





Gardner said his ship is a giant flat top with 4½ acres flight deck and a 4,600 man crew, and at full power could steam non-stop a dis-tance of 140,000 miles or more than five times the circumference of the earth. At fast cruising speed, the Enterprise, according to Gardner, could steam 400,000 miles or nearly the distance to the moon and back. By comparison a conventionally powered carrier burning at least 240 tons of fuel a day could main-tain full power for only 8,000 miles or cruising speed for only 8,000 miles.
