There are in Japan more than two hundred experimental farms operated by the government, where all sorts of scientific experiments are carried on. Our own agricultural department has gathered more valuable pointers from Japan than from any other country. If the lands of the United States were as carefully tilled as the lands of Japan they would support more than five hundred million people. There are a lot of things that we can learn yet from the little Japs. It is their careful, intelligent industry that has made it possible for them to equip, feed and clothe a great army and send it out against the armies of Russia.

The provisions of the proposed law make it a penalty for a violation of any clause of the measure, punishable by a revocation of the license and prevents him from ever securing a license in the future. The license is to be a universal one of \$1,000 per annum. The proposed law also provides that

there can be no gambling or winerooms in connection with the saloon, and minors and women are not permitted to frequent the saloons, which would be deemed an infraction of the law. "People who favor prohibition and

first class saloon keepers are in favor of the measure, and only those who conduct cheap beer saloons, who have no regard for the laws but are after the almighty dollar, oppose it," said Mr. Husted says his organization

does not favor saloons where there is no police protection, and the law he hopes to have passed will make it a violation to sell or even give liquor to a drunk man.

"I am safe in saying that in all of Texas there is not to exceed 200 saloons that are not controlled by the big breweries of the country, and of course they will oppose the measure that is to be introduced," said Mr. Husted. "I have nothing against the breweries, but I have against these men who take the reins in their own hands and make a legitimate business an illigitimate business. WHEN IS A HEN TOO FAT?

A hen is too fat when she is apparently very heavy behind; when she is lazy colored, and Miss Mattie Henderson, col- to have the owner feed her. She can not easily fly, soon becomes tired from exertion when chased, does not lay, though in good health, and is very heavy when held To Mr. and Mrs. William E. Bruner in the hands. I do not state that any one of Fort Worth, a boy; to Mr. and Mrs. F. of the above causes indicates a fat hen. but to observe her in all of them, of course, the surest method is to lift her and the weight will be there. Examination of the rear of the body will also show the fat under the skin by its color. As to what should be the character and quanty of the food required to keep them in a healthy condition, can not be correctly stated, as no two hens are alike, Leghorns and Brahmas (or other large breeds) should not be kept together. If hens are in good condition the best food is chopped clover hay (chopped half an inch in length and scalded). All they will eat in the morning.

Practice taking such care of the chick-; ens that they will not get sick. An ounce of prevention, in this case, is worth a

"pound of cure."
Two parts middlings and one part corn meal makes a good ration for chickens, but don't feed more than they will eat up clean.

While there is time during the summer months provide your chicken house with ventilation shafts so that they will be all ready when cold weather comes. Such work is often put off until the snow flies and then it is rather inconvenient to do enything in the carpenter line outside of the buildings. The result is that the work is neglected. It has been estimated that if all, or

near all, of ouur farmers could be induced to discard scrub fowls and use only pure bred poultry, the increase in value of poultry would be 100 per cent. Lazy hens like lazy men are not money

Some one has said: "Hungry humanity demands eggs and fowls for the table. Fine feather are all right in their place, buut they are not fit to eat. It is food that is wanted, and exhibition fowls don't fanciers, for eggs and table fowls, but to supply it. The market does not look to the farmers."






