## BOAT SINKS IMMEDIATELY

Flames Quickly Follow, Adding to Horror of Scalding Steam-Few Rescued

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Jan. 4.-At 11 o'clock last night the people of this city were startled by a terrible explosion, followed almost immediately by a lurid glare which lighted up the heavens for miles around. In vestigation showed that the boilers of the towboat Defender had exploded, just opposite the city, and the boat and a number of the barges in tow

were in flames. The work of rescuing the killed and injured began and it was soon found that the loss of life had been great.

Five others are so badly burned and scalded that their lives cannot be saved. Six more of the crew cannot be accounted for, and it is believed that their lifeless bodies now lie at the bottom of the Ohio. A partial list of the dead and missing follows:

Editor Telegram: I have been reading It the arguments and suggestions that ave been made recently anent the cotton situation, both from a boll weevil standpoint and that of the government einners' reports and think that most all have failed to grasp one important fact that has developed, which, while known to many in the past, has, it seems, been overlooked by those gentlemen who are asking a sure cure for the fall in cotton orices in the interest of the producer. The Dallas News in its last Sunday's issue, New Year's day, said editorially in speaking of the government crop report:

"By some leak or slip somewhere, the estimate made some months ago is said to have been in the hands of the gamblers before it was given to the producers of

"Now, why not proceed against the aforesaid "gamblers," if they are the cause of the slump in the price of cotton, and run them out of the United States and compel them to transact business in a foreign country, as was done in the case of the lotteries, whom a paternal government desired to prevent obbling the poor laboring man of his hard earnings? I am sure that if an earnest effort was made by every one interested to induce our able congressmen o take up the matter and force these high-toned robbers to release their grip upon the industries of the country much ould be accomplished to protect the producer of cotton, and when the gambler had ceased to exist the spinner and prolucer could deal directly with each other and a correct price be paid for the staple according to the law of supply and de-

The Rev. Herbert Bigelow, speaking of gambling, defines it thus:

"The essence of gambling is this: .A man risks something in the hope of gaining more at the expense of another.' Moreover it is a wolfish thing, in that those who gamble have no hope of gain save by the misfortunes of others."

The United States, every state and every munfcipality has laws relating to gambling, and try in every way to suppress the evil that ruins so many lives. then why does not the general government proceed to suppress this gamblers' nest that feeds upon the great products of the farm, that are of so much value to the wealth and welfare of all the peo ple? Recently a writer in a prominent magazine (not Lawson) said this:

"More than half the money made in New York is not the reward of effort in by honest sense; it is won at stock hazard. Often, too, it is won by methods of lie and cheat and swindle, the black disgrace of which would, if practised there, destroy and blot out the commonest faro den. Were it not for inconvenient laws and an inpate thinness of profit to dwell therein, one might better in many cases turn from the trade of stocks to that of pickpurse; for with morals on a par the padder at least escapes the Wall street vice of an inevitable treachery to his friends. Long ago, the homesteadas old records disclose-of Captain Kidd occupied the present sité of the stock exchange. Is there no suggestion here?"
