visit from a member of the President's cabinet is not just an Amarillo affair, but an event of importance for all of the Panhandle, eastern New Mexico and Oklahoma," observed Mr. Hill.

It is expected that a large group of the Castro County farmers will attend this date and avail themselves of the opportunity to personally acquaint themselves with the man who has been so beneficial in the past months.

Good Neighbors Are A Blessing



Young men throughout Texas eligible for Civilian Conservation Corps enlistment have been advised by State Enrollment Supervisor Neal E. Guy to make themselves known to their county administrators if they are interested in being among the 16,000 to be enrolled by August 3.

Guy advised county administrators of their quotas and asked that they examine their relief rolls for probable enrollees, with the possibility that quotas will be increased when administrators show enough CCC candidates to warrant.

An eligible candidate is any single man between 18 and 28 whose family is on the relief rolls. While administrators were asked to search their rolls for probable enrollees, Guy suggested that the young men themselves notify their administrator if they are eager to enroll in the CCC.

Approximately 16,000 Texans are to be enrolled by August 31, with about 10,000 expected to be sent to out-of-state camps Guy said. Out-of-state assignments are made because Texas camps already have their quotas, while camps in some of the other states have not, he explained.

Enrollment will be made at intervals during the next month, and enrollment instructions have already been issued to the first allotment of 3,224.

Forty-three new camps are being built in Texas, bringing the total in this state to 96. Approximately 30,000 Texans will be in the CCC by August 31.

WHAT IS THE OBJECTIVE?

Neither the President nor Congress seem to be paying the slightest attention to the constitutionality of the legislation that is being passed. Both continue to support and pass bills that are most certain to have no standing when submitted for final court authority.

What is the object of all this? Is the administration seeking to jam unconstitutional measures through congress in the hope that the supreme court will make itself unpopular with the people by throwing them out? If this is the objective, it should be stated openly and frankly. The constitution of the United States belongs to the people themselves. It is the safeguard of our liberties. Let the people decide if a change is necessary. But let the issue be fought openly.

BRAINS PARENTLY ABSENT

The Associated Gas and Electric company admits that it spent \$700,000 to fight the holding company bill, that its records were destroyed through fear of an investigation and Senator Black says there is no way to tell whether the company spent \$700,000 or \$5,000,000.

There is one point, however, that is not clear to us. From the record of utility companies in the past we are prepared for almost anything and it takes a lot to surprise us but as we understand it A. G. E. stockholders have received no dividends for a number of years. Officials admit that \$700,000 would almost pay one year's dividends.

Now, if the officials of the company have been unable to pay dividends to their stockholders, where did they dig up the money for a campaign involving \$700,000? Of course, they readily admit that the consumer will pay the amount in the end . . . and this is no surprise . . . but where did the fund come from?

Another matter deserves the attention of the stockholders of this company. The officials are being paid salaries, we presume, unless they are working for nothing in order to look out for the investments of the widows and orphans, and here they come with a stunt that will do their cause more harm than anything else that could have happened. What are they paid for? Where are the "brains" which money is supposed to get in high positions?

A few years ago the utilities were caught paying fees to professors, subsidizing speakers and writers and suspicion spread that they were trying to poison the public mind. Now, at a time when a fight was being made to prevent legislation, which they say is unjust, we find the record jammed with faked telegrams, spurious signatures, burned records and unexplained expenditures. Regardless of ethics, it seems that there is an absence of brains somewhere in utility circles.
