

Bentley of Houston, A band of ten . of these Indians some time ago went to the Republic to investigate that country with a view to locating the entire tribe there.

The Mexican Kickapoos were formerly nhabitants of the Indian Territory, but owing to racial difficulties several years ago, they left and located in Mexico, They located in the state of Coahuila, in a sparsely settled section, and have proved themselves first-class agriculturists, as well as good citizens.

It is the desire of the state of Coahuile and of the landed interests to have the entire Kickapoo race of the Indian Territory transplanted into Mexico in connection with the colony already there.

The movement, if it can be effected, will involve national rights to some extent. In order to settle these points Mr. Bentley has gone to Washington to confer with the Feedral authorities concerning the sale of the lands which the Kickapoos hold in the Indian Territory. It is believed there will be no trouble in the negotiations. If they are satisfactorily concluded Mr. Bentley will at once return to Texas and arrange with the Kickapoos in the Territory for moving into the Republic. There are now about 1,000 families of the Kickapoos in the Indian Territory. and the plan is to move them all to



There are doubtless a few members of the state legislature who would be glad to tax every corporation in the state out of existence, but they constitute a very small minority. There will be enough conservatives among the members to insure justice to all interests in the framing of new tax legislation.

The Post goes further than the resolution of the bar association of Houston. It has advocated for some time not only an increase of the judicial salaries, but the salaries of the state officials as well. ## LICK TELESCOPE FINDS

Professor Perrine Discovers Another Moon Rotating About the Planet-Second

Found by the Big Instrument SAN JOSE, Cal., Jan. 6.-Professor Perrine of Lick observatory has just disovered a sixth satellite of Jupiter by neans of observations with the Crossley

Early in December he found on photographs of the region immediately west of Jupiter the image of an unknown body which changed position from night to night. This week he secured observations which enabled him to determine whether his was a new satellite or one of the aseroids. It is certain that the body is evolving around the planet of Jupiter. ast night it was forty-five minutes of re due west of the planet and the dis-

ance is slowly decreasing . The moon is on the fourteenth magniide or slightly brighter and needs a telecope of ten or twelve inches in diameer to observe it. The orbit can not yet e determined. The satellite is five or six mes farther away from the planet than he outermost of the five others; its peied may be from six to eight months. The four very bright satellites were disovered by Galileo in 1610. The faint fifth ne was discovered by Barnard in 1892 with the Lick telescope. The fifth and sixth satellites are of approximately the
