******** WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 .- After a continuous sitting of nine hours the senate at 8:45 o'clock last night passed the joint statehood bill. As passed the bill provides for the admission of the states of Oklahoma, to be composed of Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and New Mexico, according to the present boundaries, with Arizona eliminated. The long session was characterized

That agreement provided that the entire day's debate be given to the consideration of the amendment to the bill under the ten-minute rule and that a vote should be taken upon all the amendments and upon the bill itself prior to the adjournment of the day's

GALLINGER AMENDMENT The first amendment considered pronibits the sale of liquor in Indian Territory for ten years. Mr. Gallinger offered an amendment as a substitute for the committee's provision, making the time twenty-one years and extending its operation to the entire state.

The substitute was carried by a vote of 55 to 20. The text of the Gallinger amendment applying to the entire state of

Oklahoma is as follows: "The manufacture, sale, barter or giving away of intoxicating liquors within this state is hereby prohibited for a period of twenty-one years after the date of admission of this state into the union and thereafter until the people of this state shall otherwise provide by amendment of this constitution in the manner prescribed herein. Any person who shall manufacture, sell, parter or give away any intoxicating iquor of any kind, including beer, ale and wine, contrary to the provisions of this section, is hereby declared to be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be punshed by imprisonment for not less than thirty days nor more than 100 days, and by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200 for each offense; and upon the admission of this state into the union the provisions of this section shall be immediately inforceable in the limits of this state."

Dr. R. G. Lightle of Searcy, Ark., Victim of Pneumonia

SEARCY, Ark., Feb. 8 .- Dr. R. G. Lightle, one of the defendants in the sensational insurance swindle charges pending here since last July, died of pneumonia. 
