

SMELTER RUN SHOWS GOLD IN WICHITAS

Four Hundred Dollars' Worth of Bullion to the Ton Exceeds Expectations of Miners Interested in Property

A letter received here Thursday night from J. D. Hutton, secretary and treasurer of the Roosevelt Minirg and Smelting company, by R. Burge gives the re-Prices-Lower floor, \$1.50; balcony, \$1, sult of the test run of bullion from the ores of that district made a few days ago and the figures show very rich ores. The smelter was run forty-two hours and the results revealed about 1,200 pounds of fine bullion.

The chemist's report on the bullion output obtained at the Remer's smelter gave \$400 in gold and eighty ounces of ilver which is valued at \$48 to the ton. The letter also says that there was a fair showing of copper, titanium and platinum, all of which are very valuable especially the two latter ores, which are

considered more precious than gold. Mr. Hutton promises to send a fuller recort of the first test made of the ores. He added in his letter that great excitement was caused by the excellent showing of the ores which far exceeded the expectations as to their value. He says that the question of gold and silver in the Wichitas is now settled beyond doubt, and that from now on there will be a great rush for the new mining camp. Already there are many people coming in searching for claims. Blue Beaver canyon, he says, is filled with excited people and the roads leading up that canyon are thoroughfares thronged with anxous people looking for locations. Mr. Hutton states that already several new mining companies have been organized since the richness of the district has been
