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

The requests of the plumbers are contained in seven articles. In their reply this afternoon, the master plumbers will agree to all but the first two articles involving the raise of 50 cents per day in wages and the employment of jobbers.

"Master plumbers shall employ none but union journeymen plumbers and shall pay each at the rate of \$4.50 per day. Eight hours constitutes a days work, to wit: from 8 a. m. to 12 m. and from 1 n. m. to 5 n. m."
