

Some well finished hogs were found in the supply and on these trading was active, the market opening strong with a tendency to go higher. A good demand was shown for pigs, the quality of these being better than at any time during the week. Sales were made at an advance of 10c to 15c. Fop hogs of light packing weight sold at \$4.67%, with the bulk going from \$4.55 @4.60. Light hogs, under 160 pounds, sold at \$4.3714, the bulk at \$4.35. Pigs of good finish, averaging around 100 pounds, sold at \$4.15, the best price for some weeks, the bulk selling around \$4.

IN JAPAN.

There the New Year Has Three Days of Welcome.

Japan is the jolliest country in the world at New Year's. It is three times jolly, in fact. Each Jan. 1 43,000,000 subjects in the Land of the Rising Sun begin to paint the mikado's empire the glorious roseate hue of the imperial Send us \$3.45 emblem. This deep red harmony, they say, is eminently fitting at the beginning of the year, and that the painting may be well done they administer three distinct and separate coats right; lavishly.

The bottom or foundation coat is two full weeks in putting on. Joy flows in streams along the thoroughfares, swelled by rivulets from every house. All the city folk call on each other; all the country folk come in to help them do it, and everybody gives everybody presents. This may be called the official New Year's. It dates only from 1870, when the Japanese government changed its calendar to conform with that of the rest of the world. On Feb. I there is a second coating, the New Year's of old Japan, still dear to the rural heart. All the country folk call on one another, and the city folk go! out to help them. There is less formality about this and less eclat, but good fellowship abounds and joy is rampant

for a week. The third coating is given in good old Chinese style. Its date depends on the moon, as does our Easter festival. Each household celebrates by itself in part and in part with outside friends, but this feast is more domestic, though not less sacredly observed, than the two preceding.

The New Year season is the time to see Japan socially at its best. It is miles per hour at 8 a. m. and rain it true there are no kiku, as they call inche chrysanthemums, nor cherry blossoms. The kiku is in the fall and the sakura in the spring, both seasons when all outdoors is a garden party and exquisitely picturesque; but, with all its loveliness, it is only the outside one

To see into the homes and the heart of Japan one must be there on New Year's. Business generally is suspended, both private and public. All is wide open then, and hospitality such as is unknown in Europe or America is the rule without exception.

The jinrikisha cooly is the only one that works, but his task hardly is irksome. Waiting, he feasts in the kitchen with the cook while his fare makes

### TO MAKE OLEO IN MEXICO

Inspects Territory With View to Establishing a Plant

Mr. Thomas, a representative of the cotton oil mill firm of E. H. Young of for the manufacture of oleomargarine. lard compound and other by-products

While only a cursory inspection of the possibilities of such a factory have been made by Mr. Thomas, he believes he has seen enough to warrant the establishment and maintenance of the factory, but also scrupulous attention reasonable price.

Not the least difficulty to be overcome, he thinks, is the fact that the regarded in the United States where practically the entire nation has recognized their value as food products. A similar condition, he believes, could be brought about in Mexico by practically demonstrating to the people what an excellent culinary article is pure cotton seed oil either as such or when made into oleomargarine or lard

Mr. Thomas admits to bring about this condition in Mexico will naturally take considerable time, but he also beieves the ultimate future of the product would justify the expenditure of ooth time and money in that direction. At the present time a plant of the character contemplated would, says Mr. Thomas, have to depend almost entirely on importations from the United States for its supply of crude cotton seed oil. This condition, he says, would later be obviated by the farmers of Mexico raising more cotton, and the fact of there being a plant to handle the reto cotton growing. Even if every ounce of the oil had to be imported, it is his opinion that it could be done and yet fined oils and butterine.

Mr. Thomas says that the little refining of cotton seed oil now being done eannot begin to supply present demands. Aside from the refining he says that considerable oil is used in soap making in the northern portion of the republic and that this practically exhausts the cotton seed ginned in the Laguna district, thus forcing the manufacturers to import oil from Texas when an additional amount is needed. Texas also sends much oil to the City of Mexico and other Central and South-

ern American towns. Another investigation of the proposition is to be made before a decision is reached to establish the proposed plant.

### LOCAL TIME ADOPTED BY WEATHER BUREAU

Change Instruments at En-

trance of New Year

The United States weather bureaus throughout the country have kept their clocks and recording instruments the seventy-fifth meridian time. that is with Washington city time. At the Fort Worth bureau this meant to hange sheets on registering machines at 11 a. m. local time in order to be with the noon time of Washington. At Phoenix, Ariz., the change came at a. m. and at San Francisco the change was made at 9 a. m. in order to be with the Washington time.

When a person here asked for the temperature at 12 o'clock noon the observer had to move forward one temperature suited to the local time. records on hand. The man in San Francisco had to talk data to his questioners three hours ahead of the data before him in order to give the proper information wanted.

This order of things is to be changed at midnight, Dec. 31, 1904. All stations within the United States have been ordered to change to the local time in use, as the ninetieth meridian,

An observer will be on duty at midnight, seventy-fifth meridian time at each station, and change from the Washington time to the local time in use, taking Central Mountain or Pacific time, as the position of the bureau may be. All weather men will hail this change as being a needed one, and with the other changes in various departments of record keeping the public can be served at a minute's notice to any that place. weather condition of any period desired. More complete temperature and sunshine records will be kept by the bureaus during 1905.

For exactly three months Delilah Fails enjoyed freedom; then, on the anniversary of the day when first she entered her prison cell to begin servder, she returned to serve, out the twelve years for which she had been forgiven by the former act of the gov-For Delilah Fails was found wanting within a short time after free-

It was largely through the efforts of leading family of Cedar Rapids, Caply consisting of four tain and Mrs. Charles Putnam, that she was paroled. They believed they could year-old murderess and so took her nto their own home. One night, a few weeks later, they went away and when they returned found Delilah Fails bound and gagged in the bathroom, while the house was ransacked from attic to cellar and despoiled of hundreds of dollars' worth of valuables! Loosed, the girl told of a burglar who had entered and securing her had robbed the house. Immediately her lover, who had been with her in prison, was suspected. To save him the girl confessed she had robbed the place and then bound and gagged herself to divert suspicion.
