

Beresford was promoted to a captaincy and in 1884 he was given charge of the naval brigade, which, with Lord Wolseley, made the futile Nile expedition. Beresford was in immediate command of the machine guns at Abu Klea, and his luck was with him there, for he was the only man in charge of the guns who was not killed.

Subsequently Beresford was made a commander of the Order of the Bath. Possibly expecting Lord Roberts and Lord Kitchener, he is more popular with the British people than any other naval or military officer.

He was elected to parliament several times and gained great notoricity through his exposures of frauds and humhugs in Wales viciously and incurred the displeasure of the queen, but he did not discontinue his fight on this account. In 1888 he resigned as lord of the admiralty

In 1898 Beresford went to Chinahome by way of the United States, made several important addresses advocating

It is made peculiar by the fact that the Rockefellers are heavily interested in the United States Steel Corporation.
