THE MARKETS

NORTH FORT WORTH, Nov. 14.—The cattle market today developed a good run, displayed considerable activity and prices ruled steady to strong on everything except calves of which there was an over-supply. Hogs went off 10c to 15c. Receipts in the cattle division up to noon were 157 cars. Others reported with drive-ins bring the total close up to 5,000 head, as against 4,550 last Monday, 2,912 the same Monday in October and 5,616 the corresponding day in 1902. The steer division was well filled, and trading began early on an active demand. Packers were in the market with good orders, and feeders wanted a few strings to round up their lots in the pens. A good string of ten head sold early at \$2.30, the top price. Bulk of sales on feeders from \$2.75 down. Butcher stock made its appearance in large numbers, but the quality was mostly common to medium. Only a few stray cows of quality were observed. The demand was strong from the start, about equally divided between packers and butchers, and trading was active all along the line. With the quality not rating high, prices hung around the steady note with the close of the week. Best sales were at \$2.50, with the bulk between \$1.25 and \$2. No earnest demand was observable. Sales were made steady with last week's close. Calves were in the pens in greater quantity than the demand called for—1,200 head. The trade was accordingly weak and demoralized. About a thousand hogs were in the pens at the opening of the market. Compare these figures with 816 a week ago, 1,788 a month ago and 1,550 the corresponding day a year ago. Northern advices were to the effect that markets there were swamped with hogs, so a cut was proposed. THE BEEF TRUST

The investigation of the beef trust instituted by the bureau of corporations at the instance of Congress practically has been completed. The report has been presented to the president and it is quite likely it will be submitted to congress shortly after the opening of its session in December, although the law confers discretionary powers upon the president as to the publication of the operations of the bureau. It can be said authoritatively that any suggestions that legal action may be taken by the government against the beef trust or against any aggregation of capital as a result of the investigations were at least premature. No decision yet has been reported and none will be reached until the report has been considered thoroughly by the president and his advisers.

VETERANS THANK TEXANS FOR A BIG VOTE

Resolution Expressing Their Gratitude for the Passage of the Constitutional Amendment Are Passed

In the absence of Chaplain J. I. Wright, former Chaplain Pankey opened yesterday's meeting of Lee camp with prayer, following which the minutes of the previous meeting were read by Assistant Adjutant Kirtley.

The committee that had charge of the recent entertainment at the city hall received \$45 had been turned in. One of the committee stated he believed the total would reach \$100.

J. S. Lewis filed a descriptive list showing that he became a member of company F, Thirty-second Alabama regiment, October 5, 1842.

A communication from a firm of attorneys at Washington was read, having reference to an act of congress providing for the Federal government for return to Confederate soldiers payment for horses, side arms and baggage taken from them by Federal troops at and after the surrender, under orders, and in violation of the terms of surrender of the Confederate armies.

Commander Taylor called especial attention to this matter and urged all those who may have claims of the character mentioned against the government to look after the matter without delay.

Former Chaplain Pankey offered the following resolution, which was unanimously passed:

"Whereas, The people of Texas have, by their ballots, amended the constitution of this great state, giving increased pensions to indigent Confederate soldiers and widows; and

"Whereas, By this generous act they have proven their appreciation to the men who were loyal to them in the dark days of the past; therefore

"Resolved, That R. E. Lee camp, U. C. V., return its thanks to the good people of Texas for this increase of pensions to the scarred and needy veterans of the past."

Captain E. B. Paddock, brigadier general, was present and spoke for ten minutes on the importance of every Confederate soldier attending the meetings every Sunday. He said it was a duty the members owe one another for the perpetuation of the order. He said he looked forward to a time when the south will be looked to for men who will be at the head of the government. Referring to the Fifth brigade, Captain Paddock said it would be his aim to make it the strongest in the Texas division, to the end that every veteran may be enrolled and work for the best interests of the brigade.

He said the main issue was the work of assisting comrades, whom he maintained are worthy of any aid that can be extended.

General Adam Johnson was present and addressed the camp and spoke of his book, which he wanted the camp to sell for him, on commission. A committee of five was appointed to examine the book and report to the camp next Sunday. The commander named Comrades McConnell, Goodman, Cummings, Shaw and Massey. The camp then adjourned.

Misses Eubanks, Scott and Robinson were named a committee to arrange a program for next Sunday's meeting.

Commander E. W. Taylor of Lee camp and General Johnson were invited to seats on the platform.

An invitation to a ball by the children's chapter Thanksgiving day from 9 to 12 p. m. was extended the Sons.

DIVORCE IS TO BE THE SUBJECT FOR A MEETING

Chalmers McPherson of Waxahachie Talks of the Proposed Convention in Dallas. Next Monday

A concerted movement has been started in Texas looking to a suppression of the granting by the courts of the various counties so many divorces, and to further the move a meeting has been called to take place at Dallas, Monday, November 21, at 10:30 o'clock in the morning, at which many of the leading preachers in the state will be present.

The details of the meeting are being arranged by Chalmers McPherson of Waxahachie, who is an ardent believer in the fact that there can be a stop to so many divorces in the state, and he is working hard to have devised means to check the current of this evil in Texas, which is becoming alarming.

Touching the matter Mr. McPherson said today: "In Ellis county the present year's record shows as follows: One hundred and seventeen divorce suits for 600 marriages. Among the whites one divorce suit for every ten marriages, and one to three among the colored people. One divorce decree to every thirteen marriages among the whites and one to three and one-thirtieth among the blacks. The record of some other counties will show no improvement upon these conditions.

"The laws of Texas encourage divorce by making the way to secure one so easy. In the great majority of cases there is only one side represented at trials and the testimony of only one side is heard. It would not be a very difficult matter to secure a desired verdict in any case if such conditions surround it as surround the divorce dockets of our different courts.
