Japanese Attack Russian Lines But Are Repulsed With Some Loss

VILLAGE RETAKEN

Movement Taken as Forerunner of Vigorous Campaign in the Spring

RUSSIAN HEADQUARTERS, HUAN MOUNTAIN, Manchuria, Jan. 26, 2 p. m .- (Delayed in transmission.) -After THE "PENNSYLVANIA" three months' quietude the Japanese resumed activity in attempting to force back the Russian's right wing. A stubborn fight was began Jan. 25 and is continuing today which may be a curtain raiser for the spring campaign. According to reports the Japanese attack was repulsed and the Russian counter attack was so energetically pressed that a village within one of the former Japanese lines of some strategical importance was taken. It is rumored several Japanese guns were taken. There is no fighting at the center or on the left flank. The Japanese advance is believed to have been inspired in part by news of Russian internal troubles, the intelligence of which reached the Russian army at dawn, Jan. 25.

Following the sudden return of winter weather the cannon began booming far to the westward and through the morning fog and mist the Japanese unexpectedly advanced. Riflemen on the Russian right flank were so vigorously employed in the fighting line that by evening they met the Japanese attack by a brilliant counter attack. 

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—A little girl's Russian Authorities Believed grief over the loss of a ring her dying mother gave her touched the hearts of three Chicago burglars. The ring came back through the mails today, barely twenty-four hours after it had been torn from the finger of 15-year-old Vera Fowler, grand-daughter of milionaire Eugene Fishburn, in whose nansion the burglary took place.

"We have mothers, too," was the explanation for the return of the bit of jewelry, which was a small part of the Governors of Leading Cities burglars' plunder, none of the rest of which was returned. The letter inclosing the ring was addressed to Miss Vera Fowler and the letter read as fol-

"We are not professional burglars. We all have mothers, too. Inclosed is the ring which you said was a gift from your dead mother. Best regards."



The parties to any written contract may agree to and stipulate for any rate of interest, not exceeding 8 per cent per anrum, on the amount of the contract.

All written contracts whatsoever, for money in any way, directly or indirectly, violating the preceding article, by stipulating for a greater rate of interest than 8 per cent per annum shall be void and have no effect for the amount or value of the interest only; but the principal sum of money or value of the contract

may be recovered. All judgments of the civil courts of this state shall bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from and after the date of the judgment, except where the contract upon which the judgment is founded bears a specified interest greater. than 6 per cent per annum, and not exceeding 8 per cent per annum, in which case the judgment shall bear the same rate of interest specified in such contract and after the date of such judgment.

By O'Quinn: . If any person in this state shall carry on or about his person, saddle or in his saddlebags, any pistol, dirk, dagger, slung-shot, sword-cane, spear or knuckles made of any metal or any hard substance, bowie knife or any other knife, the blade of which exceeds four inches in length, he shall be punished by fine of not less than one hundred dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and by confinement in the county jail not

less than six or more than twelve months. The fact that the present law is inadequate to prevent the unlawful carrying of arms creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and that this act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so en-

The bill introduced in the house by Messrs. Love, Graham, Collan and Ramsey creating a board of railway and telegraph examiners is rather an unusual

The first section of the bill explains obstantially its purpose, which reads: "There shall be established a board of railway and telegraph examiners, to conthe governor from among railroad telegraph operators who have been residents of the state of Texas not less than ten years next preceding their appointment, years next preceding their appointment actively engaged in railroad telegraph service. The governor shall within thirty office for a term of one year, and two members to hold office for two years." The duty of this board, the bill recites,



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

Formerly, when the Western Union Tele graph Company transmitted bets by means of its wires, the racing men received their weather instructions from this company, Now however, since the Western Union has ceased to operate a racing exchange in Sam Shubert and Nixon and Zimmerwire, the sporting men are dependent upon the observations of Uncle Sam.
