To prevent the railroads further filching the people and forcing the payment of freight rates based on fictitious values. the stock and bond law was passed. Un der the operations of this law, the reports show that 'the present outstanding indebtedness of the railroads of this state averaging \$35,596 mile, while the com mission's valuation of them shows the ac and the valuation the companies render their property for taxes averages \$8,483 : It will be seen that through the operation of the stock and bond law the average value of the outstanding indebt edness has been reduced from over \$40,000 a mile to less than \$35,000 a mile, or about \$83,000.000, which has been saved the public during the ten years this law has been in effect-a saving of \$8,000,000
