OF INTEREST TO THE STOCKMEN

HEAVY NEBRASKA LOSSES LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 16.—Diseases which could have been prevented carried off in round numbers 248,000 head of live stock in Nebraska last year, or enough to have fed the people of the state for at least six months, according to the result of the investigations conducted by State Veterinarian Thomas and the county assessors. The loss was divided as follows: Sheep, 8,000; horses, 12,000; cattle, 47,000; hogs, 161,000. At an average value per head of \$3 for sheep, \$30 for horses, \$30 for cattle and \$5 for hogs, the total loss aggregated \$2,975,000, or nearly three millions of dollars, and it is all due to the carelessness of live stock owners and their neglect to provide properly for the care of their stock during the spring and fall months of the year. Of the 67,000 head of cattle, 26,000 head died from corn stock disease, which could have been prevented by cutting and curing the corn fodder when ripe instead of leaving it stand to be used as pasturage during the winter months. Exposure to the weather in the warm months of the year was one of the principal causes of death. Live stock is susceptible to sudden changes of temperature the same as persons and an animal left very apt to contract pneumonia and die within a few hours. Many head of cattle died suddenly with all of the internal symptoms of blackleg, but none of the external symptoms. The veterinarian surgeons and others who have examined these cases have all pronounced it pneumonia, blackleg having been eliminated from the herds in the cattle country since vaccination has been adopted as a preventive.

PRICES NOT SATISFACTORY A. E. De Riebles, manager of the American Live Stock and Loan Company, has the following to say relative to the prices of cattle: "Prices this fall have been far from satisfactory, but in our part of the country there is little disposition to hold over marketable cattle for another year, and so long as this fine weather keeps up there will be little coming from the range country. Of course, the season has been highly favorable in the matter of wheat and feed, and cattle have done well. Everybody also has a big lot of feed put up for winter use, but recent experience in holding cattle over has been far from satisfactory. With such an abundance of feed there is a reasonable certainty of the cattle making a good gain in growth and weight, but there is so much uncertainty as to any improvement in the matter of prices that the older cattle will be very generally marketed this fall. There seems to be no great rush to send them in, however."

THE MARKETS

NORTH FORT WORTH, Nov. 16.—Cattle receipts today were large, around the 4,000 mark, but with other cars reported from the west, this may be exceeded before night. The run of steers was better than usual, considerably generally. Nothing strictly choice came in, but the receipts were of better quality, taken as a whole, than has been the case thus far in the week. With the large supply, prices opened steady with yesterday's closing, and this prevailed during the early selling. High price of the day was \$3.25 on a string of eleven cars sold to a local packer. A good many well conditioned feeder steers were in the yards. Cows were numerous, and this could hardly be otherwise with few vacant pens in the yards. Generally speaking, the quality presented was the best of the week, there being more loads of full-flesh cattle than is usually observable. The canner division was fully represented, and here prices sagged a trifle, owing to the prospects of heavier runs from the west. Top price on cows was \$2.50, with butcher stuff in the bulk selling between \$1.85 and \$2.25; canners finding slow sale between \$1.25 and \$1.55. A large number of bulls came in. Demand seemed limited, yet prices remained steady. The calf supply waned from the large run of yesterday, few loads appearing. No change is observable in prices. Fancy weaners are selling around \$3.25, with thick-fleshed, heavy calves going decidedly lower. The closing trend of the market was weaker. The hog supply amounted to sixteen loads, 1,150 head. Compare with 1,446 last week, 723 last month, 520 last year same day. A short supply yesterday had put packers in need of hogs, but they were in no mood to pay more than the northern market prospect warranted. Wires told of heavy runs at Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago with a drop of 5c in values. The price here was promptly cut 10c, and at that trading went forward at a lively rate. The quality for the day was very good, but weights were not fully up to those of the day before. Top sales were \$4.70, a decline of 5c for the week.

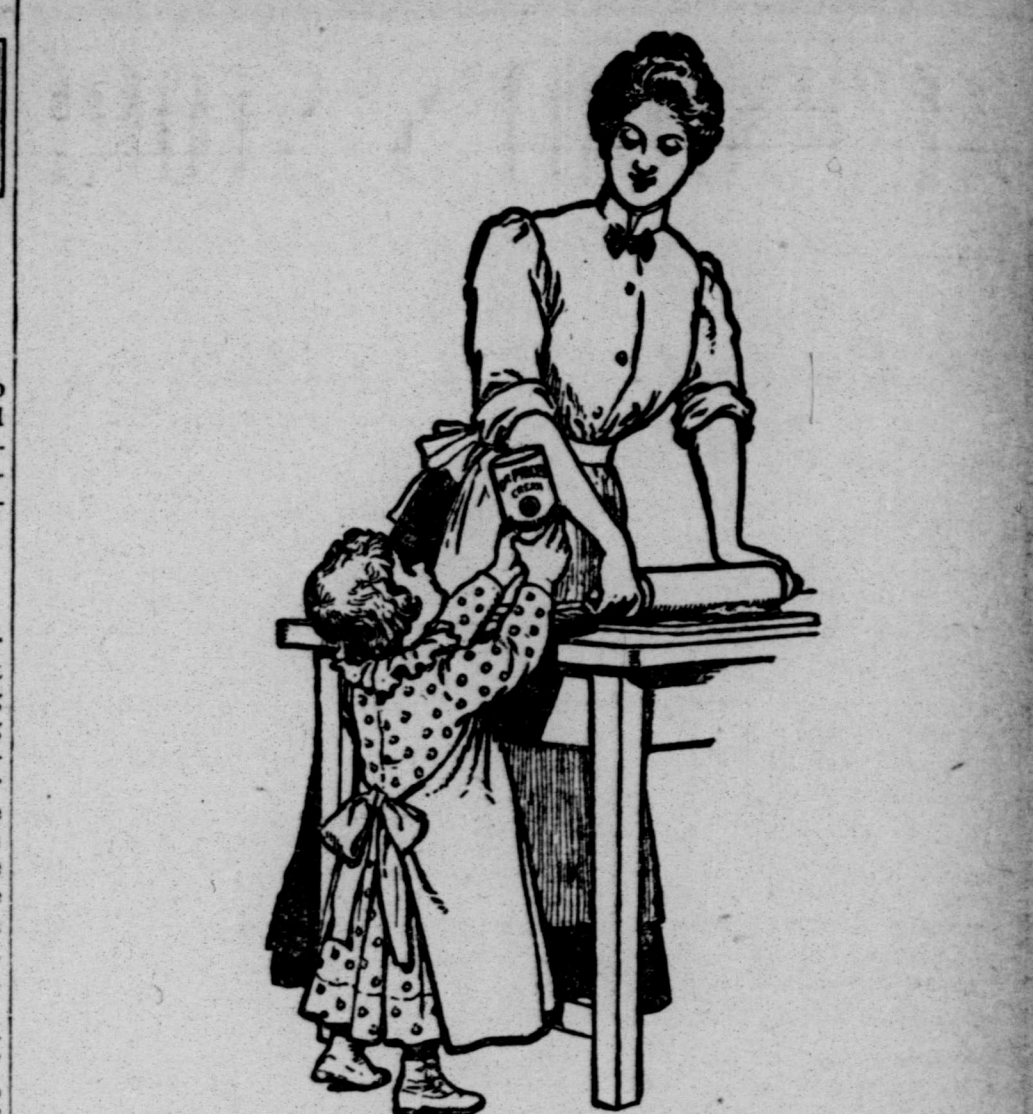
"Does Miss Brentwood know?" "She knows nothing at all. I was unwilling to entangle her, even with a confidence."

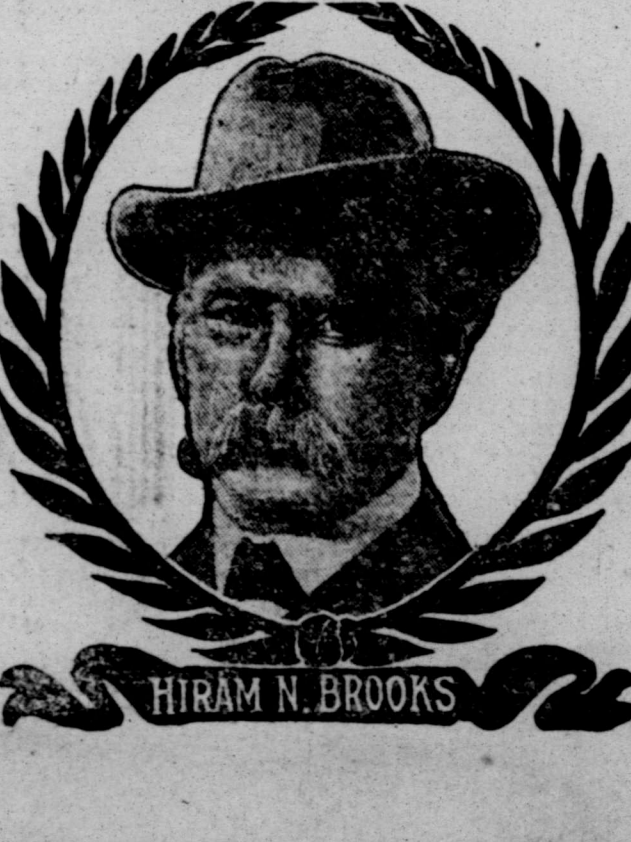

Governor Lanham is speaking in defense of railway consolidation bills passed by the last legislature, and it is but to be expected that he could find no guile in measures that have received his official sanction.

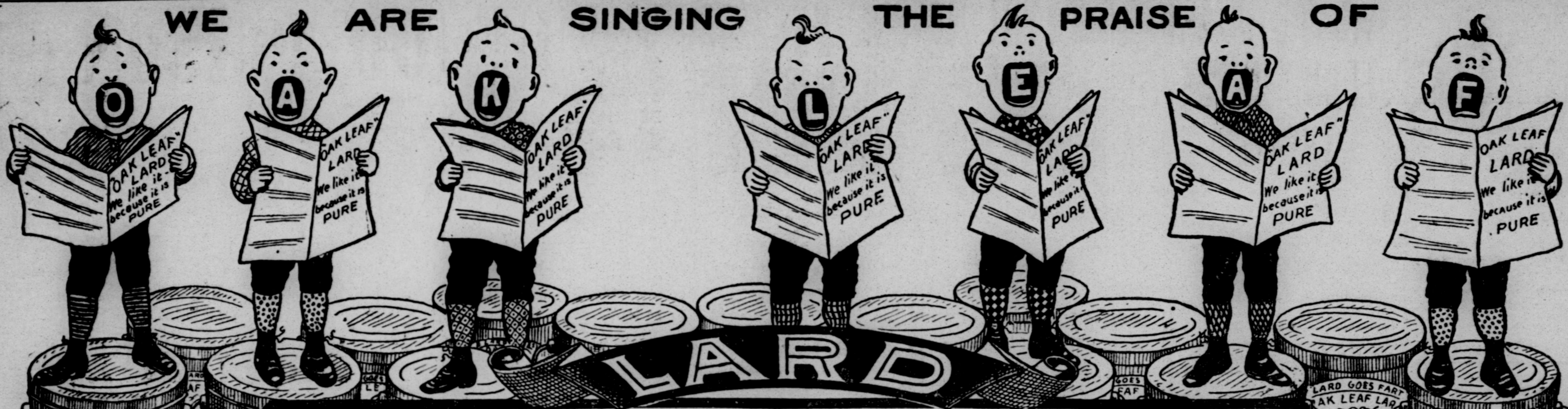
